### Definitions of "Unjustified" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unjustified” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not shown to be right or reasonable.*
- *(of printed text) not justified.*
- *Lacking justification or authorization.*

### Synonyms of "Unjustified" as an adjective (18 Words)

<b>groundless</b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>The allegations proved <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>improper</b>	Not appropriate for a purpose or occasion. <i>The <b>improper</b> use of public funds.</i>
<b>irrational</b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i><b>Irrational</b> numbers.</i>

<b>irregular</b>	Occurring at uneven or varying rates or intervals. <i><b>Irregular</b> hiring practices.</i>
<b>not done</b>	Cooked until ready to serve.
<b>out of turn</b>	Being out or having grown cold.
<b>unacceptable</b>	Not satisfactory or allowable. <i>A word <b>unacceptable</b> in polite society.</i>
<b>undue</b>	Not appropriate or proper (or even legal) in the circumstances. <i>I didn't want to show <b>undue</b> excitement.</i>
<b>unfair</b>	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Took an <b>unfair</b> advantage.</i>
<b>unfounded</b>	Having no foundation or basis in fact. <i><b>Unfounded</b> suspicions.</i>
<b>unjust</b>	Not based on or behaving according to what is morally right and fair. <i>An <b>unjust</b> judge.</i>
<b>unjustifiable</b>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	More than is needed; excessive. <i>Some people feel that holiday insurance is <b>unnecessary</b>.</i>
<b>unreasonable</b>	Not guided by or based on good sense. <i>An <b>unreasonable</b> request.</i>
<b>unreasoned</b>	Not based on good sense or logic. <i>An <b>unreasoned</b> reaction to the idea.</i>
<b>unsound</b>	Physically unsound or diseased. <i>An <b>unsound</b> limb.</i>
<b>unwarranted</b>	Not justified or authorized. <i><b>Unwarranted</b> limitations of personal freedom.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Badly timed. <i>Something is <b>wrong</b> with the engine.</i>

<b>absurd</b>	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The allegations are patently <b>absurd</b>.</i>

<b>arbitrary</b>	(of power or a ruling body) unrestrained and autocratic in the use of authority. <i>An <b>arbitrary</b> decision.</i>
<b>exaggerated</b>	Enlarged to an abnormal degree. <i>Thick lenses <b>exaggerated</b> the size of her eyes.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>
<b>excessively</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Recklessly wasteful. <i><b>Extravagant</b> praise.</i>
<b>groundless</b>	Not based on any good reason. <i>The allegations proved <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking sense or clear, sound reasoning. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <i><b>Immoderate</b> spending.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>It was <b>impracticable</b> to widen the road here.</i>
<b>incoherent</b>	Not logical or internally consistent. <i>The film is ideologically <b>incoherent</b>.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	(of theories etc) incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This behaviour is morally <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>indiscriminate</b>	Not marked by fine distinctions. <i>The <b>indiscriminate</b> use of antibiotics can cause problems.</i>
<b>inexcusable</b>	Not excusable. <i>Matt s behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>
<b>inordinate</b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>insupportable</b>	Unable to be endured; intolerable. <i>The heat was <b>insupportable</b>.</i>
<b>irrational</b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i><b>Irrational</b> fears.</i>

<b><u>overly</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.</i>
<b>random</b>	An unknown, unspecified, or odd person. <i>Some <b>randoms</b> in the crowd asked Ivan Ljubicic to take a photo for them.</i>
<b><u>too</u></b>	To a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively. <i>He has a Mercedes <b>too</b>.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Not yet payable. <i>Accused of using <b>undue</b> force.</i>
<b><u>unfounded</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was <b>unfounded</b>.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b>unpardonable</b>	Not admitting of pardon. <i><b>Unpardonable</b> behavior.</i>
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness. <i>She knew she was being <b>unreasonable</b> but she resented his domesticity.</i>
<b>unsupported</b>	(of a program, language, or device) not having assistance for the user available from a manufacturer or system manager. <i>A toddler who can stand <b>unsupported</b>.</i>
<b><u>untenable</u></b>	(of theories etc) incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>
<b><u>untrue</u></b>	Not faithful or loyal. <i>A despotic sheik can be <b>untrue</b> to his vast seraglio.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>I am sure your fears are <b>unwarranted</b>.</i>
