<u>consistent</u>	Sometimes followed by with in agreement or consistent or reliable. <i>He is their most</i> <b>consistent</b> <i>player this season.</i>
consolidated	Forming a solid mass. A <b>consolidated</b> school.
<u>cooperative</u>	Involving the joint activity of two or more. A <b>cooperative</b> effort.
corporate	(of a large company or group) authorized to act as a single entity and recognized as such in law. <i>Airlines are very keen on their <b>corporate</b> identity.</i>
in accord	Directed or bound inward.
in agreement	Currently fashionable.
in concord	Directed or bound inward.
in harmony	Directed or bound inward.
in rapport	Holding office.
in sympathy	Holding office.
in unison	Directed or bound inward.
in unity	Directed or bound inward.
integrated	Indicating the mean value or total sum of a variable quantity of property. A more closely <b>integrated</b> economic and political system.
joined	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
joint	Applied or regarded together. <i>Joint</i> income tax return.
like-minded	Of the same turn of mind.
merged	Formed or united into a whole.
<u>mutual</u>	Denoting a building society or insurance company owned by its members and dividing some or all of its profits between them. <i>They cooperated as potentially</i> <b>mutual</b> <i>beneficiaries of the</i> <i>settlement.</i>



of like mind	Conforming in every respect.
of the same mind	Equal in amount or value.
of the same opinion	Closely similar or comparable in kind or quality or quantity or degree.
shared	Distributed between members of a group. They have a <b>shared</b> interest in history.
<u>solid</u>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. There is <b>solid</b> evidence of lower inflation.
<u>unanimous</u>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>The decision to go ahead was <b>unanimous</b>.</i>
<u>undivided</u>	Not separated into parts or shares constituting an undivided unit. <i>Presented an <b>undivided</b> front.</i>
unified	Formed or united into a whole. A <b>unified</b> utility system.
