#### Definitions of "Undeserved" as an adjective

- Not deserved or earned.

#### Synonyms of "Undeserved" as an adjective (5 Words)

gratuitous	Done without good reason; uncalled for. A <b>gratuitous</b> insult.
inessential	Not absolutely necessary. <i>Inessential</i> information.
needless	Unnecessary and unwarranted. I deplore <b>needless</b> waste.
unnecessary	Not needed. Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.
<u>unneeded</u>	Not needed. The disposal of <b>unneeded</b> assets.

biased	Favoring one person or side over another. We will not tolerate this <b>biased</b> media coverage.
condone	Accept (behaviour that is considered morally wrong or offensive. Those arrested were released and the exhibition was officially <b>condone</b> d a few weeks later.
dispensable	Capable of being dispensed with or done without. The captain s loss of form made him <b>dispensable</b> .
except	Take exception to. Five classes of advertisement are <b>except</b> ed from control.
<u>excess</u>	Excessive indulgence. Trying to lose <b>excess</b> weight.
extra	Excessive or extravagant. Breakfast is <b>extra</b> but there are tea and coffee facilities.
gratuitous	Without cause. Solicitors provide a form of <b>gratuitous</b> legal advice.
inequitable	Not equitable or fair. The <b>inequitable</b> division of wealth.
inequity	Injustice by virtue of not conforming with rules or standards. <i>Policies aimed at redressing racial <b>inequity</b>.</i>
iniquitous	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. These awards remain an <b>iniquitous</b> system.
<u>injustice</u>	An unjust act. She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora s remark.
lapse	Let slip. If your diet has <b>lapse</b> d it s time you revived it.
needless	Unnecessary and unwarranted. I deplore <b>needless</b> waste.
<u>neglect</u>	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. You <b>neglect</b> our advice at your peril.



<u>obscurity</u>	The quality of being unclear or abstruse and hard to understand. <i>He worked in <b>obscurity</b> for many years.</i>
<u>omit</u>	Prevent from being included or considered or accepted. <i>He was <b>omit</b>ted from the second Test.</i>
poverty	The state of having little or no money and few or no material possessions. <i>Thousands of families are living in abject</i> <b>poverty</b> .
redundance	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
redundant	(of words or data) able to be omitted without loss of meaning or function. <i>Most of the inflectional endings are <b>redundant</b>.</i>
<u>subjective</u>	The subjective case. There is always the danger of making a <b>subjective</b> judgement.
superfluous	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
supernumerary	A supernumerary person or thing. Extra ribs as well as other <b>supernumerary</b> internal parts.
<u>surplus</u>	An amount of something left over when requirements have been met; an excess of production or supply. She had picked up her boots in an army <b>surplus</b> store.
tortious	Constituting a tort; wrongful. <i>This does not make the act <b>tortious</b>.</i>
unfair	Not based on or behaving according to the principles of equality and justice. It would be <b>unfair</b> to blame her for the situation.
<u>unjust</u>	Not based on or behaving according to what is morally right and fair. <b>Unjust</b> punishment.
unmerited	Not merited or deserved. An <b>unmerited</b> insult.
unnecessary	Unnecessary things. Some people feel that holiday insurance is <b>unnecessary</b> .
<u>useless</u>	Having no ability or skill in a specified activity or area. We tried to pacify him but it was <b>useless</b> .
wrongly	In a way that is incorrect or mistaken. <b>Wrongly</b> interpreted results.
