chance Occurring or appearing or singled out by chance.

cool and violets.

detached Not fixed in position.

A **detached** part.



disinterested Not influenced by considerations of personal advantage.

A banker is under an obligation to give **disinterested** advice.

dispassionate Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice.

A journalist should be a **dispassionate** reporter of fact.

emotionless Not showing any emotion; unemotional.

Her voice was flat and emotionless.

erratic Having no fixed course.

An erratic comet.

half-hearted Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm.

Dependent upon or characterized by chance.

haphazard

A most haphazard system of record keeping.

impassive Deliberately impassive in manner.

His cold **impassive** face.

inconsistent Displaying a lack of consistency. *Inconsistent* with the roadmap.

Inconsistent with the roadmap.

indifferent Lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other.

Indifferent about which book you would give them.

lackadaisical Idle or indolent especially in a dreamy way- P.G.Wodehouse.

She was annoyingly **lackadaisical** and impractical.

lukewarm Moderately warm.

Gave only **lukewarm** support to the candidate.

non-committal Refusing to bind oneself to a particular course of action or view or the

like.

Expressing that the subject of the sentence is the patient of the action

passive denoted by the verb.

Academics seem to favor **passive** sentences.

random Governed by or involving equal chances for each item.

Bombs fell at random.

Lacking affection or warm feeling.

An uncaring person.

Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or

unconcerned callous.

Readers **unconcerned** with style.

unemotional Cool and formal in manner.

A flat **unemotional** voice.

Devoid of feeling for others.

unfeeling

An unfeeling wretch.



uninterested Having no care or interest in knowing.

I was totally **uninterested** in boys.

Not connected or concerned with someone or something, especially on an

uninvolved emotional level.

An **uninvolved** bystander.

unmoved Emotionally unmoved.

Always appeared completely **unmoved** and imperturbable.

unpredictable Not capable of being foretold.

An **unpredictable** or indeterminable future.

Not responding to some influence or stimulus.

Was **unresponsive** to her passionate advances.

Determined by chance or impulse or whim rather than by necessity or

whimsical reason.

The **whimsical** arbitrariness of autocracy.

wild Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation.

A wild guess.
