### Definitions of "Undeserved" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “undeserved” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not warranted, merited, or earned.*
- *Not deserved or earned.*

### Synonyms of "Undeserved" as an adjective (5 Words)

<b>gratuitous</b>	Done without good reason; uncalled for. <i>A <b>gratuitous</b> insult.</i>
<b>inessential</b>	Not absolutely necessary. <i><b>Inessential</b> information.</i>
<b>needless</b>	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>I deplore <b>needless</b> waste.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Not needed. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.</i>
<b>unneeded</b>	Not needed. <i>The disposal of <b>unneeded</b> assets.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Undeserved" as an adjective

- *Has an undeserved reputation as a coward.*
- *An undeserved term of imprisonment.*

## Associations of "Undeserved" (30 Words)

<b>biased</b>	Favoring one person or side over another. <i>We will not tolerate this <b>biased</b> media coverage.</i>
<b>condone</b>	Accept (behaviour that is considered morally wrong or offensive). <i>Those arrested were released and the exhibition was officially <b>condoned</b> a few weeks later.</i>
<b>dispensable</b>	Capable of being dispensed with or done without. <i>The captain's loss of form made him <b>dispensable</b>.</i>
<b>except</b>	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are <b>excepted</b> from control.</i>
<a href="#"><u>excess</u></a>	Excessive indulgence. <i>Trying to lose <b>excess</b> weight.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Breakfast is <b>extra</b> but there are tea and coffee facilities.</i>
<b>gratuitous</b>	Without cause. <i>Solicitors provide a form of <b>gratuitous</b> legal advice.</i>
<b>inequitable</b>	Not equitable or fair. <i>The <b>inequitable</b> division of wealth.</i>
<b>inequity</b>	Injustice by virtue of not conforming with rules or standards. <i>Policies aimed at redressing racial <b>inequity</b>.</i>
<b>iniquitous</b>	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i>These awards remain an <b>iniquitous</b> system.</i>
<a href="#"><u>injustice</u></a>	An unjust act. <i>She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora's remark.</i>
<b>lapse</b>	Let slip. <i>If your diet has <b>lapsed</b> it's time you revived it.</i>
<b>needless</b>	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>I deplore <b>needless</b> waste.</i>
<a href="#"><u>neglect</u></a>	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>You <b>neglect</b> our advice at your peril.</i>

<b><u>obscurity</u></b>	The quality of being unclear or abstruse and hard to understand. <i>He worked in <b>obscurity</b> for many years.</i>
<b><u>omit</u></b>	Prevent from being included or considered or accepted. <i>He was <b>omitted</b> from the second Test.</i>
<b>poverty</b>	The state of having little or no money and few or no material possessions. <i>Thousands of families are living in abject <b>poverty</b>.</i>
<b>redundance</b>	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
<b>redundant</b>	(of words or data) able to be omitted without loss of meaning or function. <i>Most of the inflectional endings are <b>redundant</b>.</i>
<b><u>subjective</u></b>	The subjective case. <i>There is always the danger of making a <b>subjective</b> judgement.</i>
<b>superfluous</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b>supernumerary</b>	A supernumerary person or thing. <i>Extra ribs as well as other <b>supernumerary</b> internal parts.</i>
<b><u>surplus</u></b>	An amount of something left over when requirements have been met; an excess of production or supply. <i>She had picked up her boots in an army <b>surplus</b> store.</i>
<b>tortious</b>	Constituting a tort; wrongful. <i>This does not make the act <b>tortious</b>.</i>
<b>unfair</b>	Not based on or behaving according to the principles of equality and justice. <i>It would be <b>unfair</b> to blame her for the situation.</i>
<b><u>unjust</u></b>	Not based on or behaving according to what is morally right and fair. <i><b>Unjust</b> punishment.</i>
<b>unmerited</b>	Not merited or deserved. <i>An <b>unmerited</b> insult.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Unnecessary things. <i>Some people feel that holiday insurance is <b>unnecessary</b>.</i>
<b><u>useless</u></b>	Having no ability or skill in a specified activity or area. <i>We tried to pacify him but it was <b>useless</b>.</i>
<b><u>wrongly</u></b>	In a way that is incorrect or mistaken. <i><b>Wrongly</b> interpreted results.</i>
