businesslike	(of clothing, furniture, etc.) designed or appearing to be practical rather than decorative. <i>His brisk businesslike tone.</i>
calm	(of the weather) pleasantly free from wind. <i>The night was clear and calm.</i>
clinical	Relating to the observation and treatment of actual patients rather than theoretical or laboratory studies. <i>He spoke in the clipped clinical monotones typical of police testimony.</i>
cold	Extended meanings especially of psychological coldness without human warmth or emotion. <i>Elise was cold and barren.</i>
collected	In full control of your faculties. <i>The collected works of Milton.</i>
composed	Having one's feelings and expression under control; calm. <i>The performer seemed completely composed as she stepped onto the stage.</i>
controlled	Under the control of someone or something. <i>A sentence for possessing controlled substances.</i>
cool	Psychologically cool and unenthusiastic unfriendly or unresponsive or showing dislike. <i>He prided himself on keeping a cool head.</i>
cool, calm, and collected	Without exaggeration or qualification.
detached	Being or feeling set or kept apart from others. <i>He is a detached observer of his own actions.</i>
disinterested	Having or feeling no interest in something; uninterested. <i>Her father was so disinterested in her progress that he only visited the school once.</i>
distant	Separate or apart in time. <i>His children found him strangely distant.</i>
emotionless	Unmoved by feeling-Margaret Deland. <i>Her voice was flat and emotionless.</i>
equable	Not varying. <i>He could look sterner than his equable temperament would suggest.</i>
frigid	Sexually unresponsive. <i>Frigid water.</i>

impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>He remained impassive showing neither interest in nor concern for our plight.</i>
<u>impersonal</u>	Not influenced by, showing, or involving personal feelings. <i>The impersonal power of a government.</i>
indifferent	Lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other. <i>Indifferent to her plea.</i>
level-headed	Exercising or showing good judgment.
passionless	Unmoved by feeling-Margaret Deland. <i>The voice is passionless monotone.</i>
phlegmatic	Showing little emotion. <i>The phlegmatic British character.</i>
rational	Based on or in accordance with reason or logic. <i>Rational numbers.</i>
<u>remote</u>	(of an electronic device) operating or operated at a distance by means of radio or infrared signals. <i>A remote contingency.</i>
<u>reserved</u>	Marked by self-restraint and reticence-Victoria Sackville-West. <i>A reserved seat.</i>
restrained	Held in place (used especially of a person in a vehicle secured by a seat belt). <i>The drawings with their restrained colours give a feeling of peace and contemplation.</i>
<u>reticent</u>	Reluctant to draw attention to yourself. <i>She was extremely reticent about her personal affairs.</i>
<u>serene</u>	Calm, peaceful, and untroubled; tranquil. <i>A serene expression on her face.</i>
<u>sober</u>	Serious, sensible, and solemn. <i>A sober grey suit.</i>
stoical	Enduring pain and hardship without showing one's feelings or complaining. <i>He taught a stoical acceptance of suffering.</i>
<u>tranquil</u>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>The sea was tranquil.</i>
unagitated	Not physically disturbed or set in motion.

<u>unconcerned</u>	Not occupied or engaged with. <i>The average American is unconcerned that his or her plight is the result of a complex of personal and economic and governmental actions beyond the normal citizen's comprehension and control.</i>
undemonstrative	Not given to open expression of emotion. <i>The English are an undemonstrative lot.</i>
unexcitable	Not easily excited. <i>An unexcitable temperament.</i>
unfeeling	Devoid of feeling for others. <i>He lowered his numb unfeeling body into a seat and closed his eyes.</i>
unmoved	Emotionally unmoved. <i>He was clearly unmoved by her outburst.</i>
<u>unresponsive</u>	Not susceptible to suggestion or influence. <i>Was unresponsive to her passionate advances.</i>
unruffled	Free from emotional agitation or nervous tension- Anthony Trollope. <i>With contented mind and unruffled spirit.</i>
unsentimental	Not displaying or influenced by sentimental feelings. <i>The speeches were short and unsentimental.</i>

Usage Examples of "Unemotional" as an adjective

- *A flat, unemotional voice.*
