disagreeable	Unpleasant or unenjoyable. A <i>disagreeable</i> thought.
displeasing	Causing annoyance or dissatisfaction; disagreeable. <i>Displeasing</i> news.
distasteful	Not pleasing in odor or taste. He found such cynicism <i>distasteful</i> .

distressing	Bad; unfortunate. <i>Distressing or disturbing news.</i>
<u>dreadful</u>	Exceptionally bad or displeasing. <i>Don't go out the weather is dreadful.</i>
foul	Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines. <i>Foul or dirty copy.</i>
hateful	Arousing, deserving of, or filled with hatred. <i>That hateful arrogant woman.</i>
horrible	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>A horrible massacre.</i>
inedible	Not suitable for food. <i>An inedible variety of mushroom.</i>
lamentable	(of circumstances or conditions) very bad; deplorable. <i>The lamentable friends trailing their long black garments.</i>
<u>nasty</u>	Disgustingly dirty; filled or smeared with offensive matter. <i>Plastic bags burn with a nasty acrid smell.</i>
objectionable	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>I find his theory objectionable in its racist undertones.</i>
<u>obnoxious</u>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat obnoxious.</i>
off-putting	Tending to repel- Elizabeth Hess.
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>He is also accused of possessing an offensive weapon.</i>
regrettable	Deserving regret. <i>Regrettable remarks.</i>
repellent	Causing disgust or distaste. <i>I find his obsequiousness repellent.</i>
repugnant	Extremely distasteful; unacceptable. <i>Cannibalism seems repugnant to us.</i>
repulsive	So extremely ugly as to be terrifying. <i>A repulsive smell.</i>
unappealing	(of characters in literature or drama) tending to evoke antipathetic feelings. <i>The company faces some unappealing choices.</i>
unappetizing	Not appetizing in appearance, aroma, or taste. <i>An unappetizing leg of chicken.</i>
<u>unattractive</u>	Not pleasing or appealing to look at. <i>If the revised bid is unattractive it may not be accepted.</i>

uneatable	Not suitable for food. <i>We all complained about the uneatable breakfast.</i>
<u>uninviting</u>	(especially of a place or prospect) not attractive. <i>The house was dark and uninviting.</i>
<u>unpleasant</u>	Disagreeable to the senses, to the mind, or feelings. <i>An unpleasant smell.</i>
unsavoury	Morally offensive. <i>They looked at the scanty unsavoury portions of food doled out to them.</i>
<u>unwelcome</u>	Not welcome; not giving pleasure or received with pleasure. <i>Unwelcome attentions from men.</i>
upsetting	Causing an emotional disturbance. <i>A painful and upsetting divorce.</i>
vile	Extremely unpleasant. <i>The vile development of slavery appalled them.</i>

annoying	The act of troubling or annoying someone. <i>Tapping an annoying rhythm on his glass with his fork.</i>
<u>disagreeable</u>	Not agreeing with your tastes or expectations. <i>A disagreeable old man.</i>
discontented	Dissatisfied, especially with one's circumstances. <i>Strikes by discontented workers.</i>
<u>disgruntled</u>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>Judges receive letters from disgruntled members of the public.</i>
<u>dissatisfied</u>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>His parents are dissatisfied with the quality of tuition on offer.</i>
impermissible	Not permitted. <i>Impermissible behavior.</i>

<u>impossible</u>	Something that cannot be done. <i>A seemingly impossible task.</i>
<u>inadequate</u>	Lacking the quality or quantity required; insufficient for a purpose. <i>Inadequate training.</i>
inadmissible	Not to be allowed or tolerated. <i>He held that such evidence was inadmissible.</i>
insufferable	Too extreme to bear. <i>Insufferable insolence.</i>
intolerable	Unable to be endured. <i>An intolerable degree of sentimentality.</i>
irritating	Causing annoyance, impatience, or mild anger. <i>An irritating child.</i>
malcontent	A person who is discontented or disgusted. <i>It was too late to stop the malcontents with a show of force.</i>
objectionable	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>I find his theory objectionable in its racist undertones.</i>
<u>obnoxious</u>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat obnoxious.</i>
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>Offensive odors.</i>
<u>outrageous</u>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Spends an outrageous amount on entertainment.</i>
prohibition	The prevention by law of the manufacture and sale of alcohol, especially in the US between 1920 and 1933. <i>They argue that prohibition of drugs will always fail.</i>
scurrilous	Expressing offensive reproach. <i>A very funny collection of bawdy and scurrilous writings.</i>
<u>taboo</u>	Place under a taboo. <i>Speaking about sex is a taboo in his country.</i>
unacceptable	(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable. <i>The coach told his players that defeat was unacceptable.</i>
<u>unbearable</u>	Incapable of being tolerated or endured. <i>The heat was getting unbearable.</i>
unendurable	Incapable of being put up with. <i>Cries of unendurable suffering.</i>
unimaginable	Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>

<u>unpleasant</u>	(of a person or their manner) unfriendly and inconsiderate; rude. <i>Unpleasant repercussions.</i>
<u>unsatisfactory</u>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Shops should take back unsatisfactory goods.</i>
<u>unsavory</u>	Not pleasing in odor or taste. <i>An unsavory reputation.</i>
unsupportable	Not able to be supported or defended.
<u>unthinkable</u>	Incapable of being conceived or considered. <i>It was unthinkable that John could be dead.</i>
vexing	Causing irritation or annoyance. <i>The most vexing questions for policymakers.</i>
