- Relating to or affecting only one side of an organ, the body, or another structure.
- Involving only one part or side.
- (of an action or decision) performed by or affecting only one person, group, or country involved in a situation, without the agreement of another or the others.

<u>arbiter</u>	A person whose views or actions have influence in a particular sphere. The critic was considered to be an <b>arbiter</b> of modern literature.
choose	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. I always <b>choose</b> the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.
<u>conclude</u>	Come to a close. They <b>conclude</b> d an economic agreement.
conclusion	The formal and final arrangement of an agreement. His <b>conclusion</b> took the evidence into account.
decide	Cause to decide. I ve <b>decide</b> d to stay on a bit.
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. Had little trouble in taking a unanimous <b>decision</b> over his opponent.
<u>decisive</u>	Settling an issue; producing a definite result. <i>Two factors had a <b>decisive</b> influence</i> .
definitive	A definitive postage stamp. <i>The <b>definitive</b> work on Greece.</i>
<u>determination</u>	The act of making up your mind about something. His <b>determination</b> showed in his every movement.
determine	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. She <b>determine</b> d to tackle Stephen the next day.
deterministic	Relating to the philosophical doctrine that all events, including human action, are ultimately determined by causes regarded as external to the will. A <i>deterministic</i> theory.
direct	Direct the course determine the direction of travelling. A <b>direct</b> route.
<u>exclusive</u>	Catering for or available to only a few, select customers; high class and expensive. One of Britain s most <b>exclusive</b> clubs.
firmness	Resolute determination and strength of character. I felt the <b>firmness</b> of his upper arm.



individually	In a distinctive manner. Taken <b>individually</b> the rooms were in fact square.
irrevocable	Incapable of being retracted or revoked- Shakespeare. Firm and <b>irrevocable</b> is my doom.
lineal	In a straight unbroken line of descent from parent to child. <i>Lineal ancestors.</i>
one	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i>One</i> place or another.
<u>only</u>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. A final report reached him <b>only</b> on January 15.
<u>optional</u>	Possible but not necessary; left to personal choice. A wide range of <b>optional</b> excursions is offered.
predetermine	Determine beforehand. Closed questions almost <b>predetermine</b> the response given.
resolve	(of something seen at a distance) turn into a different form when seen more clearly. <i>He <b>resolve</b>d never to drink again.</i>
resolved	Firmly determined to do something. Mysteries solved and unsolved problems <b>resolved</b> and un <b>resolved</b> .
select	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>He has been <b>select</b>ed to take part.</i>
selected	Chosen in preference to another.
selection	A plot of land acquired by selection. I make Dayflower the <b>selection</b> for the Irish 1000 Guineas.
<u>selective</u>	Tending to select; characterized by careful choice- John Mason Brown. A new marine VHF radio with digital <b>selective</b> calling.
selectively	By selection; in a selective manner. <i>He accused state officials of <b>selectively</b> enforcing the law.</i>
<u>side</u>	Spin given to the cue ball in snooker and billiards by hitting it on one side. <i>A</i> <b>side</b> <i>entrance</i> .
