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Associations of "Undergoing" (30 Words)

affliction	A condition of suffering or distress due to ill health. <i>Poor people in great affliction.</i>
astride	With a leg on each side of something. <i>He stood legs astride.</i>
bear	(of a vehicle or boat) convey (passengers or cargo). <i>Interest bearing accounts.</i>
bearable	Capable of being borne though unpleasant. <i>Things to make life in the tropics more bearable.</i>
bleeding	Used for emphasis, or to express annoyance. <i>She looks so bleeding bored all day.</i>
dais	A platform raised above the surrounding level to give prominence to the person on it.
easel	A wooden frame for holding an artist’s work while it is being painted or drawn.
endurable	Capable of being borne though unpleasant. <i>My journey was long but endurable.</i>
endure	Continue to live through hardship or adversity. <i>The legend of Elvis endures.</i>
experience	The knowledge or skill acquired by a period of practical experience of something especially that gained in a particular profession. <i>You should have the necessary experience in health management.</i>
forbearance	Good-natured tolerance of delay or incompetence. <i>His unfailing courtesy and forbearance under great provocation.</i>
metamorphosis	A complete change of physical form or substance especially as by magic or witchcraft. <i>The metamorphosis of the old house into something new and exciting.</i>

orthopedic	Of or relating to orthopedics. <i>Orthopedic shoes.</i>
pain	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>The pain of loneliness.</i>
patience	The capacity to accept or tolerate delay, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious. <i>I have run out of patience with her.</i>
perseverance	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>Medicine is a field which requires dedication and perseverance.</i>
persevere	Continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty or with little or no indication of success. <i>His family persevered with his treatment.</i>
<u>persist</u>	Be persistent refuse to stop. <i>He persisted to call me every night.</i>
persistence	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>The persistence of huge environmental problems.</i>
principled	(of a system or method) based on a given set of rules. <i>A principled person.</i>
resourcefulness	The ability to find quick and clever ways to overcome difficulties. <i>A man of great resourcefulness.</i>
stand	Have or maintain a position or stand on an issue. <i>A taxi stand.</i>
suffer	Undergo or suffer. <i>He suffered a great deal since his arrest.</i>
sufferance	A disposition to tolerate or accept people or situations. <i>Charles was only here on sufferance.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>Suffering refugees.</i>
<u>surgery</u>	An occasion on which an MP, lawyer, or other professional person gives advice. <i>He read the warning in the doctor's surgery.</i>
<u>tolerable</u>	Able to be endured. <i>The climate is at least tolerable.</i>
<u>tolerate</u>	Allow the existence, occurrence, or practice of (something that one dislikes or disagrees with) without interference. <i>The patient does not tolerate the anti-inflammatory drugs we gave him.</i>

toleration	The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour. <i>All people should practice toleration and live together in peace.</i>
tribulation	A cause of great trouble or suffering. <i>Life is full of tribulations.</i>
