The towns were tactically **indefensible**.

Not excusable. inexcusable

Matt s behaviour was **inexcusable**.

Unable to be endured: intolerable. insupportable The heat was **insupportable**.

Having no cogency or legal force.

invalid **Invalid** reasoning.

Shaking or trembling. **shaky**

After a **shaky** start the Scottish team made superb efforts.

Not confirmed as to truth or validity. unconfirmed

An **unconfirmed** letter of credit.

Unsupported by other evidence. uncorroborated

The unreliability of **uncorroborated** confessions.

Not excusable. unforgivable

Losing your temper with him was **unforgivable**.

Having no foundation or basis in fact. unfounded

Unfounded suspicions.

(of a fault or offence) too severe to be pardoned; unforgivable. unpardonable

Unpardonable behavior.

Unsupported by other evidence. unsubstantiated

Unsubstantiated claims.

Not held up or borne. unsupported

The assumption was **unsupported** by evidence.

(especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended

untenable against attack or objection.

This argument is clearly **untenable**.

Not able to be authorized or sanctioned; unjustifiable. unwarrantable

An **unwarrantable** intrusion into personal matters.

Not justified or authorized. unwarranted

weak

Unwarranted limitations of personal freedom.

Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much

weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and

conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin.

Their commitment to the project is **weak**.

A seemingly **impossible** task.

impracticable Not capable of being carried out or put into practice.

It was **impracticable** to widen the road here.

imprudent Not prudent or wise.

An **imprudent** remark.

incoherent Unable to express yourself clearly or fluently.

A turgid **incoherent** presentation.

indefensible Incapable of being defended or justified.

This behaviour is morally **indefensible**.

inexcusable Without excuse or justification.

Matt s behaviour was **inexcusable**.

inordinate Beyond normal limits.

A book of **inordinate** length.

insuperable (of a difficulty or obstacle) impossible to overcome.

Insuperable financial problems.

insupportable Incapable of being justified or explained.

insupportable He had arrived at a wholly **insupportable** conclusion.



A person made weak or disabled by illness or injury. invalid

She spent the rest of her life as an **invalid**.

Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when

irrational expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and

Not guided by or based on good sense. unreasonable

An **unreasonable** request.

Not held up or borne. unsupported

Incapable of being defended or justified. untenable

Not in accordance with fact or reality; false or incorrect. untrue

A malicious and **untrue** story.

Not justified or authorized. unwarranted **Unwarranted** jealousy.
