## Associations of "Under the radar" (30 Words)

<b>abase</b>	Cause to feel shame; hurt the pride of. <i>I watched my colleagues abasing themselves before the board of trustees.</i>
<b>adulterate</b>	Mixed with impurities. <i>The brewer is said to <b>adulterate</b> his beer.</i>
<b>andiron</b>	A metal stand, typically one of a pair, for supporting wood burning in a fireplace. <i>The <b>andirons</b> were too hot to touch.</i>
<b><u>base</u></b>	Of low birth or station base is archaic in this sense. <i>The attack wiped out our forward <b>bases</b>.</i>
<b><u>belittle</u></b>	Express a negative opinion of. <i>Don't <b>belittle</b> your colleagues.</i>
<b><u>below</u></b>	Below deck. <i>See <b>below</b>.</i>
<b><u>beneath</u></b>	Extending or directly underneath something. <i>Upper layers can be removed to reveal internal parts <b>beneath</b>.</i>
<b>bottom</b>	Situated at the bottom or lowest position. <i>The liner plunged to the <b>bottom</b> of the sea.</i>
<b>condescend</b>	Behave in a patronizing and condescending manner. <i>Take care not to <b>condescend</b> to your reader.</i>
<b>debase</b>	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The love episodes <b>debase</b> the dignity of the drama.</i>
<b>decrease</b>	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>The amount of homework <b>decreased</b> towards the end of the semester.</i>
<b>degrade</b>	Lower the grade of something; reduce its worth. <i>When exposed to light the materials will <b>degrade</b>.</i>

<b>demoralize</b>	Cause (someone) to lose confidence or hope. <i>The boss's behavior <b>demoralized</b> everyone in the office.</i>
<b><u>demote</u></b>	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. <i>The head of the army was <b>demoted</b> to deputy defence secretary.</i>
<b>descending</b>	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>A passage of <b>descending</b> chords.</i>
<b><u>down</u></b>	Used as a command to a person or animal to sit or lie down. <i>The stock market is <b>down</b> today.</i>
<b>downgrade</b>	A downward gradient on a railway or road. <i><b>Downgrades</b> by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.</i>
<b><u>hidden</u></b>	Not accessible to view. <i><b>Hidden</b> valleys.</i>
<b>irreducible</b>	Not able to be reduced or simplified. <i>Literature is often <b>irreducible</b> to normative ideas.</i>
<b><u>low</u></b>	A low level or position or degree. <i>The dual traditions of high and <b>low</b> art.</i>
<b><u>lower</u></b>	In or into a lower position. <i><b>Lower</b> expectations.</i>
<b><u>minimize</u></b>	Represent or estimate at less than the true value or importance. <i>The aim is to <b>minimize</b> costs.</i>
<b>mortify</b>	(of flesh) be affected by gangrene or necrosis. <i><b>Mortify</b> the flesh.</i>
<b>nether</b>	Located below or beneath something else. <i>Gnawed his <b>nether</b> lip.</i>
<b>reduce</b>	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>He <b>reduces</b> unimaginable statistics to manageable proportions.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.</i>
<b>subnormal</b>	Not meeting standards or reaching a level regarded as usual. <i><b>Subnormal</b> intelligence.</i>
<b><u>substrate</u></b>	The substance on which an enzyme acts. <i>Brachiopods attached to the <b>substrate</b> by a stalk.</i>
<b><u>underneath</u></b>	Partly or wholly concealed by a garment. <i>A wart on the <b>underneath</b> of his foot.</i>
<b>underside</b>	The lower side of anything. <i>The butterfly's wings have a mottled brown pattern on the <b>underside</b>.</i>
