Definitions of "Unity" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unity” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day (unity of time), use of one scene throughout (unity of place), and concentration on the development of a single plot (unity of action).*
- *The quality of being united into one.*
- *The number one.*
- *An undivided or unbroken completeness or totality with nothing wanting.*
- *The state of being united or joined as a whole.*
- *The smallest whole number or a numeral representing this number.*
- *The state of forming a complete and harmonious whole, especially in an artistic context.*
- *A thing forming a complex whole.*

- accord** A written agreement between two states or sovereigns.
*The government and the rebels are in **accord** on one point.*
- ace** One of four playing cards in a deck having a single pip on its face.
*Life had started dealing him **aces** again.*
- agreement** The thing arranged or agreed to.
*A verbal **agreement** to sell.*
- amalgamation** The action, process, or result of combining or uniting.
*The threat of **amalgamation** with another college.*
- assent** The expression of approval or agreement.
*He nodded **assent**.*
- coherence** The quality of being logical and consistent.
*This raises further questions on the **coherence** of state policy.*

cohesion	The state of cohering or sticking together. <i>The work at present lacks cohesion.</i>
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He wrote a book in collaboration with his son.</i>
concert	Relating to or denoting the performance of music written for opera, ballet, or theatre on its own without the accompanying dramatic action. <i>A pop concert.</i>
concord	Agreement or harmony between people or groups. <i>A concord was to be drawn up.</i>
concurrence	Agreement or consistency. <i>Delays can be avoided by arriving at political concurrence at the start.</i>
congruence	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate. <i>The results show quite good congruence with recent studies.</i>
congruity	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
consensus	A general agreement. <i>There is a growing consensus that the current regime has failed.</i>
cooperation	The action or process of working together to the same end. <i>Economic cooperation.</i>
entity	Existence; being. <i>Church and empire were fused in a single entity.</i>
harmony	The state of being in agreement or concord. <i>Man and machine in perfect harmony.</i>
homogeneity	The quality or state of being all the same or all of the same kind. <i>There is a remarkable homogeneity between the two companies.</i>
i	A nonmetallic element belonging to the halogens used especially in medicine and photography and in dyes occurs naturally only in combination in small quantities as in sea water or rocks. <i>He has the one but will need a two and three to go with it.</i>
identity	Exact sameness. <i>She believes she is the victim of mistaken identity.</i>
integration	The action of incorporating a racial or religious group into a community. <i>Visuomotor integration.</i>
integrity	Moral soundness. <i>The structural integrity of the novel.</i>
one	A single person or thing. <i>He is the best one.</i>

oneness	The quality of being united into one. <i>Holding to the oneness of God the Father as the only God.</i>
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>Peace came on November 11th.</i>
<u>sameness</u>	Lack of variety; uniformity or monotony. <i>Sameness of purpose kept them together.</i>
<u>single</u>	A single measure of spirits. <i>A singles holiday.</i>
singleness	The quality of concentrating on one central objective. <i>The singleness of his motives could not be questioned.</i>
<u>solidarity</u>	A union of interests or purposes or sympathies among members of a group. <i>Factory workers voiced solidarity with the striking students.</i>
synthesis	Reasoning from the general to the particular (or from cause to effect). <i>The ideology represented a synthesis of certain ideas.</i>
<u>togetherness</u>	The state of being close to another person or other people. <i>Togetherness is the new wonder ingredient in marriage.</i>
unanimity	Agreement by all people involved; consensus. <i>There is almost complete unanimity on this issue.</i>
unification	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>There were conversations about unification between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>
<u>uniformity</u>	The quality of lacking diversity or variation (even to the point of boredom). <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural uniformity.</i>
<u>union</u>	A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff. <i>Lightning produced an unusual union of the metals.</i>
wholeness	Good physical or mental health. <i>The work lacked a sense of wholeness and meaning.</i>

bond	Place dutiable goods in bond. <i>A 10 000 bond was furnished by an alderman.</i>
<u>coalesce</u>	Mix together different elements. <i>His idea served to coalesce all that happened into one connected whole.</i>
coalescing	Growing together, fusing.
cohesion	The state of cohering or sticking together. <i>The work at present lacks cohesion.</i>
<u>cohesive</u>	Causing cohesion. <i>A cohesive agent.</i>
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
<u>communal</u>	For or by a group rather than individuals- Paul Roche. <i>Communal living.</i>

<u>concord</u>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>Their ideas concorded.</i>
conglomerate	Form a conglomerate by merging diverse firms. <i>The conglomerate peoples of New England.</i>
congruity	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
connection	Shifting from one form of transportation to another. Connection to the internet.
<u>consistency</u>	Consistent behaviour or treatment. <i>When the dough has enough consistency it is ready to bake.</i>
<u>consolidate</u>	Make (something) physically stronger or more solid. <i>All manufacturing activities have been consolidated in new premises.</i>
empathy	Understanding and entering into another's feelings.
fraternal	Like or characteristic of or befitting a brother. <i>Close fraternal ties.</i>
fraternize	Associate or form a friendship with someone, especially when one is not supposed to. <i>She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.</i>
<u>harmony</u>	The structure of music with respect to the composition and progression of chords. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in harmony.</i>
holistic	Characterized by the treatment of the whole person, taking into account mental and social factors, rather than just the symptoms of a disease.
indivisible	Impossible of undergoing division. <i>An indivisible union of states.</i>
inseparable	A person or thing inseparable from another. <i>They met 18 months ago and have been inseparable ever since.</i>
integrated	Formed into a whole or introduced into another entity- Dwight D.Eisenhower. <i>An integrated Europe.</i>
joint	Cut the body of an animal into joints for cooking. <i>The carpenter jointed two pieces of wood.</i>
one	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. One place or another.
oneness	The fact or state of being unified or whole, though comprised of two or more parts. <i>The oneness of all suffering people.</i>

- reunify** Unify again, as of a country.
*Will Korea **reunify**.*
- solidarity** Unity or agreement of feeling or action, especially among individuals with a common interest; mutual support within a group.
*Factory workers voiced **solidarity** with the striking students.*
- unification** An occurrence that involves the production of a union.
*The costs of German **unification**.*
- unified** Operating as a unit.
*A **unified** utility system.*
- united** Of or relating to two people who are married to each other.
*Presented a **united** front.*
- whole** To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly.
