<b>elementary</b>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of elementary school or elementary education. <i>The <b>elementary</b> rights of citizenship.</i>
<b>essential</b>	Absolutely necessary; vitally necessary. <i><b>Essential</b> tools and materials.</i>
<b>first</b>	Ranking above all others. <i>The <b>first</b> verse.</i>
<b>fundamental</b>	So basic as to be hard to alter, resolve, or overcome. <i>An example that was <b>fundamental</b> to the argument.</i>
<b>implicit in</b>	Implied though not directly expressed; inherent in the nature of something.
<b>inherent</b>	(of an adjective) having the same meaning in both attributive and predicative uses. <i>The president's <b>inherent</b> foreign affairs power.</i>
<b>intrinsic</b>	Situated within or belonging solely to the organ or body part on which it acts. <i>Access to the arts is <b>intrinsic</b> to a high quality of life.</i>
<b>key</b>	Serving as an essential component. <i>She became a <b>key</b> figure in the suffragette movement.</i>
<b>primary</b>	Of primary importance. <i>His expert handling of the <b>primary</b> and secondary literature is clear on every page.</i>
<b>prime</b>	Of first importance; main. <i>The <b>prime</b> minister.</i>
<b>principal</b>	First in order of importance; main. <i>The <b>principal</b> example.</i>
<b>rudimentary</b>	Relating to an immature, undeveloped, or basic form. <i><b>Rudimentary</b> plans.</i>

<b>elements</b>	Violent or severe weather viewed as caused by the action of the four elements. <i>They felt the full fury of the <b>elements</b>.</i>
<b>essential</b>	Basic and fundamental. <i><b>Essential</b> tools and materials.</i>
<a href="#"><u>essentially</u></a>	In essence; at bottom or by one's (or its) very nature. <i><b>Essentially</b> they are amateurs.</i>
<b>essentialness</b>	Basic importance.
<b>fundamental</b>	A fundamental note tone or frequency. <i>The theories are based on a <b>fundamental</b> error.</i>
<b>indispensability</b>	The quality possessed by something that you cannot possibly do without.

<b><u>indispensable</u></b>	Not to be dispensed with; essential. <i>Foods <b>indispensable</b> to good nutrition.</i>
<b><u>integral</u></b>	The result of a mathematical integration $F(x)$ is the integral of $f(x)$ if $dF = f(x) dx$ . <i>A local motion keepeth bodies <b>integral</b>.</i>
<b><u>main</u></b>	Any very large body of (salt) water. <i>The camcorder can be run directly off the <b>mains</b>.</i>
<b><u>meaningful</u></b>	Communicating something that is not directly expressed. <i><b>Meaningful</b> elements in a language.</i>
<b><u>necessary</u></b>	The basic requirements of life, such as food and warmth. <i>A bag containing my wallet the money the <b>necessary</b>.</i>
<b><u>necessity</u></b>	Anything indispensable. <i>A good book is a <b>necessity</b> when travelling.</i>
<b><u>originally</u></b>	From or in the beginning; at first. <i>Potatoes <b>originally</b> came from South America.</i>
<b><u>premise</u></b>	State or presuppose something as a premise. <i>The reforms were <b>premised</b> on our findings.</i>
<b><u>prerequisite</u></b>	Something that is required in advance. <i>Latin was a <b>prerequisite</b> for admission.</i>
<b><u>primary</u></b>	A primary feather. <i><b>Primary</b> sources.</i>
<b><u>radically</u></b>	In a thorough or fundamental way; completely. <i>The two situations are <b>radically</b> different.</i>
<b><u>requisite</u></b>	Anything indispensable. <i>She believed privacy to be a <b>requisite</b> for a peaceful life.</i>
<b><u>rudiment</u></b>	The remains of a body part that was functional at an earlier stage of life. <i>The fetal lung <b>rudiment</b>.</i>
<b><u>rudimentary</u></b>	Relating to an immature, undeveloped, or basic form. <i>These <b>rudimentary</b> truths.</i>
<b><u>staple</u></b>	Attach or secure with a staple or staples. <i>Merrill <b>stapled</b> a batch of papers together.</i>
<b><u>substantive</u></b>	Any word or group of words functioning as a noun. <i><b>Substantive</b> law.</i>
<b><u>vital</u></b>	Fatal. <i>He felt the familiar knot contract in his <b>vitals</b>.</i>
