baseless	Without foundation in fact. <i>Baseless gossip.</i>
defective	Having a defect. <i>I returned the appliance because it was defective.</i>
flawed	Having a blemish or flaw. <i>A flawed hero.</i>
groundless	Not based on any good reason. <i>The allegations proved groundless.</i>

indefensible	Not able to be protected against attack. <i>The towns were tactically indefensible.</i>
inexcusable	Not excusable. <i>Matt s behaviour was inexcusable.</i>
insupportable	Unable to be endured; intolerable. <i>The heat was insupportable.</i>
<u>invalid</u>	Having no cogency or legal force. <i>Invalid reasoning.</i>
<u>shaky</u>	Shaking or trembling. <i>After a shaky start the Scottish team made superb efforts.</i>
unconfirmed	Not confirmed as to truth or validity. <i>An unconfirmed letter of credit.</i>
uncorroborated	Unsupported by other evidence. <i>The unreliability of uncorroborated confessions.</i>
unforgivable	Not excusable. <i>Losing your temper with him was unforgivable.</i>
<u>unfounded</u>	Having no foundation or basis in fact. <i>Unfounded suspicions.</i>
unpardonable	(of a fault or offence) too severe to be pardoned; unforgivable. <i>Unpardonable behavior.</i>
unsubstantiated	Unsupported by other evidence. <i>Unsubstantiated claims.</i>
unsupported	Not held up or borne. <i>The assumption was unsupported by evidence.</i>
<u>untenable</u>	(especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection. <i>This argument is clearly untenable.</i>
unwarrantable	Not able to be authorized or sanctioned; unjustifiable. <i>An unwarrantable intrusion into personal matters.</i>
<u>unwarranted</u>	Not justified or authorized. <i>Unwarranted limitations of personal freedom.</i>
<u>weak</u>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>Their commitment to the project is weak.</i>

absurd	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The allegations are patently absurd.</i>
absurdity	The quality or state of being ridiculous or wildly unreasonable. <i>Duncan laughed at the absurdity of the situation.</i>
apostasy	The act of abandoning a party for cause. <i>The execution of their leader for apostasy brought widespread criticism.</i>
excessive	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>Excessive charges.</i>
groundless	Not based on any good reason. <i>The allegations proved groundless.</i>
illogical	Lacking in correct logical relation. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
<u>impossible</u>	Not able to occur, exist, or be done. <i>A seemingly impossible task.</i>
impracticable	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>It was impracticable to widen the road here.</i>
imprudent	Not prudent or wise. <i>An imprudent remark.</i>
<u>incoherent</u>	Unable to express yourself clearly or fluently. <i>A turgid incoherent presentation.</i>
indefensible	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This behaviour is morally indefensible.</i>
inexcusable	Without excuse or justification. <i>Matt's behaviour was inexcusable.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
insuperable	(of a difficulty or obstacle) impossible to overcome. <i>Insuperable financial problems.</i>
insupportable	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>He had arrived at a wholly insupportable conclusion.</i>

<u>invalid</u>	A person made weak or disabled by illness or injury. <i>She spent the rest of her life as an invalid.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i>Irrational</i> animals.
<u>ludicrous</u>	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>Every night he wore a ludicrous outfit.</i>
<u>preposterous</u>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
<u>ridiculous</u>	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>It seems absolutely ridiculous that anyone would try to pull a stunt like this.</i>
<u>undue</u>	Not yet payable. <i>I didn t want to show undue excitement.</i>
<u>unfounded</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was unfounded.</i>
<u>unjustified</u>	(of printed text) not justified. <i>Unjustified</i> price increases.
<u>unpardonable</u>	(of a fault or offence) too severe to be pardoned; unforgivable. <i>Unpardonable</i> behavior.
<u>unreasonable</u>	Not guided by or based on good sense. <i>An unreasonable request.</i>
<u>unsupported</u>	Not held up or borne. <i>A toddler who can stand unsupported.</i>
<u>untenable</u>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly untenable.</i>
<u>untrue</u>	Not in accordance with fact or reality; false or incorrect. <i>A malicious and untrue story.</i>
<u>unwarranted</u>	Not justified or authorized. <i>Unwarranted</i> jealousy.
<u>unwise</u>	Not appropriate to the purpose. <i>Unwise</i> policy decisions.
