Definitions of "Undying" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “undying” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(especially of an emotion) lasting forever.*
- *Never dying.*

- abiding** (of a feeling or memory) lasting a long time; enduring.
*An **abiding** belief.*
- constant** Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection.
*A man **constant** in adherence to his ideals.*
- continuing** Of long duration.
*A **continuing** controversy.*
- deathless** Living or lasting forever; immortal.
*Pages of **deathless** prose.*
- enduring** Unceasing.
*He formed a number of **enduring** relationships with women.*
- infinite** Limitless or endless in space, extent, or size; impossible to measure or calculate.
*An **infinite** number of reasons.*
- lasting** Lasting a long time without change.

- perennial** (of a stream or spring) flowing throughout the year.
***Perennial** manifestations of urban crisis.*

permanent Continuing or enduring without marked change in status or condition or place.
*Literature of **permanent** value.*

ceaseless	Constant and unending. <i>The fort was subjected to ceaseless bombardment.</i>
changeless	Not subject or susceptible to change or variation in form or quality or nature. <i>Changeless truths.</i>
continually	Without interruption; constantly. <i>This information is continually updated.</i>
continuously	Repeatedly without exceptions or reversals. <i>These images loop continuously.</i>
devotion	Commitment to some purpose. <i>He returned to his devotions.</i>
endless	Having no known beginning and presumably no end. <i>An endless conversation.</i>
eternal	Used to emphasize expressions of admiration, gratitude, etc. <i>Eternal truths of art and life.</i>
everlasting	Eternity. <i>The damned would suffer everlasting torment.</i>
forever	For a limitless time. <i>No one can live forever.</i>
grinding	Material resulting from the process of grinding. <i>Crush it and add it to the honey with a grinding of pepper and salt.</i>
immortal	An immortal being especially a god of ancient Greece or Rome. <i>He will always be one of the immortals of soccer.</i>
immortality	The quality or state of being immortal. <i>Eating the fruit gave the gods immortality.</i>
immortalize	Confer enduring fame upon. <i>This melody immortalized its composer.</i>

incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
incessantly	With unflagging resolve. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
inexhaustible	Incapable of being entirely consumed or used up. <i>His inexhaustible energy.</i>
<u>infinite</u>	A space or quantity that is infinite. <i>Intimations of the infinite.</i>
<u>infinity</u>	The state or quality of being infinite. <i>An infinity of combinations.</i>
interminable	Endless or apparently endless (often used hyperbolically). <i>We got bogged down in interminable discussions.</i>
<u>permanent</u>	A series of waves in the hair made by applying heat and chemicals. <i>He s in a permanent state of rage.</i>
permanently	In a way that lasts or remains unchanged indefinitely; for all time. <i>He is permanently disabled.</i>
perpetual	(of an investment) having no fixed maturity date; irredeemable. <i>Their perpetual money worries.</i>
perpetually	In a way that never ends or changes; constantly. <i>She seems perpetually to have a mournful look on her face.</i>
<u>perpetuity</u>	A restriction making an interest in land inalienable perpetually or for a period beyond certain limits fixed by law. <i>He did not believe in the perpetuity of military rule.</i>
renewable	(of a contract, agreement, etc.) capable of being renewed. <i>A shift away from fossil fuels to renewable energy.</i>
<u>timeless</u>	Unaffected by time. <i>Helen s timeless beauty.</i>
unceasing	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Man s unceasing warfare with drought and isolation.</i>
unceasingly	With unflagging resolve.
<u>unchecked</u>	Not examined or checked. <i>The broadcast was sloppy it was unchecked there was no investigation of the facts.</i>
unlimited	(of a problem) having an infinite number of solutions. <i>Offshore reserves of gas and oil are not unlimited.</i>
