appall	Fill with apprehension or alarm; cause to be unpleasantly surprised.
browbeat	Be bossy towards. <i>A witness is being browbeaten under cross examination.</i>
bully	Be bossy towards. <i>He is a ranting domineering bully.</i>
daunt	Cause to lose courage. <i>Some people are daunted by technology.</i>
demoralize	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>She hastened her daughter's steps lest she be demoralized by beholding the free manners of these mad English.</i>
deprave	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>This book would deprave and corrupt young children.</i>
depress	Reduce the level or strength of activity in (something, especially an economic or biological system). <i>Fear of inflation in America depressed bond markets.</i>
deter	Try to prevent; show opposition to. <i>Strategists think not only about how to deter war but about how war might occur.</i>
disconcert	Disturb the composure of; unsettle. <i>The abrupt change of subject disconcerted her.</i>
discourage	Deprive of courage or hope take away hope from cause to feel discouraged. <i>We should discourage this practice among our youth.</i>
dishearten	Take away the enthusiasm of. <i>The farmer was disheartened by the damage to his crops.</i>
dissuade	Turn away from by persuasion. <i>His friends tried to dissuade him from flying.</i>
embarrass	Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self-conscious. <i>She wouldn't embarrass either of them by making a scene.</i>
faze	Disturb or disconcert (someone). <i>She was not fazed by his show of anger.</i>
fright	Frighten. <i>I jumped up in fright.</i>
frighten	Drive out by frightening. <i>The stranger who hangs around the building frightens me.</i>

frown	Look angry or sullen, wrinkle one's forehead, as if to signal disapproval. <i>He frowned as he reread the letter.</i>
hector	Be bossy towards. <i>She doesn't hector us about giving up things.</i>
horror	A literary or film genre concerned with arousing feelings of horror. <i>Horrors two buttons were missing.</i>
intimidate	Make timid or fearful. <i>Her boss intimidates her.</i>
intimidation	A communication that makes you afraid to try something. <i>The election was marred by allegations of government intimidation and vote rigging.</i>
menace	A threatening quality or atmosphere. <i>Africa's elephants are still menaced by poaching.</i>
petrify	Cause to become stonelike or stiff or dazed and stunned from fright. <i>Slogans petrify our thinking.</i>
scare	Become scared. <i>I was scared stiff.</i>
scowl	Frown in an angry or bad-tempered way. <i>She stamped into the room with a scowl on her face.</i>
stun	Hit something or somebody as if with a sandbag. <i>The news stunned her.</i>
terrify	Fill with terror; frighten greatly. <i>She was terrified he would drop her.</i>
terror	Terrorism. <i>His delivery is the terror of even world class batsmen.</i>
threaten	To be a menacing indication of something. <i>The trade unions threatened a general strike.</i>
unsettle	Cause to feel anxious or uneasy; disturb. <i>The crisis has unsettled financial markets.</i>
