Associations of "Under the radar" (30 Words)

abase	Cause to feel shame; hurt the pride of. <i>I watched my colleagues abasing themselves before the board of trustees.</i>
adulterate	Mixed with impurities. <i>The brewer is said to adulterate his beer.</i>
andiron	A metal stand, typically one of a pair, for supporting wood burning in a fireplace. <i>The andirons were too hot to touch.</i>
<u>base</u>	Of low birth or station base is archaic in this sense. <i>The attack wiped out our forward bases.</i>
<u>belittle</u>	Express a negative opinion of. <i>Don't belittle your colleagues.</i>
<u>below</u>	Below deck. <i>See below.</i>
<u>beneath</u>	Extending or directly underneath something. <i>Upper layers can be removed to reveal internal parts beneath.</i>
bottom	Situated at the bottom or lowest position. <i>The liner plunged to the bottom of the sea.</i>
condescend	Behave in a patronizing and condescending manner. <i>Take care not to condescend to your reader.</i>
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The love episodes debase the dignity of the drama.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>The amount of homework decreased towards the end of the semester.</i>
degrade	Lower the grade of something; reduce its worth. <i>When exposed to light the materials will degrade.</i>

demoralize	Cause (someone) to lose confidence or hope. <i>The boss's behavior demoralized everyone in the office.</i>
<u>demote</u>	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. <i>The head of the army was demoted to deputy defence secretary.</i>
descending	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>A passage of descending chords.</i>
<u>down</u>	Used as a command to a person or animal to sit or lie down. <i>The stock market is down today.</i>
downgrade	A downward gradient on a railway or road. <i>Downgrades by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.</i>
<u>hidden</u>	Not accessible to view. <i>Hidden valleys.</i>
irreducible	Not able to be reduced or simplified. <i>Literature is often irreducible to normative ideas.</i>
<u>low</u>	A low level or position or degree. <i>The dual traditions of high and low art.</i>
<u>lower</u>	In or into a lower position. <i>Lower expectations.</i>
<u>minimize</u>	Represent or estimate at less than the true value or importance. <i>The aim is to minimize costs.</i>
mortify	(of flesh) be affected by gangrene or necrosis. <i>Mortify the flesh.</i>
nether	Located below or beneath something else. <i>Gnawed his nether lip.</i>
reduce	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>He reduces unimaginable statistics to manageable proportions.</i>
submergence	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Politicians may be blamed for submergence of principle.</i>
subnormal	Not meeting standards or reaching a level regarded as usual. <i>Subnormal intelligence.</i>
<u>substrate</u>	The substance on which an enzyme acts. <i>Brachiopods attached to the substrate by a stalk.</i>
<u>underneath</u>	Partly or wholly concealed by a garment. <i>A wart on the underneath of his foot.</i>
underside	The lower side of anything. <i>The butterfly's wings have a mottled brown pattern on the underside.</i>
