co-ordinated	Intentionally matched.
coordinated	Operating as a unit. <i>Curtains and walls were color coordinated.</i>
incorporate	Having a bodily form; embodied. <i>Through an incorporate resilience slighted confidence restores itself.</i>
incorporated	Organized and maintained as a legal corporation. <i>An incorporated town.</i>
integrated	With various parts or aspects linked or coordinated. <i>An integrated public transport system.</i>
<u>interconnected</u>	Reciprocally connected. <i>We live in a globalized interconnected world.</i>
merged	Formed or united into a whole.

Associations of "Unified" (30 Words)

amalgamate	Alloy (a metal) with mercury. <i>He amalgamated his company with another.</i>
coalesced	Joined together into a whole.
coalescing	Growing together, fusing.
cohesion	The sticking together of particles of the same substance. <i>The work at present lacks cohesion.</i>
<u>cohesive</u>	Characterized by or causing cohesion. <i>A cohesive organization.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>High tides and winds combined to bring chaos to the east coast.</i>
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
<u>communal</u>	For or by a group rather than individuals. <i>A communal bathroom and kitchen.</i>
concerted	Done with great effort or determination. <i>A concerted attempt to preserve religious unity.</i>
<u>concord</u>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>Their ideas concorded.</i>
<u>consolidate</u>	Make or form into a solid or hardened mass. <i>The Companies Act 1948 and subsequent enactments were consolidated by the Companies Act 1985.</i>
coordinated	Being dexterous in the use of more than one set of muscle movements- Mary McCarthy. <i>She was usually good with her hands and well coordinated.</i>
federate	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>He resisted British attempts to federate Barbados with neighbouring islands.</i>
<u>harmony</u>	A harmonious state of things in general and of their properties (as of colors and sounds); congruity of parts with one another and with the whole. <i>Man and machine in perfect harmony.</i>
incorporated	Formed or united into a whole. <i>An incorporated town.</i>
indissoluble	Incapable of being dissolved. <i>An indissoluble friendship.</i>

indivisible	Impossible of undergoing division. <i>One nation indivisible.</i>
inseparable	A person or thing inseparable from another. <i>Research and higher education seem inseparable.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>The protest forced the bus companies to integrate the buses.</i>
integrated	Indicating the mean value or total sum of a variable quantity of property. <i>Society as an integrated whole.</i>
joint	A section of a plant stem between two joints an internode. <i>Cut just below a leaf joint.</i>
one	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i>Three chemicals combining into one solution.</i>
oneness	The state of being in harmony with someone or something. <i>Holding to the oneness of God the Father as the only God.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea reunify.</i>
<u>solidarity</u>	An independent trade union movement in Poland which developed into a mass campaign for political change and inspired popular opposition to Communist regimes across eastern Europe. Formed in 1980 under the leadership of Lech Wałęsa, it was banned in 1981 following the imposition of martial law. Legalized again in 1989, it won a majority in the elections of that year. <i>Factory workers voiced solidarity with the striking students.</i>
together	Mentally and emotionally stable. <i>She looks a very together young woman.</i>
undifferentiated	Not different or differentiated. <i>By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet undifferentiated between male and female.</i>
unification	The process of being united or made into a whole. <i>There were conversations about unification between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>
<u>united</u>	Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>

Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action.
