- suit** A businessman dressed in a business suit.
*They buried him in his best **suit**.*

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| equal | Having the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task. <i>The players proved equal to the task.</i> |
| even | Being level or straight or regular and without variation as e.g. in shape or texture or being in the same plane or at the same height as something else i.e. even with. <i>Had a fifty fifty or even chance.</i> |
| fixed | Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>Living on fixed incomes.</i> |
| <u>homogeneous</u> | Denoting a process involving substances in the same phase (solid, liquid, or gaseous). <i>A homogeneous society.</i> |
| <u>identical</u> | Coinciding exactly when superimposed. <i>Identical twins are monovular.</i> |
| indistinguishable | Not capable of being distinguished or differentiated. <i>The twins were indistinguishable.</i> |
| invariable | (of a quantity) constant. <i>His invariable courtesy.</i> |
| matching | Intentionally matched. <i>The college will provide matching funds to complete the project.</i> |
| <u>monotonous</u> | Sounded or spoken in a tone unvarying in pitch. <i>The owl's faint monotonous hooting.</i> |
| regular | Regularly scheduled for fixed times. <i>Plant the flags at regular intervals.</i> |
| similar | Resembling or similar having the same or some of the same characteristics often used in combination. <i>Similar food at similar prices.</i> |
| <u>stable</u> | Sane and sensible; not easily upset or disturbed. <i>Specially designed dinghies that are very stable.</i> |
| <u>static</u> | Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>The whole ballet appeared too static.</i> |
| <u>steady</u> | Not subject to change or variation especially in behavior. <i>A solid steady young man.</i> |
| sustained | Continuing for an extended period or without interruption. <i>Sustained flight.</i> |
| the same | Unchanged in character or nature. |

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| <u>twin</u> | Of a crystal twinned. <i>Her twin sister.</i> |
| <u>unchanging</u> | Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i> |
| undeviating | Showing no deviation; constant and steady. <i>The undeviating loyalty of his wife.</i> |
| undifferentiated | Not different or differentiated. <i>By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet undifferentiated between male and female.</i> |
| unfluctuating | Not liable to fluctuate or especially to fall. |
| unvaried | Lacking variety. <i>A plain unvaried diet.</i> |
| unvarying | Unvarying in nature. <i>The unvarying routine of parsonage life.</i> |
| <u>unwavering</u> | Not showing abrupt variations- Louis Auchincloss. <i>Unwavering loyalty.</i> |

- At regular (or uniform) intervals.
- A street of uniform tall white buildings.
- Blocks of stone of uniform size.
- Black uniform jackets.

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| clad | Covered with cladding. <i>White clad nurses.</i> |
| clothed | Covered with or as if with clothes or a wrap or cloak. <i>Leaf clothed trees.</i> |
| clothes | Bedclothes. <i>Rosie got into bed and pulled the clothes up to her nose.</i> |
| clothing | Clothes collectively. <i>Bring warm clothing and waterproofs.</i> |
| corset | Dress with a corset. |
| <u>dress</u> | Add a dressing to a salad. <i>He dressed up in a suit and tie.</i> |
| <u>dressed</u> | Dressed or clothed especially in fine attire often used in combination. <i>Serve with dressed salad leaves.</i> |
| footwear | Covering for a person's feet. |
| gown | Put on a surgical gown. <i>The relations between town and gown are always sensitive.</i> |
| hosiery | Stockings, socks, and tights collectively. |
| hussar | A soldier in a light cavalry regiment which had adopted a dress uniform modelled on that of the Hungarian hussars now only in titles. <i>The Queen's Royal Irish Hussars.</i> |
| invariable | (of a quantity) constant. <i>An invariable temperature.</i> |
| jean | Close-fitting trousers of heavy denim for manual work or casual wear. <i>A jean jacket.</i> |
| legging | A garment covering the leg (usually extending from the knee to the ankle. |
| <u>outfit</u> | Provide with equipment. <i>Warders outfitted in special suits.</i> |
| <u>pants</u> | Underpants worn by women. <i>He thought we were going to be absolute pants.</i> |
| <u>robe</u> | Clothe in a robe or long loose outer garment. <i>The Chamberlain robed the king on coronation day.</i> |
| sandal | A shoe consisting of a sole fastened by straps to the foot. <i>They were dressed in open toed sandals.</i> |
| <u>shoes</u> | A particular situation. |
| skimpy | Providing or consisting of less than is needed; meagre. <i>A skimpy dress.</i> |

- swimsuit** A woman's one-piece swimming costume.
- undergarment** A garment worn under other garments.
- underwear** Clothing worn under other clothes, typically next to the skin.
- uniformed** Dressed in a uniform.
***Uniformed** policemen lined the President's route.*
- vestment** Gown (especially ceremonial garments) worn by the clergy.
*A priest in green **vestments** came and preached a long sermon.*
- wear** The wearing of something or the state of being worn as clothing.
*She was **wearing** yellow that day.*
