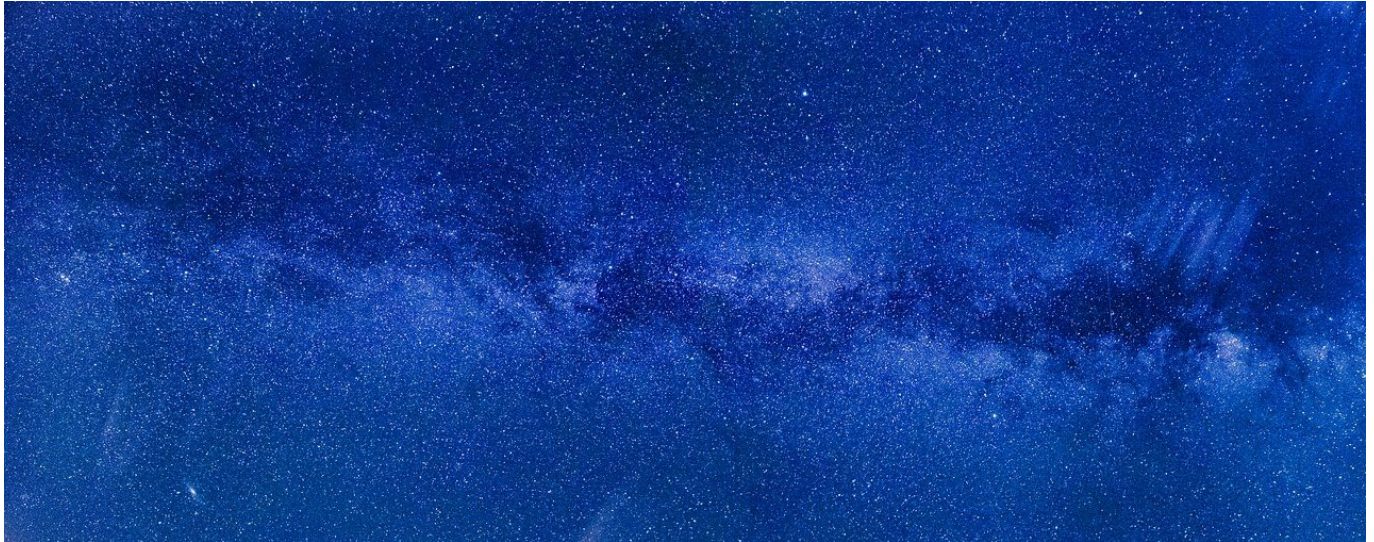

- *The entire aggregation of items from which samples can be drawn.*
- *(statistics) the entire aggregation of items from which samples can be drawn.*
- *Everything stated or assumed in a given discussion.*
- *All existing matter and space considered as a whole; the cosmos. The universe is believed to be at least 10 billion light years in diameter and contains a vast number of galaxies; it has been expanding since its creation in the Big Bang about 13 billion years ago.*
- *A particular sphere of activity or experience.*
- *Everything that exists anywhere.*

### circle

Something approximating the shape of a circle.  
*They all sat round in a **circle**.*

### cosmos

Any of various mostly Mexican herbs of the genus *Cosmos* having radiate heads of variously colored flowers and pinnate leaves; popular fall-blooming annuals.  
*He sat staring deep into the void reminding himself of man's place in the **cosmos**.*

### **creation**

A thing which has been made or invented, especially something showing artistic talent.  
*She treats fictional **creations** as if they were real people.*

### **domain**

A specified sphere of activity or knowledge.  
*The French **domains** of the Plantagenets.*

### **existence**

Everything that exists anywhere.  
*Laws in **existence** for centuries.*

### **macrocosm**

The whole of a complex structure, especially the world or the universe, contrasted with a small or representative part of it.

