<b>coordinated</b>	Operating as a unit. <i>Curtains and walls were color <b>coordinated</b>.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Having a bodily form; embodied. <i>Through an <b>incorporate</b> resilience slighted confidence restores itself.</i>
<b>incorporated</b>	Organized and maintained as a legal corporation. <i>An <b>incorporated</b> town.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	With various parts or aspects linked or coordinated. <i>An <b>integrated</b> public transport system.</i>
<b><u>interconnected</u></b>	Reciprocally connected. <i>We live in a globalized <b>interconnected</b> world.</i>
<b>merged</b>	Formed or united into a whole.

## Associations of "Unified" (30 Words)

<b>amalgamate</b>	Alloy (a metal) with mercury. <i>He <b>amalgamated</b> his company with another.</i>
<b>coalesced</b>	Joined together into a whole.
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b>cohesion</b>	The sticking together of particles of the same substance. <i>The work at present lacks <b>cohesion</b>.</i>
<b><u>cohesive</u></b>	Characterized by or causing cohesion. <i>A <b>cohesive</b> organization.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>High tides and winds <b>combined</b> to bring chaos to the east coast.</i>
<b>combined</b>	Made or joined or united into one.
<b><u>communal</u></b>	For or by a group rather than individuals. <i>A <b>communal</b> bathroom and kitchen.</i>
<b>concerted</b>	Done with great effort or determination. <i>A <b>concerted</b> attempt to preserve religious unity.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>Their ideas <b>concorded</b>.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Make or form into a solid or hardened mass. <i>The Companies Act 1948 and subsequent enactments were <b>consolidated</b> by the Companies Act 1985.</i>
<b>coordinated</b>	Being dexterous in the use of more than one set of muscle movements- Mary McCarthy. <i>She was usually good with her hands and well <b>coordinated</b>.</i>
<b>federate</b>	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>He resisted British attempts to <b>federate</b> Barbados with neighbouring islands.</i>
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	A harmonious state of things in general and of their properties (as of colors and sounds); congruity of parts with one another and with the whole. <i>Man and machine in perfect <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>incorporated</b>	Formed or united into a whole. <i>An <b>incorporated</b> town.</i>
<b>indissoluble</b>	Incapable of being dissolved. <i>An <b>indissoluble</b> friendship.</i>

<b>indivisible</b>	Impossible of undergoing division. <i>One nation <b>indivisible</b>.</i>
<b>inseparable</b>	A person or thing inseparable from another. <i>Research and higher education seem <b>inseparable</b>.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>The protest forced the bus companies to <b>integrate</b> the buses.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	Indicating the mean value or total sum of a variable quantity of property. <i>Society as an <b>integrated</b> whole.</i>
<b>joint</b>	A section of a plant stem between two joints an internode. <i>Cut just below a leaf <b>joint</b>.</i>
<b>one</b>	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i>Three chemicals combining into <b>one</b> solution.</i>
<b>oneness</b>	The state of being in harmony with someone or something. <i>Holding to the <b>oneness</b> of God the Father as the only God.</i>
<b>reunify</b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</i>
<b><u>solidarity</u></b>	An independent trade union movement in Poland which developed into a mass campaign for political change and inspired popular opposition to Communist regimes across eastern Europe. Formed in 1980 under the leadership of Lech Wałęsa, it was banned in 1981 following the imposition of martial law. Legalized again in 1989, it won a majority in the elections of that year. <i>Factory workers voiced <b>solidarity</b> with the striking students.</i>
<b>together</b>	Mentally and emotionally stable. <i>She looks a very <b>together</b> young woman.</i>
<b>undifferentiated</b>	Not different or differentiated. <i>By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet <b>undifferentiated</b> between male and female.</i>
<b>unification</b>	The process of being united or made into a whole. <i>There were conversations about <b>unification</b> between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation. <i>Women acting together in a <b>united</b> way.</i>
