- *Having sexual relations with someone other than your husband or wife, or your boyfriend or girlfriend.*
- *Not trustworthy.*

<b>fickle</b>	Changing frequently, especially as regards one's loyalties or affections. <i>Fickle weather.</i>
<b>flighty</b>	Guided by whim and fancy. <i>Her mother was a <b>flighty</b> Southern belle.</i>
<b>inconstant</b>	Likely to change frequently often without apparent or cogent reason; variable. <i>The most <b>inconstant</b> man in the world.</i>
<b>insincere</b>	Not expressing genuine feelings. <i>She flashed him an <b>insincere</b> smile.</i>
<b>janus-faced</b>	Having or concerned with polarities or contrasts.
<b>perfidious</b>	Deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>A <b>perfidious</b> lover.</i>
<b>traitorous</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. <i>A lying <b>traitorous</b> insurrectionist.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i><b>Treacherous</b> winding roads.</i>
<b>treasonable</b>	(of an offence or offender) punishable as treason or as committing treason. <i>There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.</i>
<b>treasonous</b>	Involving or guilty of the betrayal of someone or something. <i>It seems almost <b>treasonous</b> to criticize the film.</i>
<b>two-faced</b>	Marked by deliberate deceptiveness especially by pretending one set of feelings and acting under the influence of another- Israel Zangwill.
<b>undependable</b>	Liable to be erroneous or misleading. <i>An <b>undependable</b> assistant.</i>
<b>unreliable</b>	Not worthy of reliance or trust. <i>An <b>unreliable</b> trestle.</i>
<b>untrue</b>	Not true to an obligation or trust-Bruno Laske. <i>Off level floors and <b>untrue</b> doors and windows.</i>
<b>untrustworthy</b>	Not worthy of trust or belief. <i>Thomas considered her to be devious and <b>untrustworthy</b>.</i>

Be sexually unfaithful to one's partner in marriage.

The spy **betrayed** his country.

An act of deliberate betrayal.

The **betrayal** by the king by his daughter.

<b>cheat</b>	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>She <b>cheats</b> on her husband.</i>
<b>cheating</b>	Not faithful to a spouse or lover.
<b><u>deceit</u></b>	The action or practice of deceiving someone by concealing or misrepresenting the truth. <i>Hypocrisy and <b>deceit</b> were anathema to her.</i>
<b>deceive</b>	(of a thing) give (someone) a mistaken impression. <i>He had <b>deceived</b> her with another woman.</i>
<b>dishonesty</b>	The quality of being dishonest. <i>The dismissal of thirty civil servants for <b>dishonesty</b> and misconduct.</i>
<b><u>disloyal</u></b>	(of a remark or thought) demonstrating a lack of loyalty. <i>She was accused of being <b>disloyal</b> to the government.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>Her <b>faithless</b> lover.</i>
<b>fickle</b>	Marked by erratic changeableness in affections or attachments. <i>Celebs trying to appeal to an increasingly <b>fickle</b> public.</i>
<b>inconstant</b>	Likely to change frequently often without apparent or cogent reason; variable. <i><b>Inconstant</b> affections.</i>
<b>infidelity</b>	Disbelief in a particular religion, especially Christianity. <i>Her <b>infidelity</b> continued after her marriage.</i>
<b>insurgent</b>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority (especially in the hope of improving conditions). <i>Alleged links with <b>insurgent</b> groups.</i>
<b>mutinous</b>	Wilful or disobedient. <i>Antoinette looked <b>mutinous</b> but she obeyed.</i>
<b>perfidious</b>	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>The <b>perfidious</b> Judas.</i>
<b><u>rebel</u></b>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>Respect did not prevent children from <b>rebelling</b> against their parents.</i>
<b><u>rebellious</u></b>	Discontented as toward authority. <i>Temperamentally <b>rebellious</b>.</i>
<b><u>renegade</u></b>	Become a renegade. <i>A <b>renegade</b> monk.</i>

<b><u>traitor</u></b>	A person who says one thing and does another. <i>He was a <b>traitor</b> to his own class.</i>
<b><u>traitorous</u></b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>When his <b>traitorous</b> actions were discovered he was imprisoned.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i><b>Treacherous</b> winding roads.</i>
<b>treasonable</b>	(of an offence or offender) punishable as treason or as committing treason. <i>There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.</i>
<b>trick</b>	A period of work or duty. <i>She thought Elaine was playing some <b>trick</b> on her.</i>
<b><u>turncoat</u></b>	A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc. <i>They denounced him as a <b>turncoat</b>.</i>
<b>unbelief</b>	Lack of religious belief; an absence of faith. <i>The darkness of <b>unbelief</b>.</i>
<b>unreliable</b>	Not able to be relied upon. <i>An <b>unreliable</b> trestle.</i>
<b><u>untrue</u></b>	(used especially of persons) not dependable in devotion or affection; unfaithful. <i>Unfortunately the statement was simply <b>untrue</b>.</i>
<b>untrustworthy</b>	Not able to be relied on as honest or truthful. <i>An <b>untrustworthy</b> person.</i>
<b><u>volatile</u></b>	A volatile substance. <i><b>Volatile</b> solvents.</i>
