## Undue as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Undue" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “undue” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate.*
- *Not appropriate or proper (or even legal) in the circumstances.*
- *Beyond normal limits.*
- *Not yet payable.*
- *Lacking justification or authorization.*

### Synonyms of "Undue" as an adjective (9 Words)

	Too large or too small in comparison with something else.
<b><u>disproportionate</u></b>	<i>Persistent offenders were given sentences that were <b>disproportionate</b> to the offences they had committed.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i><b>Excessive</b> charges.</i>
<b>extreme</b>	Most distant in any direction. <i><b>Extreme</b> cold.</i>

<b>immoderate</b>	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <b>Immoderate</b> spending.
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.
<b>intemperate</b>	Given to excessive indulgence of bodily appetites especially for intoxicating liquors. <b>Intemperate</b> zones.
<b><u>unjustified</u></b>	(of printed text) not justified. <b>Unjustified</b> price increases.
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Not guided by or based on good sense. She knew she was being <b>unreasonable</b> but she resented his domesticity.
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <b>Unwarranted</b> jealousy.

## Usage Examples of "Undue" as an adjective

- *Accused of using undue force.*
- *I didn't want to show undue excitement.*
- *This figure did not give rise to undue concern.*
- *Desire for undue private profit.*
- *His dress stops just short of undue elegance.*
- *Undue influence.*

## Associations of "Undue" (30 Words)

<b><u>arbitrary</u></b>	(of power or a ruling body) unrestrained and autocratic in the use of authority. <b>Arbitrary</b> division of the group into halves.
<b>exaggerated</b>	Enlarged or altered beyond normal proportions. An <b>exaggerated</b> opinion of oneself.
<b>excessive</b>	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.
<b>excessively</b>	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. They don't drink <b>excessively</b> .
<b>exorbitant</b>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <b>Exorbitant</b> rent.

<b>extravagant</b>	Recklessly wasteful. <i><b>Extravagant</b> praise.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To an extreme degree. <i><b>Extremely</b> interesting.</i>
<b>groundless</b>	Not based on any good reason. <i>The allegations proved <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <i><b>Immoderate</b> laughter.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	(of a course of action) impossible in practice to do or carry out. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved <b>impracticable</b> because of its fragility.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>This behaviour is morally <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.</i>
<b>insupportable</b>	Unable to be endured; intolerable. <i>He had arrived at a wholly <b>insupportable</b> conclusion.</i>
<b>intemperate</b>	Having or showing a lack of self-control; immoderate. <i><b>Intemperate</b> outbursts concerning global conspiracies.</i>
<b><u>over</u></b>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>He leant <b>over</b> and tapped me on the hand.</i>
<b><u>overly</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.</i>
<b>prodigal</b>	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <i><b>Prodigal</b> in their expenditures.</i>
<b>random</b>	Unfamiliar or unspecified. <i>Bombs fell at <b>random</b>.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>tiredness</b>	Temporary loss of strength and energy resulting from hard physical or mental work. <i><b>Tiredness</b> overcame her and she fell into a deep slumber.</i>
<b><u>too</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She is a grown woman and a strong one <b>too</b>.</i>

<b><u>unfounded</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i><b>Unfounded</b> suspicions.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b><u>unjustified</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i><b>Unjustified</b> price increases.</i>
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Not reasonable; not showing good judgment. <i>An <b>unreasonable</b> request.</i>
<b>unsupported</b>	(of a program, language, or device) not having assistance for the user available from a manufacturer or system manager. <i>A toddler who can stand <b>unsupported</b>.</i>
<b><u>untenable</u></b>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i><b>Unwarranted</b> jealousy.</i>
<b>weariness</b>	Reluctance to see or experience any more of something. <i>He began to feel <b>weariness</b>.</i>
