encounter	Meet (someone) unexpectedly. <i>What do we know about the people we encounter in our daily lives.</i>
endure	Persist for a specified period of time. <i>The new secretary had to endure a lot of unprofessional remarks.</i>
engage in	Ask to represent; of legal counsel.
experience	Undergo or live through a difficult experience. <i>An opportunity to experience the excitement of New York.</i>
face	Cover the surface of something with a layer of a different material. <i>If you were suddenly faced with an emergency would you know how to cope.</i>
go through	Go through in search of something search through someone s belongings in an unauthorized way.
live through	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
put up with	Formulate in a particular style or language.
receive	Receive as a retribution or punishment. <i>The systems work by comparing time signals received from different satellites.</i>
stand	Withstand the force of something. <i>My decision stands.</i>
submit to	Make over as a return.
suffer	Undergo or suffer. <i>She suffered a fracture in the accident.</i>
support	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>Fans should always support their team fully no matter what.</i>
sustain	Provide with nourishment. <i>The allegations of discrimination were sustained.</i>
tolerate	Recognize and respect (rights and beliefs of others). <i>A regime unwilling to tolerate dissent.</i>
undertake	Accept as a charge. <i>A lorry driver implicitly undertakes that he is reasonably skilled as a driver.</i>
weather	Change under the action or influence of the weather. <i>This year has tested industry s ability to weather recession.</i>
withstand	Stand up or offer resistance to somebody or something. <i>The new material withstands even the greatest wear and tear.</i>

<u>astride</u>	With the legs stretched far apart. <i>She sat on the chair astride.</i>

<u>bearable</u>	Able to be endured. <i>Things to make life in the tropics more bearable.</i>
bleeding	The flow of blood from a ruptured blood vessel. <i>The watch was a bleeding copy.</i>

experience	The knowledge or skill acquired by a period of practical experience of something especially that gained in a particular profession. <i>He had a religious experience.</i>
forbearance	The action of refraining from exercising a legal right, especially enforcing the payment of a debt. <i>His forbearance to reply was alarming.</i>
<u>metamorphosis</u>	A complete change of physical form or substance especially as by magic or witchcraft. <i>The persistence of the larval tail during metamorphosis.</i>
orthopedic	Of or relating to orthopedics. <i>Orthopedic shoes.</i>

pain	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>She took pains to see that everyone ate well.</i>
patience	The capacity to accept or tolerate delay, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious. <i>You can find bargains if you have the patience to sift through the rubbish.</i>
perseverance	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>Medicine is a field which requires dedication and perseverance.</i>
persevere	Continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty or with little or no indication of success. <i>His family persevered with his treatment.</i>
<u>persist</u>	Be persistent refuse to stop. <i>The minority of drivers who persist in drinking.</i>
persistence	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>Cardiff's persistence was rewarded with a try.</i>
principled	(of a system or method) based on a given set of rules. <i>A principled politician.</i>
resourcefulness	The ability to find quick and clever ways to overcome difficulties. <i>A man of great resourcefulness.</i>
stand	Be standing be upright. <i>United's manager watched from the stands.</i>
suffer	Undergo or suffer. <i>He suffered a great deal since his arrest.</i>
sufferance	Patient endurance especially of pain or distress. <i>An estate at sufferance.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>His disregard for the sufferings of his fellow countrymen.</i>
<u>surgery</u>	The branch of medical science that treats disease or injury by operative procedures. <i>He died while undergoing surgery.</i>
<u>tolerable</u>	Able to be endured. <i>The climate is at least tolerable.</i>
<u>tolerate</u>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>A regime unwilling to tolerate dissent.</i>
toleration	A disposition to tolerate or accept people or situations. <i>All people should practice toleration and live together in peace.</i>

tribulation A state of great trouble or suffering.
*Life is full of **tribulations**.*
