| <b>mediocre</b>               | Of only average quality; not very good.<br><i>The caliber of the students has gone from <b>mediocre</b> to above average.</i>                                |
| <b>middle-of-the-road</b>     | Not extreme, especially in political views.  |
| <b>middling</b>               | Moderate or average in size, amount, or rank.<br><i>He had had a good to <b>middling</b> season.</i>   |
| <b>moderate</b>               | Marked by avoidance of extravagance or extremes.<br><i>A <b>moderate</b> estimate.</i>   |

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| <b>mundane</b>         | Found in the ordinary course of events.<br><i><b>Mundane</b> affairs.</i>   |
| <b>nondescript</b>     | Lacking distinctive or interesting features or characteristics.<br><i>She lived in a <b>nondescript</b> suburban apartment block.</i>                           |
| <b>not bad</b>         | Not in an edible or usable condition.   |
| <b>ordinary</b>        | Not exceptional in any way especially in quality or ability or size or degree.<br><i>She seemed very <b>ordinary</b>.</i>                                       |
| <b>passable</b>        | About average; acceptable.<br><i>The road is <b>passable</b>.</i>   |

| <b>simple</b>          | Plain, basic, or uncomplicated in form, nature, or design; without much decoration or ornamentation.<br><i><b>Simple</b> mechanisms.</i>                        |
| <b>suburban</b>        | Relating to or characteristic of or situated in suburbs.<br><i>Elizabeth despised Ann's house proudness as deeply <b>suburban</b>.</i>                          |
