- concealed** Hidden on any grounds for any motive.
*A **concealed** compartment in his briefcase.*
- discreet** Intentionally unobtrusive.
*A **discreet** investor.*
- hidden** Kept out of sight; concealed.
***Hidden** dangers.*
- modest** Marked by simplicity; having a humble opinion of yourself.
*The **modest** women wear long sleeved dresses and all but cover their faces.*
- unassuming** Not arrogant or presuming.
*He was an **unassuming** and kindly man.*

| undistinguished | Not worthy of notice. <i>An undistinguished career.</i> |
| unexceptional | Not out of the ordinary; usual. <i>A unexceptional incident as can be found in a lawyer's career.</i> |
| unimposing | Lacking in impressiveness. <i>A handsome but unimposing Georgian house.</i> |
| unnoticeable | Not easily observed or noticed. <i>Her clothes were simple and unnoticeable.</i> |
| unobtrusive | Not conspicuous or attracting attention. <i>The service was unobtrusive and efficient.</i> |
| unostentatious | Exhibiting restrained good taste. <i>Unostentatious elegance.</i> |
| unremarkable | Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>An unremarkable house.</i> |
| unspectacular | Not spectacular. <i>She had been an unspectacular student.</i> |

| connive | Secretly allow (something immoral, illegal, or harmful) to occur. <i>She connived with a senior official to rig the results of last year's election.</i> |
| <u>disregard</u> | Lack of attention and due care. <i>The body of evidence is too substantial to disregard.</i> |

| <u>lighthearted</u> | Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>Her lighthearted nature.</i> |
| <u>neglect</u> | The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>He neglected to write to her.</i> |
| offstage | Not in public. <i>The offstage lives of celebrities.</i> |
| <u>overlook</u> | Look past, fail to notice. <i>He was overlooking his harvest men.</i> |
| <u>remaining</u> | Not used up. <i>England have forbidden him to play in the remaining fixtures.</i> |
| sight | Take aim by looking through the sights of a gun or other device. <i>A sight test.</i> |
| <u>sneer</u> | A facial expression of contempt or scorn; the upper lip curls. <i>She sneered at her little sister's efforts to play the song on the piano.</i> |
| soundproof | Impervious to, or not penetrable by, sound. <i>A soundproof windowless room.</i> |
| <u>survivor</u> | A person who copes well with difficulties in their life. <i>The survivors of the fire were taken to a hospital.</i> |
| <u>undeserved</u> | Not warranted, merited, or earned. <i>Has an undeserved reputation as a coward.</i> |
| <u>undetected</u> | Not perceived or discerned. <i>The thieves escaped undetected.</i> |
| undiagnosed | Eluding diagnosis. <i>Some patients have diseases that go undiagnosed and therefore untreated.</i> |
| <u>undiscovered</u> | Not discovered. <i>Undiscovered islands.</i> |
| <u>unexpected</u> | Not expected or regarded as likely to happen. <i>He seemed to have a knack for saying the unexpected.</i> |
| unknown | An unknown quantity or variable. <i>Find the unknown in the following equations.</i> |
| <u>unnamed</u> | Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>The unnamed man was found unconscious.</i> |

- unobserved** Not observed.
*Managed to slip away **unobserved**.*
- unpropitious** (of a circumstance) not giving or indicating a good chance of success;
unfavourable.
*His reports were submitted at a financially **unpropitious** time.*
- unseen** An unseen passage for translation.
*It seemed she might escape **unseen**.*
- untoward** Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society.
***Untoward** remarks.*
