## Unify as a Verb

### Definitions of "Unify" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unify” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Bring together for a common purpose or action or ideology or in a shared situation.*
- *Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief.*
- *Become one.*
- *To bring or combine together or with something else.*
- *Make or become united, uniform, or whole.*
- *Join or combine.*



## Synonyms of "Unify" as a verb (21 Words)

- amalgamate** Alloy (a metal) with mercury.  
*He **amalgamated** his company with another.*
- bind** Of a quantifier be applied to a given variable so that the variable falls within its scope For example in an expression of the form For every x if x is a dog x is an animal the universal quantifier is binding the variable x.  
*We have many ties that **bind** us historical cultural and economical.*
- blend** Blend or harmonize.  
*Costumes music and lighting all **blend** together beautifully.*
- bring together** Be sold for a certain price.
- coalesce** Mix together different elements.  
*His idea served to **coalesce** all that happened into one connected whole.*
- combine** Combine so as to form a whole mix.  
*High tides and winds **combined** to bring chaos to the east coast.*
- commix** Mix; mingle.  
*Beat them till they be thoroughly **commixed**.*
- consolidate** Form into a solid mass or whole.  
*The town and county schools are being **consolidated**.*

<b>federate</b>	Unite on a federal basis or band together as a league. <i>In 1901 the six colonies <b>federated</b> to form the Commonwealth of Australia.</i>
<b>fuse</b>	Cause an electrical appliance to stop working when a fuse melts. <i>Powdered glass was <b>fused</b> to a metal base.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being <b>integrated</b> into the development.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>After the show we were <b>joined</b> by Jessica s sister.</i>
<b>join together</b>	Make contact or come together.
<b>link up</b>	Connect, fasten, or put together two or more pieces.
<b>marry</b>	Perform a marriage ceremony. <i>They had no plans to <b>marry</b>.</i>
<b>merge</b>	Absorb (a title or estate) in another. <i>The merchant bank <b>merged</b> with another broker.</i>
<b>mingle</b>	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>A smell which <b>mingled</b> disinfectant and soap.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix together different elements. <i><b>Mixing</b> concrete is hard physical work.</i>
<b>synthesize</b>	Make (something) by synthesis, especially chemically. <i>Pupils should <b>synthesize</b> the data they have gathered.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The two Germanys officially <b>united</b>.</i>
<b>weld together</b>	Unite closely or intimately.

## Usage Examples of "Unify" as a verb

- *The government hoped to centralize and unify the nation.*
- *Opposition groups struggling to unify around the goal of replacing the regime.*

## Associations of "Unify" (30 Words)

<b>ally</b>	A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose. <i>He s a good <b>ally</b> in fight.</i>
<b>amalgamate</b>	Joined together into a whole. <i>He <b>amalgamated</b> his company with another.</i>

<b>annex</b>	Add or attach as a condition or consequence. <i>Extreme anointing hath neither ordinance of God to be grounded on nor promise of grace <b>annexed</b>.</i>
<b>blend</b>	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>She would have to employ a permanent bodyguard in the house someone who would <b>blend</b> in.</i>
<b>coalesce</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>The puddles had <b>coalesced</b> into shallow streams.</i>
<b>coalesced</b>	Joined together into a whole.
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b>coeducation</b>	Education of men and women in the same institutions.
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>A new product which <b>combines</b> the benefits of a hairspray and a gel.</i>
<b>combined</b>	Made or joined or united into one.
<b>commingle</b>	Mix; blend. <i>The part of the brain where the senses <b>commingle</b>.</i>
<b>confederacy</b>	A union of people or groups formed for an illicit purpose. <i>The Yakuza is a secret <b>confederacy</b> of criminal fraternities.</i>
<b>conjugate</b>	A mixture of two partially miscible liquids A and B produces two conjugate solutions one of A in B and another of B in A. <i><b>Conjugate</b> the verb.</i>
<b>consolidate</b>	Make firm or secure; strengthen. <i>The town and county schools are being <b>consolidated</b>.</i>
<b>consolidation</b>	The act of combining into an integral whole. <i>A <b>consolidation</b> of data within an enterprise.</i>
<b>converge</b>	Approach a limit as the number of terms increases without limit. <i>The crowd <b>converged</b> on the movie star.</i>
<b>federate</b>	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>The country was <b>federated</b> after the civil war.</i>
<b>flux</b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The whole political system is in a state of <b>flux</b>.</i>
<b>incorporation</b>	Learning (of values or attitudes etc.) that is incorporated within yourself. <i>The City Council opposed all new <b>incorporations</b>.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being <b>integrated</b> into the development.</i>
<b>integration</b>	The intermixing of people who were previously segregated. <i>Mathematical <b>integrations</b>.</i>

<b><u>meld</u></b>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A <b>meld</b> of many contributions.</i>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	Mix together different elements. <i>We <b>merged</b> our resources.</i>
<b>reunify</b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</i>
<b><u>solidify</u></b>	Make solid or more solid cause to solidify. <i>Social and political pressures helped to <b>solidify</b> national identities.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	(in Hegelian philosophy) the final stage in the process of dialectical reasoning, in which a new idea resolves the conflict between thesis and antithesis. <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of methanol from carbon monoxide and hydrogen.</i>
<b><u>union</u></b>	The operation of forming a union. <i>He was opposed to closer political or economic <b>union</b> with Europe.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>He called on the party to <b>unite</b>.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
<b>weld</b>	Forge an article by welding. <i>Her gratitude <b>welded</b> her to him.</i>
