all right	Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class.
average	Approximating the statistical norm or average or expected value. <i>The average income in New England is below that of the nation.</i>
characterless	Lacking distinct or individual characteristics; dull and uninteresting.
common	Common to or shared by two or more parties. <i>Common land.</i>
commonplace	Not interesting or original; trite. <i>The usual commonplace remarks.</i>
<u>everyday</u>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>Everyday clothes.</i>
fair	Having few alterations or corrections. <i>This cow is a fair swine.</i>
featureless	Lacking distinguishing characteristics or features. <i>A featureless landscape of snow and ice.</i>
forgettable	Easily forgotten, especially through being uninteresting or mediocre. <i>Eminently forgettable horror movies.</i>
humdrum	Tediously repetitious or lacking in variety. <i>Humdrum routine work.</i>
<u>inconsequential</u>	Not important or significant. <i>His work seems trivial and inconsequential.</i>
<u>inconspicuous</u>	Not prominent or readily noticeable. <i>An inconspicuous red brick building.</i>
indifferent	Having only a limited ability to react chemically; chemically inactive. <i>Was indifferent to their acceptance or rejection of her invitation.</i>
lacklustre	Lacking luster or shine. <i>No excuses were made for the team s lacklustre performance.</i>
mediocre	Of only average quality; not very good. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from mediocre to above average.</i>
middle-of-the-road	Not extreme, especially in political views.
middling	Moderate or average in size, amount, or rank. <i>He had had a good to middling season.</i>
moderate	Marked by avoidance of extravagance or extremes. <i>A moderate estimate.</i>

mundane	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>Mundane affairs.</i>
nondescript	Lacking distinctive or interesting features or characteristics. <i>She lived in a nondescript suburban apartment block.</i>
not bad	Not in an edible or usable condition.
ordinary	Not exceptional in any way especially in quality or ability or size or degree. <i>She seemed very ordinary.</i>
passable	About average; acceptable. <i>The road is passable.</i>
pedestrian	Lacking inspiration or excitement; dull. <i>Disenchantment with their pedestrian lives.</i>
plain	Not using concealment or deception; frank. <i>The advantages were plain to see.</i>
prosaic	Having or using the style or diction of prose as opposed to poetry; lacking imaginativeness or originality. <i>A prosaic and unimaginative essay.</i>
quotidian	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>His story is an achingly human one mired in quotidian details.</i>
run-of-the-mill	Not special in any way.
simple	Plain, basic, or uncomplicated in form, nature, or design; without much decoration or ornamentation. <i>Simple mechanisms.</i>
suburban	Relating to or characteristic of or situated in suburbs. <i>Elizabeth despised Ann s house proudness as deeply suburban.</i>
uneventful	Marked by no noteworthy or significant events. <i>A place where dull people lead uneventful lives.</i>
unexceptional	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. <i>An unexceptional movie.</i>
unexciting	Not exciting. <i>An unexciting novel.</i>
uninspired	Having no intellectual or emotional or spiritual excitement. <i>They were uninspired by the Nationalist Party.</i>
unmemorable	Not memorable. <i>Characterless boring unmemorable buildings.</i>
unnoticeable	Not easily observed or noticed. <i>An unnoticeable cigarette burn on the carpet.</i>

unremarkable	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>His early childhood was unremarkable.</i>
unspectacular	Not spectacular. <i>She had been an unspectacular student.</i>
workaday	Relating to work or one's job. <i>Your humble workaday PC.</i>



Usage Examples of "Unimpressive" as an adjective

- *He was a man of unimpressive appearance.*
- *Her early academic record was unimpressive.*



Associations of "Unimpressive" (30 Words)

chivalrous

Courteous and gallant, especially towards women (typically used of a man or his behaviour).

*The concept of **chivalrous** combat.*

comely

Very pleasing to the eye.

***Comely** behavior.*

common

Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual.

***Common** lands are set aside for use by all members of a community.*

commoner

One of the ordinary or common people, as opposed to the aristocracy or to royalty.

*This is the story of the **commoner** who married a king.*

comparatively

In a relative manner; by comparison to something else.

*Inflation was **comparatively** low.*

<u>decent</u>	Decently clothed. <i>A decent high necked dress.</i>
decorous	Characterized by propriety and dignity and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>Charlotte gave David a decorous kiss.</i>
everywhere	In or to all places. <i>I ve looked everywhere.</i>
<u>gracious</u>	A polite epithet used of royalty or their acts. <i>A gracious hostess.</i>
handsome	Pleasing in appearance especially by reason of conformity to ideals of form and proportion- Thackeray. <i>Very pretty but not so extraordinarily handsome.</i>
humble	Cause to feel shame; hurt the pride of. <i>Of humble or lowly birth.</i>
immanent	(of God) permanently pervading and sustaining the universe. <i>The protection of liberties is immanent in constitutional arrangements.</i>
interim	An interim dividend profit etc. <i>An interim dividend.</i>
intermediate	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. <i>A cooled liquid intermediate between liquid and solid.</i>
<u>middle</u>	In cricket tennis etc strike the ball with the middle of the bat racket or club. <i>She stood alone in the middle of the street.</i>
<u>modest</u>	(of clothing) not revealing or emphasizing a person's body. <i>Comfortable but modest cottages.</i>
normal	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Normal diplomatic relations.</i>
often	Frequently or in great quantities. <i>He often goes for long walks by himself.</i>
<u>omnipresent</u>	Widely or constantly encountered; widespread. <i>The omnipresent threat of natural disasters.</i>
<u>pervasive</u>	Spreading or spread throughout. <i>Ageism is pervasive and entrenched in our society.</i>
preponderance	The quality or fact of being greater in number, quantity, or importance. <i>The least preponderance in either pan will unbalance the scale.</i>

<u>pretty</u>	Make pretty or attractive. <i>A pretty summer dress.</i>
<u>prevalent</u>	Most frequent or common. <i>The social ills prevalent in society today.</i>
<u>relatively</u>	In relation, comparison, or proportion to something else. <i>The situation is relatively calm now.</i>
respectfully	Used to express politeness to mitigate the effect of a refusal or disagreement. <i>The butler bowed respectfully to them both.</i>
righteousness	Adhering to moral principles. <i>Conviction of his own moral righteousness gave his oratory an irresistible power.</i>
<u>typical</u>	Of a feature that helps to distinguish a person or thing. <i>A typical day.</i>
ubiquitous	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>His ubiquitous influence was felt by all the family.</i>
ubiquity	The state of being everywhere at once (or seeming to be everywhere at once). <i>The growing ubiquity of advertising.</i>
<u>widespread</u>	Found or distributed over a large area or number of people. <i>There was widespread support for the war.</i>
