amount	Be tantamount or equivalent to. <i>The bills amounted to 2 000.</i>
anticipate	Realize beforehand. <i>He anticipated Bates s theories on mimicry and protective coloration.</i>
anticipation	The action of anticipating something; expectation or prediction. <i>Her eyes sparkled with anticipation.</i>
anticipatory	In anticipation. <i>An anticipatory flash of excitement.</i>
assumed	Adopted as a basis of reasoning; expected. <i>A man living under an assumed name.</i>
assumption	Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to. <i>The assumption of an active role in regional settlements.</i>
conjecture	To believe especially on uncertain or tentative grounds. <i>Many conjectured that the jury could not agree.</i>
estimate	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>Compare costs by getting estimates from at least two firms.</i>
expect	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>I m expecting a full explanation as to why these files were destroyed.</i>
expectancy	An expectation. <i>An indicator of expectancy in development.</i>
expectation	A strong belief that something will happen or be the case. <i>Reality had not lived up to expectations.</i>
guess	Form a correct conclusion about something by guessing. <i>My guess is that within a year we will have a referendum.</i>
guesswork	The process or results of guessing. <i>Answering this question will involve you in a certain amount of guesswork.</i>

<u>infer</u>	Believe to be the case. <i>From these facts we can infer that crime has been increasing.</i>
inference	A conclusion reached on the basis of evidence and reasoning. <i>It seemed a fair inference that such books would be grouped together.</i>
preconception	A preconceived idea or prejudice. <i>He did not even try to confirm his preconceptions.</i>
<u>presumably</u>	By reasonable assumption. <i>Presumably he missed the train.</i>
<u>presume</u>	Be arrogant or impertinent enough to do something. <i>I presumed that the man had been escorted from the building.</i>
<u>presumption</u>	An idea that is taken to be true on the basis of probability. <i>The planning policy shows a general presumption in favour of development.</i>
presuppose	Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition. <i>Your argument presupposes that it does not matter who is in power.</i>
skimp	Limit in quality or quantity. <i>She wore a yellow skimp.</i>
<u>speculate</u>	Invest in stocks, property, or other ventures in the hope of gain but with the risk of loss. <i>Philosophers have speculated on the question of God for thousands of years.</i>
speculation	A message expressing an opinion based on incomplete evidence. <i>The company's move into property speculation.</i>
<u>suppose</u>	Expect believe or suppose. <i>The procedure supposes that a will has already been proved.</i>
<u>supposedly</u>	According to what is generally assumed or believed (often used to indicate that the speaker doubts the truth of the statement). <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
supposition	A message expressing an opinion based on incomplete evidence. <i>Their outrage was based on supposition and hearsay.</i>
<u>surmise</u>	Imagine to be the case or true or probable. <i>All these observations remain surmise.</i>
turnout	A set of clothing (with accessories). <i>At most junctions and crossovers the trains will be able to take the turnout at 230 km h.</i>
underrate	Make too low an estimate of. <i>They vastly underrate their own players.</i>
