Definitions of "Unilateral" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unilateral” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Tracing descent from either the paternal or the maternal line only.*
- *Relating to or affecting only one side of an organ, the body, or another structure.*
- *Involving only one part or side.*
- *(of an action or decision) performed by or affecting only one person, group, or country involved in a situation, without the agreement of another or the others.*

<u>determination</u>	The act of making up your mind about something. <i>His determination showed in his every movement.</i>
determine	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>She determined to tackle Stephen the next day.</i>
deterministic	Relating to the philosophical doctrine that all events, including human action, are ultimately determined by causes regarded as external to the will. <i>A deterministic theory.</i>
direct	Direct the course determine the direction of travelling. <i>A direct route.</i>
<u>exclusive</u>	Catering for or available to only a few, select customers; high class and expensive. <i>One of Britain s most exclusive clubs.</i>
firmness	Resolute determination and strength of character. <i>I felt the firmness of his upper arm.</i>

individually	In a distinctive manner. <i>Taken individually the rooms were in fact square.</i>
irrevocable	Incapable of being retracted or revoked- Shakespeare. <i>Firm and irrevocable is my doom.</i>
lineal	In a straight unbroken line of descent from parent to child. <i>Lineal ancestors.</i>
one	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i>One place or another.</i>
only	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>A final report reached him only on January 15.</i>
optional	Possible but not necessary; left to personal choice. <i>A wide range of optional excursions is offered.</i>
predetermine	Determine beforehand. <i>Closed questions almost predetermine the response given.</i>
resolve	(of something seen at a distance) turn into a different form when seen more clearly. <i>He resolved never to drink again.</i>
resolved	Firmly determined to do something. <i>Mysteries solved and unsolved problems resolved and unresolved.</i>
select	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>He has been selected to take part.</i>
selected	Chosen in preference to another.
selection	A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>I make Dayflower the selection for the Irish 1000 Guineas.</i>
selective	Tending to select; characterized by careful choice- John Mason Brown. <i>A new marine VHF radio with digital selective calling.</i>
selectively	By selection; in a selective manner. <i>He accused state officials of selectively enforcing the law.</i>
side	Spin given to the cue ball in snooker and billiards by hitting it on one side. <i>A side entrance.</i>
