| lowliness | A position of inferior status; low in station or rank or fortune or estimation. |
| obscureness | The state of being humble and unimportant. |
| paltriness | Worthlessness due to insignificance. |

| pettiness | Lack of generosity in trifling matters. <i>The sheer pettiness of the officials was quite startling.</i> |
| slightness | The property of an attractively thin person. |

| <u>ethereal</u> | Characterized by lightness and insubstantiality; as impalpable or intangible as air- Thomas Carlyle. <i>Ethereal otherworldly visions.</i> |
| flimsy | Insubstantial and easily damaged. <i>A flimsy table.</i> |
| frivolous | Not having any serious purpose or value. <i>The frivolous fun loving flappers of the twenties.</i> |
| <u>immaterial</u> | (often followed by `to') lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other. <i>We have immaterial souls.</i> |
| <u>inconsequential</u> | Not important or significant. <i>They talked about inconsequential things.</i> |
| inconsiderable | Unimportant or insignificant. <i>A not inconsiderable amount of money.</i> |
| indifferent | Neither too great nor too little. <i>A gifted painter but an indifferent actor.</i> |
| <u>insignificant</u> | Meaningless. <i>Insignificant yet enchanting phrases.</i> |
| insubstantial | Lacking in nutritive value. <i>Vinyl siding has become the standard bearer for cheap insubstantial construction.</i> |
| lightweight | A lightweight boxer or other competitor. <i>The film was entertaining if rather lightweight.</i> |
| meanness | Lack of quality or attractiveness; shabbiness. <i>He is also callous with a streak of meanness.</i> |

| miniature | Being on a very small scale. <i>Children dressed as miniature adults.</i> |
| minor | A minor term or premise. <i>She requested a number of minor alterations.</i> |
| negligible | Not worth considering. <i>The effect was negligible.</i> |
| nominal | Existing in name only. <i>The nominal GDP.</i> |
| paltry | Petty; trivial. <i>A paltry wage.</i> |
| peccadillo | A relatively minor fault or sin. <i>The sexual peccadilloes of celebrities aren't necessarily news.</i> |
| pettiness | The quality of being unimportant and petty or frivolous. <i>Try to overlook insults and pettinesses.</i> |
| petty | Of secondary or lesser importance, rank, or scale; minor. <i>Petty little comments.</i> |
| picayune | Small and of little importance. <i>The picayune squabbling of party politicians.</i> |
| piddling | Pathetically trivial; trifling. <i>Piddling little questions.</i> |
| secondary | A secondary feather. <i>The lead acid accumulator used in cars consists of secondary cells.</i> |
| slight | Being of delicate or slender build- Frank Norris. <i>He was seething at the slight to his authority.</i> |
| tenuous | Lacking substance or significance. <i>A tenuous thread.</i> |
| trifling | The deliberate act of delaying and playing instead of working. <i>A trifling matter.</i> |
| trivial | Concerned with trivialities. <i>Trivial details.</i> |
| undersized | Of less than the usual size. <i>The undersized cubs may not survive the winter.</i> |
| undistinguished | Lacking distinction; unexceptional. <i>An undistinguished career.</i> |
| unessential | Not basic or fundamental. <i>A train has broken down resulting in a call to postpone all unessential travel.</i> |
