<b><a href="#">disagreeable</a></b>	Unpleasant or unenjoyable. <i>A <b>disagreeable</b> thought.</i>
<b>displeasing</b>	Causing annoyance or dissatisfaction; disagreeable. <i><b>Displeasing</b> news.</i>
<b>distasteful</b>	Not pleasing in odor or taste. <i>He found such cynicism <b>distasteful</b>.</i>

<b>distressing</b>	Bad; unfortunate. <b>Distressing</b> or <i>disturbing news</i> .
<b><u>dreadful</u></b>	Exceptionally bad or displeasing. <i>Don't go out the weather is <b>dreadful</b>.</i>
<b>foul</b>	Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines. <b>Foul</b> or <i>dirty copy</i> .
<b>hateful</b>	Arousing, deserving of, or filled with hatred. <i>That <b>hateful</b> arrogant woman.</i>
<b>horrible</b>	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>A <b>horrible</b> massacre.</i>
<b>inedible</b>	Not suitable for food. <i>An <b>inedible</b> variety of mushroom.</i>
<b>lamentable</b>	(of circumstances or conditions) very bad; deplorable. <i>The <b>lamentable</b> friends trailing their long black garments.</i>
<b><u>nasty</u></b>	Disgustingly dirty; filled or smeared with offensive matter. <i>Plastic bags burn with a <b>nasty</b> acrid smell.</i>
<b>objectionable</b>	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>I find his theory <b>objectionable</b> in its racist undertones.</i>
<b><u>obnoxious</u></b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat <b>obnoxious</b>.</i>
<b>off-putting</b>	Tending to repel- Elizabeth Hess.
<b>offensive</b>	Morally offensive. <i>He is also accused of possessing an <b>offensive</b> weapon.</i>
<b>regrettable</b>	Deserving regret. <b>Regrettable</b> remarks.
<b>repellent</b>	Causing disgust or distaste. <i>I find his obsequiousness <b>repellent</b>.</i>
<b>repugnant</b>	Extremely distasteful; unacceptable. <i>Cannibalism seems <b>repugnant</b> to us.</i>
<b>repulsive</b>	So extremely ugly as to be terrifying. <i>A <b>repulsive</b> smell.</i>
<b>unappealing</b>	(of characters in literature or drama) tending to evoke antipathetic feelings. <i>The company faces some <b>unappealing</b> choices.</i>
<b>unappetizing</b>	Not appetizing in appearance, aroma, or taste. <i>An <b>unappetizing</b> leg of chicken.</i>
<b><u>unattractive</u></b>	Not pleasing or appealing to look at. <i>If the revised bid is <b>unattractive</b> it may not be accepted.</i>

<b>uneatable</b>	Not suitable for food. <i>We all complained about the <b>uneatable</b> breakfast.</i>
<b>uninviting</b>	(especially of a place or prospect) not attractive. <i>The house was dark and <b>uninviting</b>.</i>
<b>unpleasant</b>	Disagreeable to the senses, to the mind, or feelings. <i>An <b>unpleasant</b> smell.</i>
<b>unsavoury</b>	Morally offensive. <i>They looked at the scanty <b>unsavoury</b> portions of food doled out to them.</i>
<b>unwelcome</b>	Not welcome; not giving pleasure or received with pleasure. <i><b>Unwelcome</b> attentions from men.</i>
<b>upsetting</b>	Causing an emotional disturbance. <i>A painful and <b>upsetting</b> divorce.</i>
<b>vile</b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>The <b>vile</b> development of slavery appalled them.</i>

<b>annoying</b>	The act of troubling or annoying someone. <i>Tapping an <b>annoying</b> rhythm on his glass with his fork.</i>
<b>disagreeable</b>	Not agreeing with your tastes or expectations. <i>A <b>disagreeable</b> old man.</i>
<b>discontented</b>	Dissatisfied, especially with one's circumstances. <i>Strikes by <b>discontented</b> workers.</i>
<b>disgruntled</b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>Judges receive letters from <b>disgruntled</b> members of the public.</i>
<b>dissatisfied</b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>His parents are <b>dissatisfied</b> with the quality of tuition on offer.</i>
<b>impermissible</b>	Not permitted. <i><b>Impermissible</b> behavior.</i>

<b><u>impossible</u></b>	Something that cannot be done. <i>A seemingly <b>impossible</b> task.</i>
<b><u>inadequate</u></b>	Lacking the quality or quantity required; insufficient for a purpose. <i><b>Inadequate</b> training.</i>
<b>inadmissible</b>	Not to be allowed or tolerated. <i>He held that such evidence was <b>inadmissible</b>.</i>
<b>insufferable</b>	Too extreme to bear. <i><b>Insufferable</b> insolence.</i>
<b>intolerable</b>	Unable to be endured. <i>An <b>intolerable</b> degree of sentimentality.</i>
<b>irritating</b>	Causing annoyance, impatience, or mild anger. <i>An <b>irritating</b> child.</i>
<b>malcontent</b>	A person who is discontented or disgusted. <i>It was too late to stop the <b>malcontents</b> with a show of force.</i>
<b>objectionable</b>	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>I find his theory <b>objectionable</b> in its racist undertones.</i>
<b><u>obnoxious</u></b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat <b>obnoxious</b>.</i>
<b>offensive</b>	Morally offensive. <i><b>Offensive</b> odors.</i>
<b><u>outrageous</u></b>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Spends an <b>outrageous</b> amount on entertainment.</i>
<b>prohibition</b>	The prevention by law of the manufacture and sale of alcohol, especially in the US between 1920 and 1933. <i>They argue that <b>prohibition</b> of drugs will always fail.</i>
<b>scurrilous</b>	Expressing offensive reproach. <i>A very funny collection of bawdy and <b>scurrilous</b> writings.</i>
<b><u>taboo</u></b>	Place under a taboo. <i>Speaking about sex is a <b>taboo</b> in his country.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable. <i>The coach told his players that defeat was <b>unacceptable</b>.</i>
<b><u>unbearable</u></b>	Incapable of being tolerated or endured. <i>The heat was getting <b>unbearable</b>.</i>
<b>unendurable</b>	Incapable of being put up with. <i>Cries of <b>unendurable</b> suffering.</i>
<b>unimaginable</b>	Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend. <i>Lives of almost <b>unimaginable</b> deprivation.</i>

<b><u>unpleasant</u></b>	(of a person or their manner) unfriendly and inconsiderate; rude. <i><b>Unpleasant</b> repercussions.</i>
<b><u>unsatisfactory</u></b>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Shops should take back <b>unsatisfactory</b> goods.</i>
<b><u>unsavory</u></b>	Not pleasing in odor or taste. <i>An <b>unsavory</b> reputation.</i>
<b>unsupportable</b>	Not able to be supported or defended.
<b><u>unthinkable</u></b>	Incapable of being conceived or considered. <i>It was <b>unthinkable</b> that John could be dead.</i>
<b>vexing</b>	Causing irritation or annoyance. <i>The most <b>vexing</b> questions for policymakers.</i>
