Accomplished by collaboration.
***Collaborative** research.*

Made or joined or united into one.

| integrated | Indicating the mean value or total sum of a variable quantity of property. <i>A more closely integrated economic and political system.</i> |
| joined | Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks. |
| joint | Applied or regarded together. <i>Joint income tax return.</i> |
| like-minded | Of the same turn of mind. |
| merged | Formed or united into a whole. |
| <u>mutual</u> | Denoting a building society or insurance company owned by its members and dividing some or all of its profits between them. <i>They cooperated as potentially mutual beneficiaries of the settlement.</i> |

| ally | Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He was forced to dismiss his closest political ally.</i> |
| amalgamate | To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>He amalgamated his company with another.</i> |
| annex | An addition that extends a main building. <i>An annex to the report.</i> |

| coalescing | Growing together, fusing. |
| coalition | The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>They had a taste of government in coalition with the Social Democrats.</i> |
| combine | Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Combine resources.</i> |
| combined | Made or joined or united into one. |
| commingle | Mix; blend. <i>His book commingles sarcasm and sadness.</i> |
| concerted | Done with great effort or determination. <i>A concerted attempt to preserve religious unity.</i> |
| confederacy | A group of conspirators banded together to achieve some harmful or illegal purpose. <i>The Italian confederacy known as the Lombard League.</i> |
| confederation | The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>A confederation of trade unions.</i> |
| consolidate | Make firm or secure; strengthen. <i>Consolidate fibers into boards.</i> |
| cooperative | Involving the joint activity of two or more. <i>They have been extremely considerate polite and cooperative.</i> |
| federate | Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>In 1901 the six colonies federated to form the Commonwealth of Australia.</i> |
| federation | The action of forming states or organizations into a single group with centralized control. <i>A first step in the federation of Europe.</i> |
| incorporation | The inclusion of something as part of a whole. <i>The software facilitates the incorporation of active learning in the course.</i> |
| integrate | Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being integrated into the development.</i> |
| joint | Fasten with a joint. <i>She suffers from stiff joints and finds bending difficult.</i> |

- reunify** Restore political unity to (a place or group, especially a divided territory).
*Will Korea **reunify**.*
- synthesis** The process of making compound and derivative words.
*The ideology represented a **synthesis** of certain ideas.*
- together** With or in proximity to another person or people.
*She held her hands **together** as if she was praying.*
- unify** Become one.
*Opposition groups struggling to **unify** around the goal of replacing the regime.*
- union** A device on a national flag emblematic of the union of two or more sovereignties typically in the upper inner corner.
*There is strength in **union**.*
- unite** Be or become joined or united or linked.
*She **unites** charm with a good business sense.*