### milieu

A person's social environment.  
*Gregory came from the same aristocratic **milieu** as Sidonius.*

### population

(statistics) the entire aggregation of items from which samples can be drawn.  
*It is an estimate of the mean of the **population**.*

### preserve

Fruit preserved by cooking with sugar.  
*Medicine is no longer a male **preserve**.*

<b>province</b>	A territory outside Italy under a Roman governor. <i>She knew little about wine that had been her father's <b>province</b>.</i>
<b>quarter</b>	The haunches or hindquarters of a horse. <i>A <b>quarter</b> after 4 o'clock.</i>
<b>space</b>	A blank between printed, typed, or written words, characters, numbers, etc. <i>Write your name in the <b>space</b> provided.</i>
<b>sphere</b>	The apparent surface of the imaginary sphere on which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>Political reforms to match those in the economic <b>sphere</b>.</i>
<b>territory</b>	An area of knowledge, activity, or experience. <i>Male blackbirds try to attract as many females to their <b>territory</b> as possible.</i>
<b>the firmament</b>	The apparent surface of the imaginary sphere on which celestial bodies appear to be projected.
<b>the heavens</b>	Any place of complete bliss and delight and peace.
<b>totality</b>	The whole amount. <i>The <b>totality</b> of war and its consequences.</i>
<b>universe of discourse</b>	Everything that exists anywhere.
<b>whole world</b>	All of something including all its component elements or parts.
<b>world</b>	All of your experiences that determine how things appear to you. <i>It's a wonderful <b>world</b>.</i>

**asterisk**

Mark with an asterisk.  
*He had **asterisked** the things about the case that still bothered him.*

**astronaut**

A person trained to travel in a spacecraft.  
*The Russians called their **astronauts** cosmonauts.*

**astronomer**

An expert in or student of astronomy.

**astronomical**

Relating to astronomy.  
***Astronomical** observations.*

**astronomy**

The branch of science which deals with celestial objects, space, and the physical universe as a whole.

**comet**

A relatively small extraterrestrial body consisting of a frozen mass that travels around the sun in a highly elliptical orbit.

<b>cosmic</b>	Relating to the universe or cosmos, especially as distinct from the earth. <i>Cosmic matter.</i>
<b>cosmogony</b>	The branch of astrophysics that studies the origin and evolution and structure of the universe. <i>Today the central questions of cosmology and <b>cosmogony</b> are being explored within the framework of the Big Bang theory.</i>
<b>cosmography</b>	A description or representation of the universe or the earth. <i>He published a series of elementary textbooks on <b>cosmography</b> trigonometry and astronomy 1651.</i>
<b>cosmology</b>	The science of the origin and development of the universe Modern cosmology is dominated by the Big Bang theory which brings together observational astronomy and particle physics.
<b>cosmos</b>	Any of various mostly Mexican herbs of the genus Cosmos having radiate heads of variously colored flowers and pinnate leaves; popular fall-blooming annuals. <i>He sat staring deep into the void reminding himself of man s place in the <b>cosmos</b>.</i>
<b>equinox</b>	Either of the two celestial points at which the celestial equator intersects the ecliptic.
<b>extraterrestrial</b>	Of or from outside the earth or its atmosphere. <i>Searches for <b>extraterrestrial</b> intelligence.</i>
<b>galaxy</b>	The galaxy of which the solar system is a part the Milky Way. <i>The four musicians have played with a <b>galaxy</b> of stars.</i>
<b>interstellar</b>	Occurring or situated between stars. <i><b>Interstellar</b> travel.</i>
<b>lunar</b>	Of, determined by, or resembling the moon. <i>A <b>lunar</b> eclipse.</i>
<b>macrocosm</b>	Everything that exists anywhere.
<b>observatory</b>	A structure commanding a wide view of its surroundings.
<b>planetarium</b>	An apparatus or model for representing the solar systems.
<b>planetary</b>	Involving the entire earth; not limited or provincial in scope. <i>The <b>planetary</b> tilt.</i>
<b>shuttle</b>	Transport in a shuttle. <i>The nine o clock <b>shuttle</b> from Edinburgh.</i>
<b>sidereal</b>	Of or with respect to the distant stars (i.e. the constellations or fixed stars, not the sun or planets).

<b>spacecraft</b>	A craft capable of traveling in outer space; technically, a satellite around the sun.
<b>spaceman</b>	An astronaut.
<b>spaceship</b>	A spacecraft, especially one controlled by a crew.
<u><a href="#">star</a></u>	Mark something for special notice or recommendation with an asterisk or other star shaped symbol. <i>A sport <b>star</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">stellar</a></u>	Relating to a star or stars. <i>A <b>stellar</b> role.</i>
<b>telescope</b>	(with reference to an object made of concentric tubular parts) slide or cause to slide into itself, so that it becomes smaller. <i>In the accident the cars <b>telescoped</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">worldwide</a></u>	Of worldwide scope or applicability Christopher Morley. <i>She travels <b>worldwide</b> as a consultant.</i>
