Synonyms of "Unjust" as an adjective (24 Words)

biased	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. A biased account of the trial.
bigoted	Blindly and obstinately attached to some creed or opinion and intolerant toward others. A bigoted group of reactionaries.

<u>discriminatory</u>	Making or showing an unjust or prejudicial distinction between different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, sex, age, or disability. <i>Discriminatory employment practices.</i>
gratuitous	Given or done free of charge. <i>A gratuitous insult.</i>
groundless	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>The allegations proved groundless.</i>
inappropriate	Not suitable or proper in the circumstances. <i>Noise seems inappropriate at a time of sadness.</i>
indefensible	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>The towns were tactically indefensible.</i>
inequitable	Unfair; unjust. <i>The inequitable division of wealth.</i>
one-sided	Favoring one person or side over another.
<u>partial</u>	(followed by `of' or `to') having a strong preference or liking for. <i>Partial collapse.</i>
partisan	Devoted to a cause or party. <i>Newspapers have become increasingly partisan.</i>
preferential	(of a creditor) having a claim on the receipt of payment from a debtor which will be met before those of other creditors. <i>Preferential trade terms.</i>
prejudiced	Having or showing a dislike or distrust that is derived from prejudice; bigoted. <i>A prejudiced judge.</i>
slanted	Having an oblique or slanted direction. <i>The highly slanted report of the murders.</i>
<u>undeserved</u>	Not deserved or earned. <i>An undeserved term of imprisonment.</i>
<u>undue</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>Accused of using undue force.</i>
unfair	Not following the rules of a game or sport. <i>Used unfair methods.</i>
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An unjustifiable restriction on their freedom.</i>
unmerited	Not merited or deserved. <i>Unmerited treatment of a potentially fine subject.</i>

<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>An unreasonable request.</i>
<u>unwarranted</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>Unwarranted jealousy.</i>
weighted	Made heavy or weighted down with weariness. <i>Votes weighted according to the size of constituencies.</i>
wrong	Not correct or true; incorrect. <i>Cheating is wrong.</i>
<u>wrongful</u>	Having no legally established claim. <i>A wrongful act.</i>

biased	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. <i>We will not tolerate this biased media coverage.</i>
cheating	Not faithful to a spouse or lover.
dishonesty	The quality of being dishonest. <i>The dismissal of thirty civil servants for dishonesty and misconduct.</i>
disinformation	Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc). <i>The entire Western intelligence system had been systematically manipulated with clever disinformation.</i>
disqualify	Declare (someone) ineligible for an office, activity, or competition because of an offence or infringement. <i>She was disqualified after failing a drugs test.</i>
<u>erroneous</u>	Containing or characterized by error. <i>Employers sometimes make erroneous assumptions.</i>
<u>error</u>	(baseball) a failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. <i>An error of judgement.</i>

fallacious	Based on an incorrect or misleading notion or information. <i>Fallacious arguments.</i>
<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Her character was faulty.</i>
<u>flawed</u>	Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection. <i>A flawed hero.</i>
immoral	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>Unseemly and immoral behaviour.</i>
<u>improper</u>	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. <i>Slightly improper to dine alone with a married man.</i>
inaccurate	Not exact. <i>A forecast that proved wildly inaccurate.</i>
inappropriate	Not suitable for a particular occasion etc. <i>Put inappropriate pressure on them.</i>
<u>incorrect</u>	Not correct; not in conformity with fact or truth. <i>The doctor gave you incorrect advice.</i>
inequitable	Unfair; unjust. <i>Inequitable taxation.</i>
iniquitous	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i>Iniquitous deeds.</i>
iniquity	Morally objectionable behavior. <i>A den of iniquity.</i>
<u>injustice</u>	An unjust act. <i>She was taken aback by the injustice of Nora's remark.</i>
invidious	(of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust. <i>Invidious comparisons.</i>
misguide	Lead someone in the wrong direction or give someone wrong directions. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and misguide the general reader.</i>
<u>misinformation</u>	Information that is incorrect. <i>Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and misinformation.</i>
misinterpret	Interpret falsely. <i>Soanes claimed his remarks had been misinterpreted.</i>
<u>mistaken</u>	Wrong in e.g. opinion or judgment. <i>An unfortunate case of mistaken identity.</i>

unethical	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i>Unethical business practices.</i>
unfair	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Took an unfair advantage.</i>
<u>unfavorable</u>	(of winds or weather) tending to hinder or oppose. <i>Unfavorable comments.</i>
<u>unfit</u>	Make unfit or unsuitable. <i>They say that we are trying to give poor children tastes which will only unfit them for a life of hardship and toil.</i>
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>He feels that you are in the wrong.</i>
<u>wrongly</u>	In an unjust, dishonest, or immoral way. <i>My name is spelled wrongly.</i>
