| <b>easel</b>                         | A wooden frame for holding an artist’s work while it is being painted or drawn.   |
| <b>endurable</b>                     | Able to be endured; bearable.<br><i>My journey was long but <b>endurable</b>.</i>   |
| <a href="#"><u>endure</u></a>        | Last and be usable.<br><i>The new secretary had to <b>endure</b> a lot of unprofessional remarks.</i>   |
| <b>experience</b>                    | Go through mental or physical states or experiences.<br><i>Audition day is an enjoyable <b>experience</b> for any seven year old.</i>   |
| <b>forbearance</b>                   | The action of refraining from exercising a legal right, especially enforcing the payment of a debt.<br><i>His <b>forbearance</b> to reply was alarming.</i>   |
| <a href="#"><u>metamorphosis</u></a> | (in an insect or amphibian) the process of transformation from an immature form to an adult form in two or more distinct stages.<br><i>In insects with a complete <b>metamorphosis</b> the wings arise from thickenings of the epidermis.</i> |

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| <b>orthopedic</b>       | Of or relating to orthopedics.<br><i><b>Orthopedic</b> shoes.</i>  |
| <b>pain</b>             | Cause mental or physical pain to.<br><i>It <b>pains</b> me to say this.</i>  |
| <b>patience</b>         | The capacity to accept or tolerate delay, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious.<br><i>I have run out of <b>patience</b> with her.</i>                                |
| <b>perseverance</b>     | The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior.<br><i>His <b>perseverance</b> with the technique illustrates his single mindedness.</i>                            |
| <b>persevere</b>        | Continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty or with little or no indication of success.<br><i>His family <b>persevered</b> with his treatment.</i>                       |
| <u><b>persist</b></u>   | Be persistent refuse to stop.<br><i>The child <b>persisted</b> and kept asking questions.</i>  |
| <b>persistence</b>      | The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior.<br><i>The <b>persistence</b> of huge environmental problems.</i>   |
| <b>principled</b>       | (of a person or their behaviour) acting in accordance with morality and showing recognition of right and wrong.<br><i><b>Principled</b> pragmatism and <b>unprincipled</b> expediency.</i> |
| <b>resourcefulness</b>  | The quality of being able to cope with a difficult situation.<br><i>A man of great <b>resourcefulness</b>.</i>   |
| <b>stand</b>            | The place where someone typically stands or sits.<br><i>Small stable boats that could <b>stand</b> the punishment of heavy seas.</i>   |
| <b>suffer</b>           | Undergo or suffer.<br><i>He <b>suffered</b> intense pain.</i>  |
| <b>sufferance</b>       | The suffering or undergoing of something bad or unpleasant.<br><i>An estate at <b>sufferance</b>.</i>  |
| <b>suffering</b>        | Psychological suffering.<br><i><b>Suffering</b> refugees.</i>  |
| <u><b>surgery</b></u>   | An occasion on which an MP, lawyer, or other professional person gives advice.<br><i>He died while undergoing <b>surgery</b>.</i>  |
| <u><b>tolerable</b></u> | Able to be endured.<br><i>A stimulant to make life more <b>tolerable</b>.</i>  |
| <u><b>tolerate</b></u>  | Be capable of continued subjection to (a drug, toxin, or environmental condition) without adverse reaction.<br><i>He learned to <b>tolerate</b> the heat.</i>                              |

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| <b>toleration</b>  | The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour.<br><i>The king demanded greater religious <b>toleration</b>.</i> |
| <b>tribulation</b> | A cause of great trouble or suffering.<br><i>His time of <b>tribulation</b> was just beginning.</i>   |
