Definitions of "Unison" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unison” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Coincidence in pitch of sounds or notes.*
- *Two or more sounds or tones at the same pitch or in octaves.*
- *Occurring together or simultaneously.*
- *Corresponding exactly.*
- *Simultaneous performance or utterance of action or speech.*
- *(music) two or more sounds or tones at the same pitch or in octaves.*
- *A combination of notes, voices, or instruments at the same pitch or (especially when singing) in octaves.*



Synonyms of "Unison" as a noun (7 Words)

as one

A very poisonous metallic element that has three allotropic forms; arsenic and arsenic compounds are used as herbicides and insecticides and various alloys; found in arsenopyrite and orpiment and realgar.

at once

at one and the same time

A highly unstable radioactive element (the heaviest of the halogen series); a decay product of uranium and thorium.

at the same moment

100 at equal 1 kip in Laos.

A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.

in concert

A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.

Associations of "Unison" (30 Words)

acoustic	Of or relating to the science of acoustics. <i>Acoustic tiles.</i>
cantata	A medium-length narrative piece of music for voices with instrumental accompaniment, typically with solos, chorus, and orchestra.
<u>choir</u>	The part of a cathedral or large church between the high altar and the nave used by the choir and clergy. <i>A clarinet choir.</i>
choral	Engaged in or concerned with singing. <i>A choral scholar.</i>
chorale	A musical composition consisting of or resembling a harmonized version of a chorale.

chorus	A section of text spoken by the chorus in drama. <i>The orchestra lacked polish and the chorus were inclined to rush ahead regardless.</i>
concert	Arrange (something) by mutual agreement or coordination. <i>A concert pianist.</i>
consonance	The property of sounding harmonious. <i>The abrupt quality of the sound is echoed in the final t consonance of discreet and shut.</i>
harmony	A harmonious state of things in general and of their properties (as of colors and sounds); congruity of parts with one another and with the whole. <i>Man and machine in perfect harmony.</i>
honeyed	With honey added. <i>As the wine matures it becomes more honeyed.</i>
hum	Sound with a monotonous hum. <i>The refrigerator is humming.</i>
lyrical	(of literature, art, or music) expressing the writer's emotions in an imaginative and beautiful way. <i>The dancer s lyrical performance.</i>
madrigal	Sing madrigals. <i>The group was madrigaling beautifully.</i>
mellifluous	(of a sound) pleasingly smooth and musical to hear. <i>Her low mellifluous voice.</i>
melodious	Pleasant-sounding. <i>The melodious chant of the monks.</i>
musical	Characterized by or capable of producing music. <i>They burst out into rich musical laughter.</i>
orchestra	The part of a theatre where the orchestra plays typically in front of the stage and on a lower level.
perfect	The perfect tense. <i>Equity will not perfect an imperfect gift.</i>
performing	The performance of a part or role in a drama.
philharmonic	A large orchestra; can perform symphonies. <i>The most philharmonic ear is at times deeply affected by a simple air.</i>
playing	The act of playing a musical instrument.
rhapsody	(in ancient Greece) an epic poem adapted for recitation. <i>Rhapsodies of praise.</i>

singing	The act of singing vocal music. <i>The singing of hymns in Latin.</i>
solfege	A voice exercise; singing scales or runs to the same syllable.
sonata	A composition for an instrumental soloist often with a piano accompaniment typically in several movements with one or more in sonata form.
sonorous	Capable of producing a deep or ringing sound. <i>He relished the sonorous words of condemnation.</i>
<u>super</u>	An extra unwanted or unimportant person a supernumerary. <i>A super experiment.</i>
symphonic	Relating to or characteristic or suggestive of a symphony. <i>Symphonic and chamber music.</i>
<u>symphony</u>	A long and complex sonata for symphony orchestra. <i>Autumn is a symphony of texture and pattern.</i>
techno	A style of fast heavy electronic dance music usually without vocals.
