Synonyms of "Unprofessional" as an adjective (35 Words)

amateur	Engaging or engaged in without payment; non-professional. <i>Amateur</i> athletics.
amateurish	Done in an unskilful or inept way. A very amateurish job.
blundering	Making or characterized by stupid or careless mistakes; clumsy. Both her parents are supportive if a bit blundering .



bumbling	Lacking physical movement skills, especially with the hands- Mary H. <i>He s a bumbling fool.</i>
bungling	Lacking physical movement skills, especially with the hands- Mary H. <i>The work of a bungling amateur.</i>
<u>careless</u>	(of an action or its result) showing or caused by a lack of attention. She had been careless and had left the window unlocked.
clumsy	Difficult to handle or use; unwieldy. <i>His choice of words was clumsy</i> .
<u>crude</u>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. Managed to make a crude splint.
dishonourable	Bringing shame or disgrace on someone or something. <i>His crimes are petty and dishonourable</i> .
disreputable	Not considered to be respectable in character or appearance. <i>He was heavy grubby and vaguely disreputable.</i>
<u>improper</u>	Not suitable or right or appropriate. It was considered improper to leave one s house on Christmas Day.
incompetent	Legally not qualified or sufficient. <i>Incompetent</i> at chess.
<u>indecorous</u>	Lacking propriety and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>Indecorous</i> behavior.
<u>inefficient</u>	Lacking the ability or skill to perform effectively; inadequate. An inefficient campaign against drugs.
inexperienced	Lacking practical experience or training. <i>He is still relatively young and inexperienced.</i>
inexpert	Lacking professional skill or expertise. An inexpert transcription from the real music.
lax	Of the limbs or muscles relaxed. A lax rope.
negligent	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern. The council had been negligent in its supervision of the children in care.
second-rate	Moderate to inferior in quality.
<u>shoddy</u>	Cheap and shoddy Judith Crist. We re not paying good money for shoddy goods.
slapdash	Done too hurriedly and carelessly. <i>He gave a slapdash performance.</i>



slipshod	(of shoes) worn down at the heel. He d caused many problems with his slipshod management.
<u>sloppy</u>	(of semi-fluid matter) containing too much liquid; watery. Lovers of sloppy romance.
<u>unbecoming</u>	(of behaviour) not fitting or appropriate; unseemly. <i>Language unbecoming to a lady.</i>
unbefitting	Not appropriate; unsuitable. Behavior unbefitting a father.
unethical	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. It is unethical to torment any creature for entertainment.
unpractised	Not trained or experienced. An unpractised improvisation.
unprincipled	(of a person or their behaviour) not acting in accordance with moral principles. <i>Freedom from coarse unprincipled calumny.</i>
unqualified	Not meeting the proper standards and requirements and training. <i>An unqualified denial.</i>
<u>unscrupulous</u>	Without scruples or principles. Unscrupulous politicos who would be happy to sell their country in order to gain power.
unseemly	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. An unseemly squabble.
unskilful	Not having or showing skill. Though kind and willing she was unskilful .
<u>unskilled</u>	Not having or requiring special skill or training. Unskilled workmanship.
untrained	Not disciplined or conditioned or made adept by training. <i>Self styled doctors untrained in diagnosis.</i>
<u>unworthy</u>	Not deserving respect or attention. Many pieces are unworthy and ungrammatical.

<u>ineffective</u>	Lacking the ability or skill to perform effectively; inadequate. An ineffective teacher.
inept	Generally incompetent and ineffectual. <i>Inept</i> handling of the account.
inexperienced	Lacking practical experience or training. An inexperienced driver.
informal	Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere. Peru s huge and dense informal sector of street vendors and cottage industries.
laborer	Someone who works with their hands; someone engaged in manual labor
laity	Ordinary people, as distinct from professionals or experts.
layman	A person without professional or specialized knowledge in a particular subject. <i>He was an active Catholic layman.</i>
layperson	Someone who is not a clergyman or a professional person. His highly successful lectures were meant for an audience of layperson s interested in the natural sciences.
<u>menial</u>	A person with a menial job. <i>Menial factory jobs.</i>
modestly	In a manner that is not elaborate or luxurious. Women are expected to dress modestly .



<u>neophyte</u>	A plant that is found in an area where it had not been recorded previously. <i>A cast of neophyte actors.</i>
novice	A person new to and inexperienced in a job or situation. <i>He was a complete novice in foreign affairs.</i>
<u>player</u>	An important participant (as in a business deal. <i>He was a major player in setting up the corporation.</i>
practise	Scheme or plot for an evil purpose. <i>He began to practise law.</i>
<u>rusty</u>	(of a metal object) affected by rust. <i>Rusty</i> deposits.
semiskilled	Possessing or requiring limited skills. A semiskilled job.
team	Come together as a team to achieve a common goal. Are you team Mac or team PC.
<u>unauthorized</u>	Without official authorization. Unauthorized access to the computer system.
unconfirmed	Not confirmed as to truth or validity. Unconfirmed rumors.
<u>unofficial</u>	Not officially authorized or confirmed. <i>The early election returns are unofficial.</i>
unpracticed	Not having had extensive practice.
<u>unskilled</u>	Lacking professional skill or expertise. Unskilled labor.
young	Young people collectively. Rock music appeals to the young .
