distasteful Not pleasing in odor or taste.

distressing Bad; unfortunate.

dreadful Exceptionally bad or displeasing.

Don t go out the weather is **dreadful**.

foul Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines.

Foul or dirty copy.

hateful Arousing, deserving of, or filled with hatred.

That **hateful** arrogant woman.

horrible Provoking horror- Winston Churchill.

A **horrible** massacre.

Not suitable for food.

inedible An inedible variety of mushroom.

lamentable (of circumstances or conditions) very bad; deplorable.

The **lamentable** friends trailing their long black garments.

Disgustingly dirty; filled or smeared with offensive matter.

Plastic bags burn with a **nasty** acrid smell.

objectionable Causing disapproval or protest.

I find his theory **objectionable** in its racist undertones.

obnoxious Extremely unpleasant.

He found her son somewhat **obnoxious**.

off-putting Tending to repel- Elizabeth Hess.

offensive Morally offensive.

He is also accused of possessing an **offensive** weapon.

regrettable Deserving regret.

Regrettable remarks.

repellent Causing disgust or distaste.

I find his obsequiousness **repellent**.

repugnant Extremely distasteful; unacceptable.

 ${\it Cannibalism\ seems\ } \textbf{repugnant}\ to\ us.$

repulsive So extremely ugly as to be terrifying.

A **repulsive** smell.

unappealing (of characters in literature or drama) tending to evoke antipathetic feelings.

The company faces some **unappealing** choices.

... Not appetizing in appearance, aroma, or taste.

unappetizing An unappetizing leg of chicken.

Not pleasing or appealing to look at.

<u>unattractive</u>

If the revised bid is **unattractive** it may not be accepted.



uneatable Not suitable for food.

We all complained about the **uneatable** breakfast.

uninviting (especially of a place or prospect) not attractive.

The house was dark and **uninviting**.

Disagreeable to the senses, to the mind, or feelings.

An **unpleasant** smell.

unsavoury Morally offensive.

They looked at the scanty **unsavoury** portions of food doled out to them.

Not welcome; not giving pleasure or received with pleasure.

Unwelcome attentions from men.

upsetting Causing an emotional disturbance.

A painful and **upsetting** divorce.

vile Extremely unpleasant.

The **vile** development of slavery appalled them.

Insufferable insolence.

Unable to be endured.

intolerable

An intolerable degree of sentimentality.

irritating Causing annoyance, impatience, or mild anger.

An **irritating** child.

malcontent A person who is discontented or disgusted.

It was too late to stop the **malcontent**s with a show of force.

objectionable Causing disapproval or protest.

I find his theory **objectionable** in its racist undertones.

obnoxious Extremely unpleasant.

He found her son somewhat **obnoxious**.

offensive Morally offensive.

Offensive odors.

outrageous Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation.

Spends an outrageous amount on entertainment.

The prevention by law of the manufacture and sale of alcohol, especially in

prohibition the US between 1920 and 1933.

They argue that **prohibition** of drugs will always fail.

scurrilous Expressing offensive reproach.

A very funny collection of bawdy and **scurrilous** writings.

Place under a taboo.

Speaking about sex is a **taboo** in his country.

unacceptable (used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable.

The coach told his players that defeat was **unacceptable**.

unbearable Incapable of being tolerated or endured.

The heat was getting **unbearable**.

unendurable Incapable of being put up with.

Cries of **unendurable** suffering.

unimaginable Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend.

Lives of almost **unimaginable** deprivation.



unpleasant (of a person or their manner) unfriendly and inconsiderate; rude.

Unpleasant repercussions.

unsatisfactory

Not giving satisfaction.

Share should take back

Shops should take back **unsatisfactory** goods.

unsupportable Not able to be supported or defended.

unthinkable Incapable of being conceived or considered. *It was unthinkable* that John could be dead.
