<b>amateur</b>	Engaging or engaged in without payment; non-professional. <i>Amateur athletics.</i>
<b>amateurish</b>	Done in an unskilful or inept way. <i>A very <b>amateurish</b> job.</i>
<b>blundering</b>	Making or characterized by stupid or careless mistakes; clumsy. <i>Both her parents are supportive if a bit <b>blundering</b>.</i>

<b>bumbling</b>	Lacking physical movement skills, especially with the hands- Mary H. <i>He s a <b>bumbling</b> fool.</i>
<b>bungling</b>	Lacking physical movement skills, especially with the hands- Mary H. <i>The work of a <b>bungling</b> amateur.</i>
<b>careless</b>	(of an action or its result) showing or caused by a lack of attention. <i>She had been <b>careless</b> and had left the window unlocked.</i>
<b>clumsy</b>	Difficult to handle or use; unwieldy. <i>His choice of words was <b>clumsy</b>.</i>
<b>crude</b>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>Managed to make a <b>crude</b> splint.</i>
<b>dishonourable</b>	Bringing shame or disgrace on someone or something. <i>His crimes are petty and <b>dishonourable</b>.</i>
<b>disreputable</b>	Not considered to be respectable in character or appearance. <i>He was heavy grubby and vaguely <b>disreputable</b>.</i>
<b>improper</b>	Not suitable or right or appropriate. <i>It was considered <b>improper</b> to leave one s house on Christmas Day.</i>
<b>incompetent</b>	Legally not qualified or sufficient. <i><b>Incompetent</b> at chess.</i>
<b>indecorous</b>	Lacking propriety and good taste in manners and conduct. <i><b>Indecorous</b> behavior.</i>
<b>inefficient</b>	Lacking the ability or skill to perform effectively; inadequate. <i>An <b>inefficient</b> campaign against drugs.</i>
<b>inexperienced</b>	Lacking practical experience or training. <i>He is still relatively young and <b>inexperienced</b>.</i>
<b>inexpert</b>	Lacking professional skill or expertise. <i>An <b>inexpert</b> transcription from the real music.</i>
<b>lax</b>	Of the limbs or muscles relaxed. <i>A <b>lax</b> rope.</i>
<b>negligent</b>	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern. <i>The council had been <b>negligent</b> in its supervision of the children in care.</i>
<b>second-rate</b>	Moderate to inferior in quality.
<b>shoddy</b>	Cheap and shoddy Judith Crist. <i>We re not paying good money for <b>shoddy</b> goods.</i>
<b>slapdash</b>	Done too hurriedly and carelessly. <i>He gave a <b>slapdash</b> performance.</i>

<b>slipshod</b>	(of shoes) worn down at the heel. <i>He d caused many problems with his <b>slipshod</b> management.</i>
<b>sloppy</b>	(of semi-fluid matter) containing too much liquid; watery. <i>Lovers of <b>sloppy</b> romance.</i>
<b>unbecoming</b>	(of behaviour) not fitting or appropriate; unseemly. <i>Language <b>unbecoming</b> to a lady.</i>
<b>unbefitting</b>	Not appropriate; unsuitable. <i>Behavior <b>unbefitting</b> a father.</i>
<b>unethical</b>	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i>It is <b>unethical</b> to torment any creature for entertainment.</i>
<b>unpractised</b>	Not trained or experienced. <i>An <b>unpractised</b> improvisation.</i>
<b>unprincipled</b>	(of a person or their behaviour) not acting in accordance with moral principles. <i>Freedom from coarse <b>unprincipled</b> calumny.</i>
<b>unqualified</b>	Not meeting the proper standards and requirements and training. <i>An <b>unqualified</b> denial.</i>
<b>unscrupulous</b>	Without scruples or principles. <i><b>Unscrupulous</b> politicians who would be happy to sell their country in order to gain power.</i>
<b>unseemly</b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>An <b>unseemly</b> squabble.</i>
<b>unskilful</b>	Not having or showing skill. <i>Though kind and willing she was <b>unskilful</b>.</i>
<b>unskilled</b>	Not having or requiring special skill or training. <i><b>Unskilled</b> workmanship.</i>
<b>untrained</b>	Not disciplined or conditioned or made adept by training. <i>Self styled doctors <b>untrained</b> in diagnosis.</i>
<b>unworthy</b>	Not deserving respect or attention. <i>Many pieces are <b>unworthy</b> and ungrammatical.</i>

<b>laborer</b>	Someone who works with their hands; someone engaged in manual labor.
<b>laity</b>	Ordinary people, as distinct from professionals or experts.
<b>layman</b>	A person without professional or specialized knowledge in a particular subject. <i>He was an active Catholic <b>layman</b>.</i>
<b>layperson</b>	Someone who is not a clergyman or a professional person. <i>His highly successful lectures were meant for an audience of <b>laypersons</b> interested in the natural sciences.</i>
<b>menial</b>	A person with a menial job. <i><b>Menial</b> factory jobs.</i>
<b>modestly</b>	In a manner that is not elaborate or luxurious. <i>Women are expected to dress <b>modestly</b>.</i>

<b><u>neophyte</u></b>	A plant that is found in an area where it had not been recorded previously. <i>A cast of <b>neophyte</b> actors.</i>
<b>novice</b>	A person new to and inexperienced in a job or situation. <i>He was a complete <b>novice</b> in foreign affairs.</i>
<b><u>player</u></b>	An important participant (as in a business deal). <i>He was a major <b>player</b> in setting up the corporation.</i>
<b>practise</b>	Scheme or plot for an evil purpose. <i>He began to <b>practise</b> law.</i>
<b><u>rusty</u></b>	(of a metal object) affected by rust. <i><b>Rusty</b> deposits.</i>
