| <b>unconfirmed</b>        | Not confirmed as to truth or validity.<br><i>An <b>unconfirmed</b> letter of credit.</i>  |
| <b>uncorroborated</b>     | Unsupported by other evidence.<br><i>The unreliability of <b>uncorroborated</b> confessions.</i>  |
| <b>unforgivable</b>       | Not excusable.<br><i>Losing your temper with him was <b>unforgivable</b>.</i>   |
| <u><b>unfounded</b></u>   | Having no foundation or basis in fact.<br><i><b>Unfounded</b> suspicions.</i>   |
| <b>unpardonable</b>       | (of a fault or offence) too severe to be pardoned; unforgivable.<br><i><b>Unpardonable</b> behavior.</i>  |
| <b>unsubstantiated</b>    | Unsupported by other evidence.<br><i><b>Unsubstantiated</b> claims.</i>   |
| <b>unsupported</b>        | Not held up or borne.<br><i>The assumption was <b>unsupported</b> by evidence.</i>  |
| <u><b>untenable</b></u>   | (especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection.<br><i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>  |
| <b>unwarrantable</b>      | Not able to be authorized or sanctioned; unjustifiable.<br><i>An <b>unwarrantable</b> intrusion into personal matters.</i>  |
| <u><b>unwarranted</b></u> | Not justified or authorized.<br><i><b>Unwarranted</b> limitations of personal freedom.</i>  |
| <u><b>weak</b></u>        | Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin.<br><i>Their commitment to the project is <b>weak</b>.</i> |

| <b>impracticable</b>     | Not capable of being carried out or put into practice.<br><i>It was <b>impracticable</b> to widen the road here.</i>                |
| <b>imprudent</b>         | Not prudent or wise.<br><i>An <b>imprudent</b> remark.</i>  |
| <b><u>incoherent</u></b> | Unable to express yourself clearly or fluently.<br><i>A turgid <b>incoherent</b> presentation.</i>                                  |
| <b>indefensible</b>      | Incapable of being defended or justified.<br><i>This behaviour is morally <b>indefensible</b>.</i>                                  |
| <b>inexcusable</b>       | Without excuse or justification.<br><i>Matt's behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>   |
| <b><u>inordinate</u></b> | Beyond normal limits.<br><i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>   |
| <b>insuperable</b>       | (of a difficulty or obstacle) impossible to overcome.<br><i><b>Insuperable</b> financial problems.</i>                              |

| <b><u>invalid</u></b>      | A person made weak or disabled by illness or injury.<br><i>She spent the rest of her life as an <b>invalid</b>.</i>   |
| <b><u>irrational</u></b>   | Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2.<br><b><i>Irrational</i></b> animals. |
| <b><u>ludicrous</u></b>    | Incongruous;inviting ridicule.<br><i>Every night he wore a <b>ludicrous</b> outfit.</i>   |
| <b><u>preposterous</u></b> | So unreasonable as to invite derision.<br><i>A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.</i>  |
| <b><u>ridiculous</u></b>   | Incongruous;inviting ridicule.<br><i>It seems absolutely <b>ridiculous</b> that anyone would try to pull a stunt like this.</i>   |

| <b><u>untrue</u></b>       | Not in accordance with fact or reality; false or incorrect.<br><i>A malicious and <b>untrue</b> story.</i>  |
| <b><u>unwarranted</u></b>  | Not justified or authorized.<br><b><i>Unwarranted</i></b> jealousy.   |
