Definitions of "Unlikely" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unlikely” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not likely to be true or to occur or to have occurred.*
- *Not likely to happen, be done, or be true; improbable.*
- *Has little chance of being the case or coming about.*
- *Having a probability too low to inspire belief.*



Synonyms of "Unlikely" as an adjective (22 Words)

absurd	Inconsistent with reason or logic or common sense. <i>The absurd predicament of seeming to argue that virtue is highly desirable but intensely unpleasant.</i>
doubtful	Feeling uncertain about something. <i>Of doubtful legality.</i>
<u>dubious</u>	Hesitating or doubting. <i>Timeshare has been brought into disrepute by dubious sales methods.</i>
fabulous	Having no basis in reality; mythical. <i>A fabulous vacation.</i>
fanciful	Existing only in the imagination. <i>A fanciful mind.</i>
fantastic	Ludicrously odd. <i>A fantastic idea of his own importance.</i>

implausible	Highly imaginative but unlikely. <i>Gave the teacher an implausible excuse.</i>
improbable	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>The characters have improbable names.</i>
<u>inconceivable</u>	Not capable of being imagined or grasped mentally; unbelievable. <i>They behaved with inconceivable cruelty.</i>
incredible	Difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>The noise from the crowd was incredible.</i>
laboured	(especially of humour or a performance) not spontaneous or fluent. <i>One of Alan's laboured jokes.</i>
not likely	Expected to become or be; in prospect.
preposterous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
<u>questionable</u>	Able to be refuted. <i>Questionable motives.</i>
<u>remote</u>	Distant in time. <i>A remote relative.</i>
ridiculous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Her conceited assumption of universal interest in her rather dull children was ridiculous.</i>
<u>strained</u>	Of a mainly liquid substance having been strained to separate out any solid matter. <i>There was a strained silence.</i>
<u>unbelievable</u>	So great or extreme as to be difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>Unbelievable or not it happened.</i>
<u>unconvincing</u>	Having a probability too low to inspire belief. <i>As unconvincing as a forced smile.</i>
<u>unexpected</u>	Not expected or regarded as likely to happen. <i>Unexpected news.</i>
unimaginable	Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>
<u>unrealistic</u>	Not realistic. <i>It was unrealistic to expect changes to be made overnight.</i>

- *An unlikely candidate for reelection.*
- *An unlikely explanation.*
- *An unlikely story.*
- *Prices are unlikely to change.*
- *It is unlikely that they will ever be used.*

<u>amaze</u>	Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment. <i>Your ability to speak six languages amazes me.</i>
astonish	Surprise or impress (someone) greatly. <i>It astonished her that he was so anxious.</i>
<u>astonishing</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>An astonishing achievement.</i>
astound	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness astounded him.</i>
<u>astounding</u>	Bewildering or striking dumb with wonder. <i>The summit offers astounding views.</i>
<u>disbelief</u>	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>Laura shook her head in disbelief.</i>
doubtful	Unsettled in mind or opinion. <i>I was doubtful of my judgement.</i>
exist	Have an existence be extant. <i>He could barely exist on such a low wage.</i>

fabulous	Barely credible. <i>The fabulous unicorn.</i>
farfetched	Highly imaginative but unlikely. <i>A farfetched excuse.</i>
implausible	Having a quality that provokes disbelief. <i>This is a blatantly implausible claim.</i>
<u>impossible</u>	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>His assignment verged on the impossible.</i>
improbable	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>This account of events was seen by the jury as most improbable.</i>
<u>inconceivable</u>	Not capable of being imagined or grasped mentally; unbelievable. <i>It seemed inconceivable that the president had been unaware of what was going on.</i>
incredible	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>At incredible speed.</i>
<u>marvelous</u>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>A marvelous collection of rare books.</i>
<u>miraculous</u>	Of the nature of a miracle or having the power to work miracles. <i>I felt amazed and grateful for our miraculous escape.</i>
miraculously	In a remarkable and extremely lucky manner. <i>A shrine where people bring the sick to be miraculously healed.</i>
profound	Profound quality. <i>A state of profound shock.</i>
redoubtable	(of a person) formidable, especially as an opponent. <i>The redoubtable ladies.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>Suffered a staggering defeat.</i>
<u>supposed</u>	Based primarily on surmise rather than adequate evidence. <i>He was supposed to go to the store.</i>
unacceptable	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>The coach told his players that defeat was unacceptable.</i>
<u>unbelievable</u>	So great or extreme as to be difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>Unbelievable or not it happened.</i>
<u>unconvincing</u>	Failing to impress. <i>She felt the lie was unconvincing.</i>
unimaginable	Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>

unreliable	Not able to be relied upon. <i>An unreliable trestle.</i>
<u>unthinkable</u>	Incapable of being conceived or considered. <i>It was unthinkable that John could be dead.</i>
untrustworthy	Not worthy of trust or belief. <i>An untrustworthy person.</i>
wonderful	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>They all think she s wonderful.</i>
