### Definitions of "Unity" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unity” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day (unity of time), use of one scene throughout (unity of place), and concentration on the development of a single plot (unity of action).*
- *The quality of being united into one.*
- *The number one.*
- *An undivided or unbroken completeness or totality with nothing wanting.*
- *The state of being united or joined as a whole.*
- *The smallest whole number or a numeral representing this number.*
- *The state of forming a complete and harmonious whole, especially in an artistic context.*
- *A thing forming a complex whole.*



## Synonyms of "Unity" as a noun (37 Words)

<b>1</b>	The smallest whole number or a numeral representing this number.
<b><u>accord</u></b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The government and the rebels are in <b>accord</b> on one point.</i>
<b><u>ace</u></b>	One of four playing cards in a deck having a single pip on its face. <i>Life had started dealing him <b>aces</b> again.</i>
<b>agreement</b>	The thing arranged or agreed to. <i>A verbal <b>agreement</b> to sell.</i>
<b>amalgamation</b>	The action, process, or result of combining or uniting. <i>The threat of <b>amalgamation</b> with another college.</i>
<b>assent</b>	The expression of approval or agreement. <i>He nodded <b>assent</b>.</i>
<b><u>coherence</u></b>	The quality of being logical and consistent. <i>This raises further questions on the <b>coherence</b> of state policy.</i>

<b>cohesion</b>	The state of cohering or sticking together. <i>The work at present lacks <b>cohesion</b>.</i>
<b>collaboration</b>	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He wrote a book in <b>collaboration</b> with his son.</i>
<u><b>concert</b></u>	Relating to or denoting the performance of music written for opera, ballet, or theatre on its own without the accompanying dramatic action. <i>A pop <b>concert</b>.</i>
<u><b>concord</b></u>	Agreement or harmony between people or groups. <i>A <b>concord</b> was to be drawn up.</i>
<b>concurrence</b>	Agreement or consistency. <i>Delays can be avoided by arriving at political <b>concurrence</b> at the start.</i>
<b>congruence</b>	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate. <i>The results show quite good <b>congruence</b> with recent studies.</i>
<b>congruity</b>	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
<u><b>consensus</b></u>	A general agreement. <i>There is a growing <b>consensus</b> that the current regime has failed.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	The action or process of working together to the same end. <i>Economic <b>cooperation</b>.</i>
<b>entity</b>	Existence; being. <i>Church and empire were fused in a single <b>entity</b>.</i>
<u><b>harmony</b></u>	The state of being in agreement or concord. <i>Man and machine in perfect <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>homogeneity</b>	The quality or state of being all the same or all of the same kind. <i>There is a remarkable <b>homogeneity</b> between the two companies.</i>
<b>i</b>	A nonmetallic element belonging to the halogens used especially in medicine and photography and in dyes occurs naturally only in combination in small quantities as in sea water or rocks. <i>He has the one but <b>will</b> need a two and three to go <b>with it</b>.</i>
<b>identity</b>	Exact sameness. <i>She believes she is the victim of mistaken <b>identity</b>.</i>
<b>integration</b>	The action of incorporating a racial or religious group into a community. <i>Visuomotor <b>integration</b>.</i>
<b>integrity</b>	Moral soundness. <i>The structural <b>integrity</b> of the novel.</i>
<b>one</b>	A single person or thing. <i>He is the best <b>one</b>.</i>

<b>oneness</b>	The quality of being united into one. <i>Holding to the <b>oneness</b> of God the Father as the only God.</i>
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i><b>Peace</b> came on November 11th.</i>
<u><b>sameness</b></u>	Lack of variety; uniformity or monotony. <i><b>Sameness</b> of purpose kept them together.</i>
<u><b>single</b></u>	A single measure of spirits. <i>A <b>singles</b> holiday.</i>
<b>singleness</b>	The quality of concentrating on one central objective. <i>The <b>singleness</b> of his motives could not be questioned.</i>
<u><b>solidarity</b></u>	A union of interests or purposes or sympathies among members of a group. <i>Factory workers voiced <b>solidarity</b> with the striking students.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	Reasoning from the general to the particular (or from cause to effect). <i>The ideology represented a <b>synthesis</b> of certain ideas.</i>
<u><b>togetherness</b></u>	The state of being close to another person or other people. <i><b>Togetherness</b> is the new wonder ingredient in marriage.</i>
<b>unanimity</b>	Agreement by all people involved; consensus. <i>There is almost complete <b>unanimity</b> on this issue.</i>
<b>unification</b>	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>There were conversations about <b>unification</b> between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>
<u><b>uniformity</b></u>	The quality of lacking diversity or variation (even to the point of boredom). <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural <b>uniformity</b>.</i>
<u><b>union</b></u>	A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff. <i>Lightning produced an unusual <b>union</b> of the metals.</i>
<b>wholeness</b>	Good physical or mental health. <i>The work lacked a sense of <b>wholeness</b> and meaning.</i>

<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b>cohesion</b>	The state of cohering or sticking together. <i>The work at present lacks <b>cohesion</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">cohesive</a></u>	Causing cohesion. <i>A <b>cohesive</b> agent.</i>
<b>combined</b>	Made or joined or united into one.
<u><a href="#">communal</a></u>	For or by a group rather than individuals- Paul Roche. <i><b>Communal</b> living.</i>

<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>Their ideas <b>concorded</b>.</i>
<b>conglomerate</b>	Form a conglomerate by merging diverse firms. <i>The <b>conglomerate</b> peoples of New England.</i>
<b>congruity</b>	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
<b>connection</b>	Shifting from one form of transportation to another. <i><b>Connection</b> to the internet.</i>
<b><u>consistency</u></b>	Consistent behaviour or treatment. <i>When the dough has enough <b>consistency</b> it is ready to bake.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Make (something) physically stronger or more solid. <i>All manufacturing activities have been <b>consolidated</b> in new premises.</i>
<b>empathy</b>	Understanding and entering into another's feelings.
<b>fraternal</b>	Like or characteristic of or befitting a brother. <i>Close <b>fraternal</b> ties.</i>
<b>fraternize</b>	Associate or form a friendship with someone, especially when one is not supposed to. <i>She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.</i>
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	The structure of music with respect to the composition and progression of chords. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>holistic</b>	Characterized by the treatment of the whole person, taking into account mental and social factors, rather than just the symptoms of a disease.
<b>indivisible</b>	Impossible of undergoing division. <i>An <b>indivisible</b> union of states.</i>
<b>inseparable</b>	A person or thing inseparable from another. <i>They met 18 months ago and have been <b>inseparable</b> ever since.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	Formed into a whole or introduced into another entity- Dwight D.Eisenhower. <i>An <b>integrated</b> Europe.</i>
<b>joint</b>	Cut the body of an animal into joints for cooking. <i>The carpenter <b>jointed</b> two pieces of wood.</i>
<b>one</b>	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i><b>One</b> place or another.</i>
<b>oneness</b>	The fact or state of being unified or whole, though comprised of two or more parts. <i>The <b>oneness</b> of all suffering people.</i>



<b>reunify</b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</i>
<b><u>solidarity</u></b>	Unity or agreement of feeling or action, especially among individuals with a common interest; mutual support within a group. <i>Factory workers voiced <b>solidarity</b> with the striking students.</i>
<b>unification</b>	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The costs of German <b>unification</b>.</i>
<b><u>unified</u></b>	Operating as a unit. <i>A <b>unified</b> utility system.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
<b><u>whole</u></b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>A <b>whole</b> loaf of bread.</i>
