- Not based on or behaving according to what is morally right and fair.

### Synonyms of "Unjust" as an adjective (24 Words)

biased	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. A <b>biased</b> account of the trial.
bigoted	Blindly and obstinately attached to some creed or opinion and intolerant toward others. A <b>bigoted</b> group of reactionaries.



<u>discriminatory</u>	Making or showing an unjust or prejudicial distinction between different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, sex, age, or disability. <b>Discriminatory</b> employment practices.
gratuitous	Given or done free of charge. A <b>gratuitous</b> insult.
groundless	Without a basis in reason or fact. The allegations proved <b>groundless</b> .
inappropriate	Not suitable or proper in the circumstances. Noise seems <b>inappropriate</b> at a time of sadness.
indefensible	Incapable of being defended or justified. The towns were tactically <b>indefensible</b> .
inequitable	Unfair; unjust. The <b>inequitable</b> division of wealth.
one-sided	Favoring one person or side over another.
<u>partial</u>	(followed by `of' or `to') having a strong preference or liking for. <b>Partial</b> collapse.
partisan	Devoted to a cause or party. Newspapers have become increasingly <b>partisan</b> .
preferential	(of a creditor) having a claim on the receipt of payment from a debtor which will be met before those of other creditors. <b>Preferential</b> trade terms.
prejudiced	Having or showing a dislike or distrust that is derived from prejudice; bigoted. A <b>prejudiced</b> judge.
slanted	Having an oblique or slanted direction. The highly <b>slanted</b> report of the murders.
undeserved	Not deserved or earned. An <b>undeserved</b> term of imprisonment.
<u>undue</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. Accused of using <b>undue</b> force.
unfair	Not following the rules of a game or sport. <i>Used <b>unfair</b> methods.</i>
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.
unmerited	Not merited or deserved. <b>Unmerited</b> treatment of a potentially fine subject.



<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond normal limits. An <b>unreasonable</b> request.
<u>unwarranted</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <b>Unwarranted</b> jealousy.
weighted	Made heavy or weighted down with weariness. <i>Votes weighted according to the size of constituencies.</i>
wrong	Not correct or true; incorrect. Cheating is <b>wrong</b> .
<u>wrongful</u>	Having no legally established claim. A <b>wrongful</b> act.

biased	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. We will not tolerate this <b>biased</b> media coverage.
cheating	Not faithful to a spouse or lover.
dishonesty	The quality of being dishonest. The dismissal of thirty civil servants for <b>dishonesty</b> and misconduct.
disinformation	Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc. <i>The entire Western intelligence system had been systematically</i> <i>manipulated with clever</i> <b>disinformation</b> .
disqualify	Declare (someone) ineligible for an office, activity, or competition because of an offence or infringement. She was disqualified after failing a drugs test.
<u>erroneous</u>	Containing or characterized by error. Employers sometimes make <b>erroneous</b> assumptions.
<u>error</u>	(baseball) a failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. An <b>error</b> of judgement.



fallacious	Based on an incorrect or misleading notion or information. <i>Fallacious</i> arguments.
<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Her character was faulty.</i>
<u>flawed</u>	Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection. A <i>flawed</i> hero.
immoral	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. Unseemly and <b>immoral</b> behaviour.
<u>improper</u>	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. Slightly <b>improper</b> to dine alone with a married man.
inaccurate	Not exact. A forecast that proved wildly <b>inaccurate</b> .
inappropriate	Not suitable for a particular occasion etc. <i>Put</i> <b>inappropriate</b> pressure on them.
incorrect	Not correct; not in conformity with fact or truth. <i>The doctor gave you</i> <b>incorrect</b> <i>advice</i> .
inequitable	Unfair; unjust. <i>Inequitable taxation</i> .
iniquitous	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i>Iniquitous deeds</i> .
iniquity	Morally objectionable behavior. A den of <b>iniquity</b> .
<u>injustice</u>	An unjust act. She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora s remark.
invidious	(of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust. <i>Invidious</i> comparisons.
misguide	Lead someone in the wrong direction or give someone wrong directions. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and <b>misguide</b> the general reader.</i>
<u>misinformation</u>	Information that is incorrect. Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and <b>misinformation</b> .
misinterpret	Interpret falsely. Soanes claimed his remarks had been <b>misinterpret</b> ed.
<u>mistaken</u>	Wrong in e.g. opinion or judgment. An unfortunate case of <b>mistaken</b> identity.



unethical	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i>Unethical</i> business practices.
unfair	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Took an <b>unfair</b> advantage.</i>
<u>unfavorable</u>	(of winds or weather) tending to hinder or oppose. <i>Unfavorable</i> comments.
<u>unfit</u>	Make unfit or unsuitable. They say that we are trying to give poor children tastes which will only <b>unfit</b> them for a life of hardship and toil.
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>He feels that you are in the <b>wrong</b>.</i>
<u>wrongly</u>	In an unjust, dishonest, or immoral way. My name is spelled <b>wrongly</b> .
