
### **Unimpressive as an Adjective**

all right	Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class.
average	Approximating the statistical norm or average or expected value. The <b>average</b> income in New England is below that of the nation.
characterless	Lacking distinct or individual characteristics; dull and uninteresting.
common	Common to or shared by two or more parties. <i>Common land</i> .
commonplace	Not interesting or original; trite. <i>The usual commonplace remarks.</i>
<u>everyday</u>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>Everyday clothes.</i>
fair	Having few alterations or corrections. <i>This cow is a <b>fair</b> swine</i> .
featureless	Lacking distinguishing characteristics or features. A <b>featureless</b> landscape of snow and ice.
forgettable	Easily forgotten, especially through being uninteresting or mediocre. <i>Eminently forgettable horror movies</i> .
humdrum	Tediously repetitious or lacking in variety. <i>Humdrum routine work</i> .
<u>inconsequential</u>	Not important or significant. His work seems trivial and <b>inconsequential</b> .
<u>inconspicuous</u>	Not prominent or readily noticeable. An <b>inconspicuous</b> red brick building.
indifferent	Having only a limited ability to react chemically; chemically inactive. <i>Was indifferent</i> to their acceptance or rejection of her invitation.
lacklustre	Lacking luster or shine. No excuses were made for the team s <b>lacklustre</b> performance.
mediocre	Of only average quality; not very good. The caliber of the students has gone from <b>mediocre</b> to above average.
middle-of-the-road	Not extreme, especially in political views.
middling	Moderate or average in size, amount, or rank. <i>He had had a good to <b>middling</b> season.</i>
moderate	Marked by avoidance of extravagance or extremes. A <b>moderate</b> estimate.



<u>mundane</u>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>Mundane</i> affairs.
nondescript	Lacking distinctive or interesting features or characteristics. She lived in a <b>nondescript</b> suburban apartment block.
not bad	Not in an edible or usable condition.
ordinary	Not exceptional in any way especially in quality or ability or size or degree. She seemed very <b>ordinary</b> .
passable	About average; acceptable. <i>The road is <b>passable</b>.</i>
<u>pedestrian</u>	Lacking inspiration or excitement; dull. Disenchantment with their <b>pedestrian</b> lives.
plain	Not using concealment or deception; frank. <i>The advantages were <b>plain</b> to see.</i>
prosaic	Having or using the style or diction of prose as opposed to poetry; lacking imaginativeness or originality. A <b>prosaic</b> and unimaginative essay.
quotidian	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>His story is an achingly human one mired in <b>quotidian</b> details.</i>
run-of-the-mill	Not special in any way.
simple	Plain, basic, or uncomplicated in form, nature, or design; without much decoration or ornamentation. <i>Simple mechanisms</i> .
suburban	Relating to or characteristic of or situated in suburbs. <i>Elizabeth despised Ann s house proudness as deeply</i> <b>suburban</b> .
<u>uneventful</u>	Marked by no noteworthy or significant events. A place where dull people lead <b>uneventful</b> lives.
unexceptional	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. An <b>unexceptional</b> movie.
unexciting	Not exciting. An <b>unexciting</b> novel.
uninspired	Having no intellectual or emotional or spiritual excitement. They were <b>uninspired</b> by the Nationalist Party.
unmemorable	Not memorable. Characterless boring <b>unmemorable</b> buildings.
<u>unnoticeable</u>	Not easily observed or noticed. An <b>unnoticeable</b> cigarette burn on the carpet.



<u>unremarkable</u>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>His early childhood was <b>unremarkable</b></i> .
unspectacular	Not spectacular. She had been an <b>unspectacular</b> student.
workaday	Relating to work or one's job. Your humble <b>workaday</b> PC.

<u>chivalrous</u>	Courteous and gallant, especially towards women (typically used of a man or his behaviour. <i>The concept of chivalrous combat.</i>
<u>comely</u>	Very pleasing to the eye. <i>Comely</i> behavior.
common	Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual. <b>Common</b> lands are set aside for use by all members of a community.
<u>commoner</u>	One of the ordinary or common people, as opposed to the aristocracy or to royalty. This is the story of the <b>commoner</b> who married a king.
<u>comparatively</u>	In a relative manner; by comparison to something else. Inflation was <b>comparatively</b> low.



<u>decent</u>	Decently clothed. A <b>decent</b> high necked dress.
decorous	Characterized by propriety and dignity and good taste in manners and conduct. Charlotte gave David a <b>decorous</b> kiss.
everywhere	In or to all places. I ve looked <b>everywhere</b> .
<u>gracious</u>	A polite epithet used of royalty or their acts. A <b>gracious</b> hostess.
handsome	Pleasing in appearance especially by reason of conformity to ideals of form and proportion- Thackeray. <i>Very pretty but not so extraordinarily</i> <b>handsome</b> .
humble	Cause to feel shame; hurt the pride of. <i>Of <b>humble</b> or lowly birth.</i>
immanent	(of God) permanently pervading and sustaining the universe. The protection of liberties is <b>immanent</b> in constitutional arrangements.
interim	An interim dividend profit etc. An <b>interim</b> dividend.
intermediate	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. A cooled liquid <b>intermediate</b> between liquid and solid.
<u>middle</u>	In cricket tennis etc strike the ball with the middle of the bat racket or club. She stood alone in the <b>middle</b> of the street.
<u>modest</u>	(of clothing) not revealing or emphasizing a person's body. <i>Comfortable but <b>modest</b> cottages.</i>
normal	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Normal diplomatic relations.</i>
often	Frequently or in great quantities. He <b>often</b> goes for long walks by himself.
<u>omnipresent</u>	Widely or constantly encountered; widespread. The <b>omnipresent</b> threat of natural disasters.
<u>pervasive</u>	Spreading or spread throughout. Ageism is <b>pervasive</b> and entrenched in our society.
preponderance	The quality or fact of being greater in number, quantity, or importance. The least <b>preponderance</b> in either pan will unbalance the scale.



<u>pretty</u>	Make pretty or attractive. A <b>pretty</b> summer dress.
<u>prevalent</u>	Most frequent or common. The social ills <b>prevalent</b> in society today.
<u>relatively</u>	In relation, comparison, or proportion to something else. <i>The situation is <b>relatively</b> calm now.</i>
respectfully	Used to express politeness to mitigate the effect of a refusal or disagreement. The butler bowed <b>respectfully</b> to them both.
righteousness	Adhering to moral principles. Conviction of his own moral <b>righteousness</b> gave his oratory an irresistible power.
<u>typical</u>	Of a feature that helps to distinguish a person or thing. A <b>typical</b> day.
ubiquitous	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. His <b>ubiquitous</b> influence was felt by all the family.
ubiquity	The state of being everywhere at once (or seeming to be everywhere at once. The growing <b>ubiquity</b> of advertising.
widespread	Found or distributed over a large area or number of people. There was <b>widespread</b> support for the war.
