### Synonyms of "Unjust" as an adjective (24 Words)

<b>biased</b>	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. A <b>biased</b> account of the trial.
<b>bigoted</b>	Blindly and obstinately attached to some creed or opinion and intolerant toward others. A <b>bigoted</b> group of reactionaries.

<b><u>discriminatory</u></b>	Making or showing an unjust or prejudicial distinction between different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, sex, age, or disability. <i><b>Discriminatory</b> employment practices.</i>
<b>gratuitous</b>	Given or done free of charge. <i>A <b>gratuitous</b> insult.</i>
<b>groundless</b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>The allegations proved <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>inappropriate</b>	Not suitable or proper in the circumstances. <i>Noise seems <b>inappropriate</b> at a time of sadness.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>The towns were tactically <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>inequitable</b>	Unfair; unjust. <i>The <b>inequitable</b> division of wealth.</i>
<b>one-sided</b>	Favoring one person or side over another.
<b><u>partial</u></b>	(followed by `of' or `to') having a strong preference or liking for. <i><b>Partial</b> collapse.</i>
<b>partisan</b>	Devoted to a cause or party. <i>Newspapers have become increasingly <b>partisan</b>.</i>
<b>preferential</b>	(of a creditor) having a claim on the receipt of payment from a debtor which will be met before those of other creditors. <i><b>Preferential</b> trade terms.</i>
<b>prejudiced</b>	Having or showing a dislike or distrust that is derived from prejudice; bigoted. <i>A <b>prejudiced</b> judge.</i>
<b>slanted</b>	Having an oblique or slanted direction. <i>The highly <b>slanted</b> report of the murders.</i>
<b><u>undeserved</u></b>	Not deserved or earned. <i>An <b>undeserved</b> term of imprisonment.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>Accused of using <b>undue</b> force.</i>
<b>unfair</b>	Not following the rules of a game or sport. <i>Used <b>unfair</b> methods.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b>unmerited</b>	Not merited or deserved. <i><b>Unmerited</b> treatment of a potentially fine subject.</i>

<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>An <b>unreasonable</b> request.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i><b>Unwarranted</b> jealousy.</i>
<b>weighted</b>	Made heavy or weighted down with weariness. <i>Votes <b>weighted</b> according to the size of constituencies.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Not correct or true; incorrect. <i>Cheating is <b>wrong</b>.</i>
<b><u>wrongful</u></b>	Having no legally established claim. <i>A <b>wrongful</b> act.</i>

## Associations of "Unjust" (30 Words)

<b>biased</b>	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. <i>We will not tolerate this <b>biased</b> media coverage.</i>
<b>cheating</b>	Not faithful to a spouse or lover.
<b>dishonesty</b>	The quality of being dishonest. <i>The dismissal of thirty civil servants for <b>dishonesty</b> and misconduct.</i>
<b>disinformation</b>	Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc). <i>The entire Western intelligence system had been systematically manipulated with clever <b>disinformation</b>.</i>
<b>disqualify</b>	Declare (someone) ineligible for an office, activity, or competition because of an offence or infringement. <i>She was disqualified after failing a drugs test.</i>
<b><u>erroneous</u></b>	Containing or characterized by error. <i>Employers sometimes make <b>erroneous</b> assumptions.</i>
<b><u>error</u></b>	(baseball) a failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. <i>An <b>error</b> of judgement.</i>

<b>fallacious</b>	Based on an incorrect or misleading notion or information. <i><b>Fallacious</b> arguments.</i>
<b>faulty</b>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Her character was <b>faulty</b>.</i>
<b>flawed</b>	Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection. <i>A <b>flawed</b> hero.</i>
<b>immoral</b>	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>Unseemly and <b>immoral</b> behaviour.</i>
<b>improper</b>	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. <i>Slightly <b>improper</b> to dine alone with a married man.</i>
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not exact. <i>A forecast that proved wildly <b>inaccurate</b>.</i>
<b>inappropriate</b>	Not suitable for a particular occasion etc. <i>Put <b>inappropriate</b> pressure on them.</i>
<b>incorrect</b>	Not correct; not in conformity with fact or truth. <i>The doctor gave you <b>incorrect</b> advice.</i>
<b>inequitable</b>	Unfair; unjust. <i><b>Inequitable</b> taxation.</i>
<b>iniquitous</b>	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i><b>Iniquitous</b> deeds.</i>
<b>iniquity</b>	Morally objectionable behavior. <i>A den of <b>iniquity</b>.</i>
<b>injustice</b>	An unjust act. <i>She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora s remark.</i>
<b>invidious</b>	(of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust. <i><b>Invidious</b> comparisons.</i>
<b>misguide</b>	Lead someone in the wrong direction or give someone wrong directions. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and <b>misguide</b> the general reader.</i>
<b>misinformation</b>	Information that is incorrect. <i>Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and <b>misinformation</b>.</i>
<b>misinterpret</b>	Interpret falsely. <i>Soanes claimed his remarks had been <b>misinterpreted</b>.</i>
<b>mistaken</b>	Wrong in e.g. opinion or judgment. <i>An unfortunate case of <b>mistaken</b> identity.</i>

<b>unethical</b>	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i><b>Unethical</b> business practices.</i>
<b>unfair</b>	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Took an <b>unfair</b> advantage.</i>
<u><b>unfavorable</b></u>	(of winds or weather) tending to hinder or oppose. <i><b>Unfavorable</b> comments.</i>
<u><b>unfit</b></u>	Make unfit or unsuitable. <i>They say that we are trying to give poor children tastes which will only <b>unfit</b> them for a life of hardship and toil.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>He feels that you are in the <b>wrong</b>.</i>
<u><b>wrongly</b></u>	In an unjust, dishonest, or immoral way. <i>My name is spelled <b>wrongly</b>.</i>
