groundless	Not based on any good reason. The allegations proved <b>groundless</b> .	
idle	(especially of a machine or factory) not active or in use. <i>Idle talk</i> .	
not backed up by evidence Of an earlier date.		
unattested	Not existing in any documented form. <i>If a will contains <b>unattested</b> changes the changes will be disregarded.</i>	



unconfirmed	Not confirmed as to truth or validity. An <b>unconfirmed</b> report of shots being fired.
uncorroborated	Not confirmed or supported by other evidence or information. The unreliability of <b>uncorroborated</b> confessions.
<u>unjustified</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <b>Unjustified</b> price increases.
<u>unproven</u>	Not demonstrated by evidence or argument to be true or existing. <i>The risks are <b>unproven</b></i> .
unsubstantiated	Not supported or proven by evidence. <i>Unsubstantiated claims</i> .
unsupported	(of a program, language, or device) not having assistance for the user available from a manufacturer or system manager. <i>Removal of the central post left the roof</i> <b>unsupported</b> .
untested	Not tried or tested by experience. An <b>untested</b> drug.
unverified	Lacking proof or substantiation. <b>Unverified</b> assumptions about the past had to be excluded.
<u>unwarranted</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <b>Unwarranted</b> limitations of personal freedom.
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. A <b>wild</b> guess.

### Usage Examples of "Unfounded" as an adjective

- Unfounded suspicions.
- Her fear that she had cancer was unfounded.

# Associations of "Unfounded" (30 Words)

absurd	An absurd state of affairs. The allegations are patently <b>absurd</b> .
apostasy	The abandonment or renunciation of a religious or political belief or principle. The execution of their leader for <b>apostasy</b> brought widespread criticism.
excessive	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>



gossip	A conversation about other people an instance of gossiping. They would start <b>gossip</b> ing about her as soon as she left.
groundless	Not based on any good reason. The allegations proved <b>groundless</b> .
illogical	Lacking orderly continuity. An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.
impossible	Totally unlikely. What an arrogant <b>impossible</b> fool.
impracticable	(of a course of action) impossible in practice to do or carry out. It was <b>impracticable</b> to widen the road here.
imprudent	Not prudent or wise. Would be <b>imprudent</b> for a noneconomist to talk about the details of economic policy.
<u>incoherent</u>	(of a person) unable to speak intelligibly. <i>Incoherent</i> with grief.
indefensible	Incapable of being defended or justified. The towns were tactically <b>indefensible</b> .
inexcusable	Without excuse or justification. <i>Matt s behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.
insuperable	Impossible to surmount. <i>Insuperable</i> financial problems.
insupportable	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>The heat was <b>insupportable</b></i> .
<u>invalid</u>	A person made weak or disabled by illness or injury. <i>She spent the rest of her life as an <b>invalid</b>.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i>Irrational feelings of hostility.</i>
ludicrous	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>Ludicrous</i> green hair.
preposterous	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.
<u>undue</u>	Not yet payable. His dress stops just short of <b>undue</b> elegance.
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Incapable of being justified or explained. An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.



<u>unjustified</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <b>Unjustified</b> price increases.
unpardonable	(of a fault or offence) too severe to be pardoned; unforgivable. An <b>unpardonable</b> sin.
<u>unreasonable</u>	Not guided by or based on good sense. <b>Unreasonable</b> demands.
unsubstantiated	Not supported or proven by evidence. <i>Unsubstantiated claims</i> .
unsupported	Not borne out by evidence or facts. Removal of the central post left the roof <b>unsupported</b> .
<u>untenable</u>	(especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b></i> .
<u>untrue</u>	Not true to an obligation or trust-Bruno Laske. Is <b>untrue</b> to his highest opportunity and duty.
<u>unwarranted</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <b>Unwarranted</b> jealousy.
<u>unwise</u>	Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom. <i>Unwise</i> policy decisions.
