extraneous	Separate from the object to which it is attached. <i>Water free of extraneous matter.</i>
frivolous	(of a person) carefree and superficial. <i>Rules to stop frivolous lawsuits.</i>

<u>immaterial</u>	Without material form or substance. <i>Whether you choose to do it or not is a matter that is quite immaterial or indifferent.</i>
<u>inconsequential</u>	Not following logically as a consequence. <i>His work seems trivial and inconsequential.</i>
inconsiderable	Too small or unimportant to merit attention. <i>A not inconsiderable artist.</i>
<u>inferior</u>	Of low or inferior quality. <i>Schooling in inner city areas was inferior to that in the rest of the country.</i>
<u>insignificant</u>	Devoid of importance, meaning, or force. <i>She was so small and insignificant.</i>
insubstantial	Lacking in nutritive value. <i>Vinyl siding has become the standard bearer for cheap insubstantial construction.</i>
<u>irrelevant</u>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>An irrelevant comment.</i>
light	Having a considerable or sufficient amount of natural light not dark. <i>Light headed with wine.</i>
<u>minor</u>	Of a key or mode based on a minor scale and tending to produce a sad or pensive effect. <i>A minor official.</i>
not worth mentioning	Having a specified value.
not worth speaking of	Having a specified value.
nugatory	Useless or futile. <i>A nugatory law.</i>
of little consequence	Small in a way that arouses feelings (of tenderness or its opposite depending on the context).
of little importance	Small and of little importance.
of no account	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
of no consequence	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
of no importance	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.

of no moment	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
paltry	(of an amount) very small or meagre. <i>He considered the prize too paltry for the lives it must cost.</i>
peripheral	Near the surface of the body, with special reference to the circulation and nervous system. <i>She will see their problems as peripheral to her own.</i>
petty	Of little importance; trivial. <i>Petty theft.</i>
pointless	Having no points scores. <i>A pointless remark.</i>
slight	Being of delicate or slender build. <i>There s a slight chance it will work.</i>
superficial	Of little substance or significance. <i>The superficial report didn t give the true picture.</i>
trifling	Not worth considering. <i>A trifling matter.</i>
trivial	Concerned with trivialities. <i>Trivial details.</i>
worthless	Having no real value or use. <i>That promise is worthless.</i>

bauble	Cheap showy jewelry or ornament on clothing. <i>Once stripped of their tinsel and baubles most Christmas trees end up in landfill.</i>
ethereal	Extremely delicate and light in a way that seems not to be of this world. <i>Ethereal melodies.</i>
flimsy	A document, especially a copy, made on very thin paper. <i>Sheets of yellow flimsy.</i>

frivolous	(of a person) carefree and superficial. <i>The frivolous fun loving flappers of the twenties.</i>
<u>immaterial</u>	Of no importance or relevance especially to a law case. <i>Ghosts and other immaterial entities.</i>
<u>inconsequential</u>	Not important or significant. <i>They talked about inconsequential things.</i>
inconsiderable	Of small size, amount, or extent. <i>A not inconsiderable amount of money.</i>
indifferent	Having no particular interest or sympathy; unconcerned. <i>In spite of very indifferent weather.</i>
<u>insignificant</u>	(of a person) without power or influence. <i>Insignificant sounds.</i>
insubstantial	Lacking in nutritive value. <i>Vinyl siding has become the standard bearer for cheap insubstantial construction.</i>
lightweight	A lightweight boxer or other competitor. <i>A lightweight fabric.</i>
meanness	Lack of generosity; miserliness. <i>All the hatred and meanness despair and sorrow surrounding us.</i>
miniature	A very small bottle of spirits. <i>She saw her own reflection miniatured.</i>
<u>minor</u>	Of a premise containing the minor term in a categorical syllogism. <i>She requested a number of minor alterations.</i>
<u>negligible</u>	So small as to be meaningless; insignificant. <i>He said that the risks were negligible.</i>
nominal	Relating to or constituting or bearing or giving a name. <i>EU legislation allowed variation around the nominal weight that printed on each packet.</i>
paltry	Not worth considering. <i>He considered the prize too paltry for the lives it must cost.</i>
peccadillo	A relatively minor fault or sin. <i>The sexual peccadilloes of celebrities aren't necessarily news.</i>
pettiness	Undue concern with trivial matters, especially of a small-minded or spiteful nature. <i>The sheer pettiness of the officials was quite startling.</i>

petty	Unduly concerned with trivial matters, especially in a small-minded or spiteful way. <i>She thought readers were being petty in writing to complain about blocked paths.</i>
picayune	A small coin of little value, especially a 5-cent piece. <i>Giving a police officer a free meal may be against the law but it seems to be a picayune infraction.</i>
piddling	(informal) small and of little importance. <i>Piddling little questions.</i>
<u>secondary</u>	A secondary coil or winding in an electrical transformer. <i>When a bear eats a plant eating rodent the bear is functioning as a secondary consumer.</i>
slight	Lacking substance or significance. <i>The chance of success is very slight.</i>
<u>tenuous</u>	Having thin consistency. <i>A tenuous thread.</i>
trifling	The deliberate act of delaying and playing instead of working. <i>A trifling matter.</i>
<u>trivial</u>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>Only trivial objections.</i>
undersized	Smaller than normal for its kind. <i>The undersized cubs may not survive the winter.</i>
undistinguished	Lacking distinction; unexceptional. <i>An undistinguished career.</i>
unessential	Not basic or fundamental. <i>A train has broken down resulting in a call to postpone all unessential travel.</i>
