- Incapable of being fully explored or understood.
- Resembling an abyss in depth; so deep as to be unmeasurable.
- (of water or a natural feature) impossible to measure the extent of.

Synonyms of "Unfathomable" as an adjective (24 Words)

abstruse	Difficult to understand; obscure. An abstruse philosophical inquiry.
abysmal	Very great; limitless. Abysmal stupidity.



abyssal	Relating to or denoting the depths or bed of the ocean, especially between about 3000 and 6000 metres down. The abyssal depths of the Atlantic.
baffling	Making great mental demands; hard to comprehend or solve or believe. The crime is a baffling mystery for the police.
bottomless	Having no bottom. The cold dark sea in whose bottomless depths monsters swam.
<u>cryptic</u>	Having a puzzling terseness. <i>The new insurance policy is written without</i> cryptic or mysterious <i>terms</i> .
deep	Relatively deep or strong affecting one deeply. Deep midwicket.
enigmatic	Not clear to the understanding. I didn t grasp the meaning of that enigmatic comment until much later.
esoteric	Confined to and understandable by only an enlightened inner circle. A compilation of esoteric philosophical theories.
fathomless	Unable to be measured or understood; extremely deep. The fathomless depths of the novel.
<u>immeasurable</u>	Too large, extensive, or extreme to measure. <i>Immeasurable</i> wealth.
incalculable	Not able to be computed or enumerated. <i>Incalculable riches</i> .
incomprehensible	Not able to be understood; not intelligible. The most incomprehensible thing about the universe is that it is comprehensible.
indecipherable	Impossible to determine the meaning of. <i>Indecipherable</i> handwriting.
inscrutable	Of an obscure nature- Rachel. <i>Guy looked blankly inscrutable.</i>
mysterious	Of an obscure nature. A dark mysterious windowless building.
mystifying	Utterly bewildering or perplexing. Rituals totally mystifying to visitors from other lands.
<u>obscure</u>	Marked by difficulty of style or expression. An obscure turn of phrase.



profound	Deep and complete. A case of profound liver failure.
puzzling	Lacking clarity of meaning; causing confusion or perplexity. A puzzling statement.
secretive	(of a person's expression or manner) having an enigmatic or conspiratorial quality. <i>She was very</i> secretive about her past.
unfathomed	Not fully explored or understood. Throughout the book her emotions remain relatively opaque and unfathomed .
unplumbed	Situated at or extending to great depth; too deep to have been sounded or plumbed-Thomas Gray. <i>Unplumbed</i> depths of the sea.
unsounded	Not uttered, pronounced, or made to sound. In French certain letters are often unsounded .

abysmal	Very deep. Abysmal misery.
<u>arcane</u>	Understood by few; mysterious or secret. <i>The arcane science of dowsing.</i>
crossword	A puzzle in which words corresponding to numbered clues are to be found and written in to squares in the puzzle. <i>She settled down to do the crossword</i> .
<u>cryptic</u>	Of an obscure nature. <i>The new insurance policy is written without</i> cryptic or mysterious <i>terms.</i>
darkness	An unenlightened state. The office was in darkness .
<u>disappearance</u>	Ceasing to exist. <i>He regretted the disappearance of Greek from school curricula.</i>



A person or thing that is mysterious or difficult to understand. Madeleine was still an enigma to him.
Difficult to interpret or understand; mysterious. An enigmatic smile.
Esoteric or highly specialized subjects or publications. A professor of such esoterica as angelology and comparative shamanism.
Too large, extensive, or extreme to measure. <i>Immeasurable</i> wealth.
Difficult to understand- A. Einstein. A language which is incomprehensible to anyone outside the office.
Unable to be explained or accounted for. For some inexplicable reason her mind went completely blank.
Of an obscure nature- Rachel. The inscrutable workings of Providence.
Without hope of solution. Once dry the paints become insoluble in water.
(of a person) deliberately enigmatic. In its mysterious past it encompasses all the dim origins of life.
An incident in the life of Jesus or of a saint as a focus of devotion in the Roman Catholic Church, especially each of those commemorated during recitation of successive decades of the rosary. <i>The mystery of Christ.</i>
Supernatural practices and techniques. An occult fracture.
An indefinite quantity more than that specified. They lost a close fought game by the odd goal in five.
Beyond what is normal or natural. Autumn had arrived with preternatural speed.
Profound quality. A profound philosopher.
A jigsaw puzzle. Realization dawned as the pieces of the puzzle fell into place.
Lacking clarity of meaning; causing confusion or perplexity. A puzzling statement.
Suggestive of sexual impropriety. A risque story.



sibylline	Having a secret or hidden meaning- John Gunther. One glimpses them uttering sibylline predictions of weal and woe.
unaccountable	(of a person or their behaviour) unpredictable and strange. There are enormous risks in leaving such agencies uncontrolled and unaccountable .
uncanny	Surpassing the ordinary or normal – George Will. His uncanny sense of direction.
unintelligible	Not clearly understood or expressed. Unintelligible speech.
<u>unsolved</u>	Not solved. An unsolved mystery.
weird	A person's destiny. All sorts of weird and wonderful characters.
whodunit	A story about a crime (usually murder) presented as a novel or play or movie.
