Definitions of "Unnamed" as an adjective

- *Not named.*
- *Being or having an unknown or unnamed source.*



Synonyms of "Unnamed" as an adjective (12 Words)

nameless	Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>The clinic was situated in a little nameless square off James Street.</i>
<u>uncertain</u>	Not established beyond doubt; still undecided or unknown. <i>The weather is uncertain.</i>
uncounted	Not counted. <i>Uncounted millions of dollars.</i>
<u>undecided</u>	(of a person) not having made a decision. <i>The jury remained undecided.</i>
<u>undefined</u>	Not clear or defined. <i>He felt an undefined longing.</i>
undesigned	Not officially appointed or specified. <i>Paul seemed to be an undesigned leader.</i>
undetermined	Not authoritatively decided or settled. <i>The acquisition will result in an as yet undetermined number of lay offs.</i>
unfixed	Lacking definition or definite content- Jane Austen. <i>Two of the three unfixed security bugs are on the critical list.</i>
unidentified	Not recognized or identified. <i>A picture of an unidentified motorcyclist.</i>
unknown	Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>An unknown amount.</i>
unquantified	Not expressed or measured in terms of quantity. <i>We now have abundant if unquantified evidence.</i>
unstated	Not made explicit. <i>A series of unstated assumptions.</i>

Usage Examples of "Unnamed" as an adjective

- *The unnamed man was found unconscious.*
- *An unnamed donor.*

Associations of "Unnamed" (30 Words)

anonymous	Having no outstanding, individual, or unusual features; unremarkable or impersonal. <i>An anonymous phone call.</i>
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<u>blind</u>	Make blind by putting the eyes out. <i>The holding company was just a blind.</i>
enigmatic	Difficult to interpret or understand; mysterious. <i>An enigmatic smile.</i>
esoteric	Intended for or likely to be understood by only a small number of people with a specialized knowledge or interest. <i>A compilation of esoteric philosophical theories.</i>
<u>hidden</u>	Kept out of sight; concealed. <i>A hidden room or place of concealment such as a priest hole.</i>
inglorious	(used of conduct or character) deserving or bringing disgrace or shame. <i>An inglorious episode in British imperial history.</i>
<u>involuntary</u>	Controlled by the autonomic nervous system; without conscious control. <i>Involuntary servitude.</i>
nameless	(especially of an emotion) not easy to describe; indefinable. <i>The myths talk about nameless horrors infesting our universe.</i>
<u>newfound</u>	Newly discovered. <i>His newfound aggressiveness.</i>
<u>obscure</u>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>Obscure references to Proust.</i>
<u>occult</u>	Hidden and difficult to see. <i>Occult lore.</i>
recondite	(of a subject or knowledge) little known; abstruse. <i>Some recondite problem in historiography.</i>
secret	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>He tried to keep his drinking a secret.</i>
<u>shameful</u>	(used of conduct or character) deserving or bringing disgrace or shame. <i>A shameful accusation.</i>
strange	Being definitely out of the ordinary and unexpected; slightly odd or even a bit weird. <i>A harsh accent that was strange to his ears.</i>
<u>unappreciated</u>	Not fully understood, recognized, or valued. <i>She had been brought up in a family where she felt unappreciated and undervalued.</i>
<u>unaware</u>	(often followed by `of') not aware. <i>They were unaware of his absence.</i>
<u>undetected</u>	Not detected or discovered. <i>She looked around to be sure her faux pas was undetected.</i>

undiagnosed	Eluding diagnosis. <i>Undiagnosed disease.</i>
<u>undiscovered</u>	Not discovered. <i>The novel had lain undiscovered for years among his papers.</i>
<u>unfamiliar</u>	Not having knowledge or experience of. <i>He felt a stranger among the crowd of unfamiliar faces.</i>
unidentified	Not recognized or identified. <i>An unidentified species.</i>
uninitiated	Without special knowledge or experience. <i>The discussion wasn't easy to follow for the uninitiated.</i>
<u>unintentional</u>	Not done with purpose or intent. <i>The offense was unintentional.</i>
<u>unintentionally</u>	Not on purpose. <i>Unintentionally rude song lyrics.</i>
unknown	An unknown person or thing. <i>An unknown writer.</i>
unobserved	Not seen or observed. <i>Their courtship has not gone unobserved by Giles.</i>
<u>unseen</u>	An unseen passage for translation. <i>Unseen natural resources.</i>
unsung	Not famous or acclaimed. <i>Unsung heroes of the war.</i>
whereabouts	The place where someone or something is. <i>His whereabouts remain secret.</i>
