abase	Cause to feel shame; hurt the pride of. I watched my colleagues abasing themselves before the board of trustees.
adulterate	Mixed with impurities. The brewer is said to <b>adulterate</b> his beer.
andiron	A metal stand, typically one of a pair, for supporting wood burning in a fireplace. The <b>andiron</b> s were too hot to touch.
<u>base</u>	Of low birth or station base is archaic in this sense. The attack wiped out our forward <b>base</b> s.
<u>belittle</u>	Express a negative opinion of. Don t <b>belittle</b> your colleagues.
<b>below</b>	Below deck. <i>See <b>below</b></i> .
<u>beneath</u>	Extending or directly underneath something. <i>Upper layers can be removed to reveal internal parts</i> <b>beneath</b> .
bottom	Situated at the bottom or lowest position. The liner plunged to the <b>bottom</b> of the sea.
condescend	Behave in a patronizing and condescending manner. Take care not to <b>condescend</b> to your reader.
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The love episodes <b>debase</b> the dignity of the drama.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. The amount of homework <b>decrease</b> d towards the end of the semester.
degrade	Lower the grade of something; reduce its worth. When exposed to light the materials will <b>degrade</b> .



demoralize	Cause (someone) to lose confidence or hope. The boss s behavior <b>demoralize</b> d everyone in the office.
<u>demote</u>	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. The head of the army was <b>demote</b> d to deputy defence secretary.
descending	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. A passage of <b>descending</b> chords.
<u>down</u>	Used as a command to a person or animal to sit or lie down. <i>The stock market is <b>down</b> today.</i>
downgrade	A downward gradient on a railway or road. <b>Downgrade</b> s by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.
<u>hidden</u>	Not accessible to view. <i>Hidden</i> valleys.
irreducible	Not able to be reduced or simplified. Literature is often <b>irreducible</b> to normative ideas.
<u>low</u>	A low level or position or degree. The dual traditions of high and <b>low</b> art.
<u>lower</u>	In or into a lower position. <i>Lower expectations.</i>
<u>minimize</u>	Represent or estimate at less than the true value or importance. <i>The aim is to minimize costs.</i>
mortify	(of flesh) be affected by gangrene or necrosis. <i>Mortify</i> the flesh.
nether	Located below or beneath something else. Gnawed his <b>nether</b> lip.
reduce	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>He <b>reduce</b>s unimaginable statistics to manageable proportions.</i>
submergence	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.
subnormal	Not meeting standards or reaching a level regarded as usual. <i>Subnormal intelligence.</i>
<u>substrate</u>	The substance on which an enzyme acts. Brachiopods attached to the <b>substrate</b> by a stalk.
<u>underneath</u>	Partly or wholly concealed by a garment. A wart on the <b>underneath</b> of his foot.
underside	The lower side of anything. The butterfly s wings have a mottled brown pattern on the <b>underside</b> .
